INTRODUCTION

This work is the fourth in the series, <u>Australian Parliaments</u>: <u>Biographical Notes</u>, which began with A.W. Martin and P. Wardle, <u>Members of the Legislative Assembly of New South Wales</u>, 1856-1901 (A.N.U. Social Science Monograph No. 16, 1959) and was succeeded by G.C. Bolton and Ann Mozley, <u>The Western Australian Legislature</u> 1870-1930 (A.N.U., 1961) and by D. B. Waterson, <u>A Biographical</u> Register of the Queensland Parliament 1860-1929 (A.N.U., 1972).

All told, there are 691 entries. The members of the Legislative Council between 1851 and 1900 and of the Legislative Assembly between 1856 and 1900 are arranged alphabetically; no division between the two Houses is made for there was considerable overlap in membership. Entries begin with name, occupation, date and place of birth, parentage, marriage, children, date and place of death, and religion. Brief notes follow on the subject's extraparliamentary career. Then his membership of parliament, unsuccessful electoral contests, ministries held and membership of important royal commissions are detailed. Finally, references are made to the more useful sources used. October 1900 (the close of the 17th parliament, which just preceded the transition from Colony to State) was chosen as the obvious terminal date for inclusions; full twentieth century details have, however, been provided for those nineteenth century members who were re-elected in 1900 or later.

The Parliament of Victoria kept no biographical record of its members. Its official publications (such as T.G. Watson (ed.), The First Fifty Years of Responsible Government in Victoria (Melb., 1906?) and the Victorian Parliamentary Handbook) provide no more than the basic list of members and lists of ministers and other office-holders. E. Sweetman's Constitutional Development of Victoria, 1851-6 (Melb., 1920) gives an accurate list of members of the Legislative Council from 1851 to 1856. The task of tracking down basic information about the majority of members has hence been unusually

arduous. Nevertheless, we have succeeded in finding death dates and obituary references for 98% of members; most of those who could not be traced left Australia, sometimes in a state of disgrace.

There can be few areas of historical research in which the primary material is so unreliable. The chief sources -- biographical dictionaries (Blair, Heaton, Humphreys, Mennell, Victoria and its Metropolis and the Cyclopaedia of Victoria) and newspaper obituaries -- team with errors which were often copied from one account to another several times. Information included on death certificates is frequently unreliable. A great deal of checking has been carried out from sources of information which are not included in the references given except where few or no substantial sources of information exist. These sources include: shipping, barrister and attorney, and other records in the Archives Division, State Library of Victoria; at the Victorian Electoral Office, Office of the Government Statist and Probate Office; city, suburban and country cemetery records; the University of Melbourne Archives; correspondence from city and municipal councils, libraries in other States, and descendants; general reference works such as directories, army and navy lists, law lists, government gazettes, and many more. We have resorted to frequent question marks when adopting a probable piece of information, but some information we have not queried must inevitably be inaccurate.

The sources cited normally include the most useful newspaper references and sometimes local histories. The nineteenth century biographical compilations are usually omitted, unless nothing better has been found. In the case of members who have been included in volumes 1 to 6 of the <u>Australian Dictionary of Biography</u>, no other references have been given. Relevant postgraduate theses have not been cited, and it should be noted that there is valuable material on the political behaviour of most members in the following works:

No attempt has been made to indicate 'party' or faction links, except to note the 'Labor' (Progressive Political League) members and a few others such as staunch 'Berryites' in the 1877-80 parliament. The fluctuations of political support and the independence of so many members make any short tagging of the great majority impossible or to some extent misleading.

Perhaps the most notable feature of the members was that only 16% of those whose birthplaces are known were born in Australia; while of those who are known to have been born overseas no fewer than 29% were born in Scotland (England 45%, Ireland 22%, Wales 2%).

It is impossible to acknowledge adequately the generous assistance we have received from officers of innumerable public institutions, voluntary bodies, professional associations and business organisations. Special mention, however, must be made of Mr D. Bishop and other officers of the Archives Division, State Library of Victoria; Miss P. Reynolds, Miss K. Young, Mr H. Notes on Procedures

Occupation. In cases where occupations varied, the one given is that pursued at the time of first entering parliament.

Number of children. The numbers given should be regarded only as an indication. No attempt has been made to distinguish surviving children from those who were stillborn, or died in infancy, or before their father. Adopted children and stepchildren are not included.

Religion. Information is lacking in many cases. Newspaper classifications at election times are unreliable. Absence of a query indicates firms evidence (cemetery record at least). A query indicates a probability. Nominal adherence of agnosticism, etc., complicate the matter.

Local government posts. Dates, where given, do not indicate calendar years, but election and retirement during the first and last years shown.

<u>Dates of membership</u>. The first month-date shown is the date of swearing-in, not the date of election. For dates of general elections for the Assembly, see Appendix 1. In the case of bye-elections, the date of election is also given. The date for retirement is that of prorogation or death, but dates of resignation are often obscure. Resignations which occurred after acceptance of office have been ignored when the member was re-elected.

Unsuccessful contests. Dates are taken from lists in the Electoral Office. Even these, however, are not entirely reliable, for withdrawals from a contest are not always noted.

Membership of royal commissions. Commissions of minor importance have been omitted. The date of appointment has been used, not the covering dates of the commission, as so many members receive late appointments.

Melb. 1853; partnered Tait, Wilson & Wright, timber merchants Geelong; hit by depression 1854; went by chartered schooner to Dunedin NZ, and returned with cargo for sale on the goldfields; opened store at Fiery Creek; later at Ararat; sold in 1858 and took up sheep farming, Lower Goulburn and Lower Wimmera; joined a firm of merchants in Melb., Boyd, McKnight & Boyd, which became Wilson, Crosbie & Co.; had pastoral interests NSW and Vic., and sugar plantations Fiji. A dir. (chmn 1876) National Bank of A'sia.

WINTER, Joseph

Printer, bookseller and journalist. B. 1852 Prahran; s. George, bookmaker, and Eliza, nee Hillman; m. Emma Florence Thomas; ls. 3d. D. 2 May 1896 S.Melb. Meth.

Ed. various denominational schools and through Young Men's Mutual Improvement Societies; employed first as printer's devil, Mason, Firth & Co.; apprenticed as a paper ruler and became a journeyman, Sands & McDougall's; after working for several firms began his own business as bookseller, stationer and printer Richmond 1889; with T. Gibson started and became editor of a Labour paper The Commonweal 1890-92. Vice-pres. and pres. Trades Hall Cncl 1890-92, and pres. Labour Convention at which the Progressive Political League was formed. Member Aust. Natives' Assn 1886 and became pres. Richmond and S.Melb. branches. Not to be confused with Joseph Winter, proprietor of The Advocate.

WINTER (WINTER-IRVING), William Irving

Pastoralist. B. 20 Feb 1840 Edinburgh; s. John and Janet Margaret, née Irving; m. 1868 Noorilim, Vic., Frances Amelia Taylor; 5s. 6d. D. 28 June 1901 Armadale. C.of C.

Arr. Port Phillip 1841; ed. Scotch Coll.; assisted father in management of Bonshaw estate, near Ballarat; acquired Colbinabbin estate as a gift from his father who owned or leased more than 250,000 acres; partnered his brothers in the Goulburn Valley till 1867 when the properties were divided, his share being the Stanhope estate near Rushworth; purchased Noorilim on Goulburn River and lived there; owned other properties in various parts of Aust. Waranga shire pres., and held other offices in Bendigo. Fellow, Roy.Col.Inst.; life member Roy.Geog.Soc. By roy. licence 1899, he and his issue were authorised to assume the surname of Irving, in addition to, and after that of Winter.

The Legislative Assembly initially consisted of 60 members in 37 constituencies (1 five-member, 1 four-member, 1 three-member, 14 two-member and 20 one-member) elected for five years. Act no. 89 of 1859 reduced the term of a parliament to three years. The property qualification for members of £2,000 was abolished by Act no. 12 of 1857. Manhood suffrage was introduced by Act no. 33 of 1857. The police were given the franchise by Act no. 969 of 1888. Plural voting was abolished in 1899 by Act no. 1606. Membership was increased in 1858 to 78 (4 three-member, 21 two-member, 24 one-member) and electorates were redistributed by Act no. 64. In 1865 electorates were again redistributed by Act no. 279, Membership was increased in 1876 to 86 (5 three-member, 21 two-member, 29 one-member) and electorates redistributed by Act no. 548. A further increase in membership and another redistribution was made in 1888 (Act no. 1008 which applied until 1903); 95 members were elected in 11 two-member and 73 one-member constituencies. Acts detailing conditions of the franchise and electoral procedures were as follows: no. 81 of 1859, no. 94 of 1860, no. 137 of 1862, nos. 164, 168 and 181 of 1863, no. 279 of 1865, no. 548 of 1876, no. 708 of 1881, no. 1004 of 1888, no. 1075 of 1890, no. 1242 of 1891, no. 1601 of 1898, and no. 1701 of 1900. Payment of members was introduced in 1870 (Act no. 383) and extended periodically until 1886 when it was made permanent (Act no. 888). The procedure whereby members appointed to the ministry were required to face their electors was abolished in 1914.
