The State Election and Federal Labor.

We are just now up to our ears in State politics, but we must not, even for the few weeks that is left of this election eampaign, lose sight of the fact that within a very few months we may be called upon to do our part to maintain the supremacy of Labor in all Australia, and to secure that liberalisation of the Constitution that is necessary to the realisation of the hopes of the national democracy. Properly used this present election should be very helpful to Labor in the great bulk. election should be very helpful to Labor in the great bulk. The State election presents opportunities, alike for consolidation of forces and for education, our failure to use which will amount to criminal neglect. Every State Labor candidate should be an organiser and a propagandist for Federal Labor. Above all, every State Labor candidate should explain and commend and urge the adoption of proposals for a freer Constitution, for a more really national Commonwealth, and for a larger Australia. For Labor, at all events, State and Federal politics hang together. They are parts of the ene whole. The principles, the aspirations, and, subject to its different application, the policy of Labor in the Commonwealth and the State—in this State and in every State—are identical, are one and the same.

The Labor Party in all Australia is one, one in political faith and one in social aspiration. The Commonwealth party and the several State parties are but several regiments in the one great army that is fighting for the common good. And there is now opportunity here for a practical recognition and expression of this party solidarity. Just as Federal Labor members are coming to New South Wales to take part in the fight here for the rights and the good of the people, and against our local monopolists and class interest exploiters, so must the Labor candidates for local election improve the occasion of the State campaign to further the good cause in that Titanic struggle with the great forces of Australian Conservatism and anti-social monopoly interest in which Federal Labor will be engaged in this State, as in every State of the Union, before we are very much older.

* ***

· Labor in the Commonwealth is engaged in the task of making a new and better Australia. The Federal Labor Governmaking a new and better Australia. The Federal Labor Government put the Labor platform into operation in Australia, with the result that, although the Government was only in office three years, the worker was within reasonable distance of getting a fair share of the wealth he produced. And this was done without so much as the suspicion of injustice to any class, and with even no more disturbance of vested interests than is necessary to secure such fair treatment of the interests of the masses of the people as has already been won.

We hear a great deal, of course, of the stale cant about "caucus rule," "Labor domination," "class tyranny," and the like. But what has really been done under Labor auspices does not come under attack at all. What is there that Labor has done during its three years of power that the "Liberals" will, done during its three years of power that the "Liberals" will, should they be returned to office as the result of the next elections, dare to undo? What Labor has given us is here to stay. The "Liberals" will not dare to interfere with it. But if the "Liberals" should succeed in downing Labor the march of progress will be at an end. And even worse than that, all that hossile administration can do to make Labor achieves. progress will be at an end. And even worse than that, all that hostile administration can do to make Labor achievements of small effect will be done. We shall have a regime of miserable stagnation on the one hand, and all the nullification of good work of which an antagonistic administration is capable, on the other. When we remember this we shall realise how essential it has that we should secure for Labor an opportunity of continuing its humane and civilising mission, and that we should protect what has been won from the despoiling hand of the enemy.

In the coming fight hereulean efforts are to be put forth by the monopoly interests. The efforts of the classes are being by the monopoly interests. The endeavour will be to put a stop to the onward march of the people, and to see that at least no worse thing than has befallen them happens to the despoiling and exploiting classes. All the weight of authority and of wealth will be thrown into the scale against the people. And if the people are to prevail against the forces opposed to them it will be only by reason of their solidarity, their enthusiasm, their loyalty to themselves, and their sacrifice in their own interests. We confidently expect that everything that is necessary under all of these heads will be forthcoming. But we want to make sure of this. And we cannot do that better than by using to the full the opportunity for work in the Federal cause that this State election offers.

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
