McGOORTY v. UREN

GREAT BATTLE AT STADIUM.

UREN RETAINS TITLE.

Eddie McGoorty and Tommy Uren met at the Stadium on Saturday last, and provided a first-class contest.

McGoorty was making his first appearance for over 12 months, and the opinion was freely expressed that he would have deteriorated to such an extent that unless he won inside 10 rounds his chance was hopeless.

McGoorty was more in the picture over the last 10 rounds, and on a few occasions shook Uren considerably with heavy blows to the head and body.

Uren used a good straight left, which, especially in the earlier rounds, McGoorty seemed unable to block.

Uren's right, although often in use, was not so effective as usual owing to the fact that after he had placed a left he stepped back to avoid McGoorty's right.

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PROPOSED "CAN'T STRIKE" LAW IN AMERICA

Unionists Regard It As a Step Towards Slavery.

"Shall California Labor be Free or Slave" is the title of a pamphlet issued by the California State Federation of Labor against a "can't-strike" law pending in the State Legislature.

The measure is intended to apply to public utilities and prohibits strikes until fifteen days after a dispute has been finally dealt with by a board. No limit is placed upon the duration of the inquiry.

In opposing this bill the unionists make these strong points: "Public fights cannot be based upon individual wrongs."

"The public interest cannot supersede the individual interest where the personal liberty of the individual is concerned."

"No given number of men, however large, can enslave a single man for their own purposes, however important these may be."

"The individual right to quit work, considered by itself, is merely the right to look for another job. Individual rights are valuable in proportion as they may be exercised collectively."

"To say that under the proposed measure men may quit work individually but may not do so collectively is to play upon words, to offer the shadow and deny the substance of right."

"Labor in the United States is absolutely free to strike, and that freedom must be maintained. To surrender that freedom is to go backward towards the era of slavery, to retrace the long steps of mankind in the long struggle for human freedom."

"The right to quit work is the one thing that most clearly differentiates the freeman from the slave. The man who is forced to work when he wishes to quit is by that fact reduced to a state of slavery."

"The argument of public convenience, if carried to its logical conclusion, would lead to the virtual enslavement of certain classes of labor for the benefit of other classes."

"A strike undertaken merely to vindicate the right to strike would be a tragedy. Shall the Legislature force this condition upon the people, or shall it maintain the people's liberties as the fundamental condition of public interest and social progress?"

AUSTRALIA, BEWARE!

Involuntary servitude was put into effect in New Zealand on December 20. On that day a lottery was held under Government auspices, and 4000 once-free citizens of the Dominion whose names were drawn were conscripted for service in Europe.

The wishes of these citizens received no more consideration than if they had been convicts in the penitentiary, or Belgians deported to Germany, or black slaves in the South before the war.

Press reports say that the military band played while the drawing was taking place. Let us hope that the musicians had the good taste to avoid playing "Britons never shall be slaves."

HOW HUGHES DESERTED THE LABOUR PARTY.

Interests were the first consideration. He did not consider adequately the effect which the withdrawal of so many men would have in the dislocation of Australian industries and the influence on our financial future of the expenditure involved by a prolonged and devastating war.

The Overseas Army. We had sent abroad or had in training about this time nearly 200,000 young Australians. It was a tremendous achievement for a new and sparsely populated country.

In the Cabinet. In the nature of things differences of view are found in Cabinets as amongst all other bodies of men, small as well as large.

Tactics of Mr. Hughes. Reverting to my narrative, I may say that as Referendum day approached, my amazement at the tactics resorted to by Mr. Hughes to snatch a vote for conscription grew apace.

Some Recent Episodes. A brief summary of recent sensational episodes will conclude my remarks.

Alleged Attempted Bribery. In the other case the senator affected alleges that Mr. Hughes promised that "money need not stand in the way" if he was prepared to betray his party.

A Liberal Revolt. Finally, the conspiracy to turn the Labor majority in the Senate into a minority was temporarily successful.

Voluntary Secession. In so doing they violated their pledge according to the general interpretation of it.

In the House of Representatives. In the Senate Labor still retained its power, though reduced in numbers.

They were not satisfied with dictating the policy which Mr. Hughes had to pursue; they wanted to browse in the rich paddocks of office as well.

Formation of the Coalition. With the subsequent proceedings you are all fairly familiar through the press. Mr. Hughes formed a Government from his secessionist comrades and carried on in the Lower House with the aid of his erstwhile foes.

It is clear that they either knew they were lying when they applied such epithets to Labor members or else they were traitors themselves in extending this invitation to "traitors."

Tory Control of the Cabinet. But worse than this, from the point of view of the public interest, was that the Tory party were given by Hughes a majority in the Cabinet.

Already, at the instance of the Tory majority, Mr. Hughes has abandoned the levy by which wealth would have contributed a proper quota towards the war and the repatriation of soldiers.

Fusion Policy Now in Force. Having a majority in the Cabinet, whatever the Cook Tory section says goes. And the party which was entrusted by Australia with power stands to-day powerless.

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
