Although the current research environment is characterised by massive quantities of data, the ability to harness these data to solve complex problems is often hampered by inadequate data management practices - Data for Science [PMSEIC Working Group Report], December 2006.

How can we develop a policy framework for research data management? Who has the administrative responsibility for research data?

How will Australia's research infrastructure cope with the challenge of managing the data that our researchers are producing?

How will the recommendations of the Prime Minister's Science, Engineering and Innovation Council's Data for Science Working Group be implemented?

Will the National Collaborative Research Infrastructure Strategy (NCRIS) include an Australian National Data Service? If so, what will be the features of this new service?

What is the current thinking of our policy makers on this challenge, and how are other countries coping with the same issues?

What are the issues from the perspective of the Australian science or humanities researcher? And from the perspective of those who are managing our data archives?
