


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#### INTRODUCTION

This monograph is a statistical summary of the society and the electoral geography of the Northern Territory 1974-1984. The sources of the statistics are the Census data of 1971, 1976 and 1981, and the elections of 1974, 1977, 1980 and 1983. The data for the 1971 and 1976 Censuses have been presented in summary form. The data from the 1981 census have been analysed in detail in relation to the latest election districts. The electoral data are of the elections for the Legislative Assembly which was established in 1974.

#### CONSTITUTIONAL BACKGROUND

From 1825 until 1863, the area which was to become the Northern Territory was part of the colony of New South Wales. In 1863, South Australia accepted "ownership" of the area and responsibility for its development. However, it was not until 1890 that adult males, and after 1894 all adults, were given a right to vote for two members in the South Australian House of Assembly. In 1901, adults in the Northern Territory received a Commonwealth franchise as part of the South Australian electorate of Grey.

On 1 January 1911, the Commonwealth government took control of the Northern Territory. All electoral franchise and parliamentary representation for Territorians were revoked. The Territory and its residents came under the direct control of the Commonwealth Minister for External Affairs, with local authority vested in an Administrator. Territorians had no direct participation in their political affairs.

The first cautious step by the national government to provide the Territory with its own political voice was taken in 1922 when the government allowed it one representative in the House of Representatives. For fourteen years this representative had no voting rights and was all but a non-member of parliament, but in 1936 he was granted the right to speak and, in the limited area of motions to disallow Northern Territory ordinances of the national government, to vote as well.

The first real step towards representative government was taken in 1947 by the Chifley government. But it was far from responsible government. The government passed an act creating a Legislative Council for the Northern Territory consisting of six elected and seven government-nominated members, presided over by the Administrator of the Territory who was given both a deliberative and a casting vote. The elected membership was enlarged until, at the end of the life of the Council in 1974, eleven members were elected, five from the Darwin area, one from the Alice Springs area and five from rural areas.

The Whitlam government established a Parliamentary committee in 1973 to report on measures that might be taken "to provide the Northern Territory with responsible self-government in relation to local affairs", and the government also indicated its intention to establish a fully elective Legislative Assembly by the end of 1974. However, the Committee's report was not released until one month after the elections which formed the first Assembly in September 1974.

Only 1 July 1978, the Northern Territory was granted self-government, with state-like functions, except in the area of uranium mining and Aboriginal

affairs, both of which remained the exclusive responsibility of the national government. By 1980, all other functions had been transferred to the Territory.

#### PARTY SYSTEM

Political parties did not emerge in the Northern Territory until well after they had become dominant in the states and in national politics. The differences of interest, opinion and ideology which were elsewhere being shaped into party differences by the turn of the century had little or no significance in the Territory if only because it was not self-administering and because its economy was rudimentary and its population small and dispersed. Party differences were irrelevant.

From 1922 to 1947 there was little incentive for political parties, with only one representative in Canberra. From 1947 to 1974 political parties competed for seats on the partly-elective Legislative Council, but its lack of authority was no incentive to party development.

Labor is the oldest and was for decades the only party. During the period of the part-elected Council Labor consistently held two, three or four of the seats. The party contest was complicated by the presence of independent Labor candidates and candidates endorsed separately by the North Australia Workers' Union (NAWU), as well as by a number of Independents.

In 1965 the Australian Country party formed a branch in the Territory, and in 1966 it won the federal seat. In 1966, the Liberal party formed a branch in Darwin, but virtually disappeared when it won no seats in the 1968 Council elections. Efforts were made to revitalise it in 1972, and in 1974, the Liberal and Country parties merged to form the Country Liberal Party.

Minor parties moved on and off the electoral stage. A North Australia party won a Council seat in 1965, but disappeared in 1968, and the Australia party contested in 1972. The Workers party contested the 1975 federal poll, and changed its name to Progress party in 1977. One candidate for the Communist party also stood in 1977. Three other minor parties contested the 1980 elections - the Australian Democrats the Australian Marijuana party and the Christian Democrat party.

#### FRANCHISE AND ELECTION SYSTEM

The inaugural election for the Legislative Assembly in 1974 was held on the basis of adult suffrage. Aborigines in the Territory were granted voluntary enrolment and voluntary voting, while non-Aboriginals were compelled to enrol and to vote, as in other Australian elections. The election system incorporated optional preferential voting for all electors.

The 1977 election was contested on redistributed boundaries, and the electoral act was changed to incorporate full, compulsory, preferential voting for all electors. Aborigines retained the right of voluntary enrolment but, if enrolled, were under compulsion to vote. In 1980, under a new electoral act, enrolment was made compulsory for Aboriginal citizens of eighteen years or more, and this applied for the 1980 election. The 1983 election was contested on a new electoral geography, but with the same electoral laws as in 1977 and 1980.

Two innovations in the Territory merit comment. The Australian Electoral Office in 1979 inaugurated a programme of electoral education for Aboriginal voters, and this has been intensified over time. The second innovation was the introduction of mobile polling places at the 1980 election. Mobile polling teams were used in six electorates in that election, and this overcame many of the problems of voting for outback residents, and Aborigines in particular.

#### Census Data


In Sections 5.0 to 7.0, a range of data from the 1971, 1976 and 1981 census has been summarised. The presentation is mainly in the form of percentages of responses, and the bases (N) of the calculations have been given. Note that the census question concerning religion was optional, and "If no religion, write 'None'".

#### SECTION 1.0 GEOGRAPHY AND POPULATION

# 1.1 POPULATION

The Northern Territory population underwent massive growth, following the Second World War.





The major population growth occured in the Darwin and Alice Springs urban areas.

With an area of over 1.3 million square kilometres, the Northern Territory comprises one sixth of the total land mass of the Australian continent. Yet, with only 130,000 people, it contains less than one per cent of the Australian population. The Territory faces major problems of transport and communications, (Alice Springs is 1300 km from Darwin), and Territorians face all of the problems associated with a sparsely settled population and widely separated communities. The Territory land forms range from the tropical north, through pastoral and agricultural land, to the harsh deserts of the centre. The NT population showed the fastest growth rate in Australia - 4.41 per cent in the five years to 1981, nearly four times the Australian average.





#### 1.2 URBAN AREAS


The two maps on the facing page show the urban development in the Darwin and Alice Springs areas in 1983. These provide a reference guide for the outline electorate maps in following sections.

The urban areas of Darwin have developed rapidly in the decade especially since Cyclone Tracy. The major "urban spread" has been in the northern and north-eastern suburbs. The "urban spread" in Alice Springs has occurred recently in the north-eastern and north-western suburbs.

The estimated population of the Greater Darwin area at 30 June 1974 was 46,656. The 1981 census found 57,212 persons. From 1976 to 1981, the Darwin population showed an annual rate of growth of 5.3 percent while that of Alice Springs was 5.0 percent.

The major growth in Darwin has been in the northern suburbs, in some instances with the numbers of dwellings and persons showing more than 100 percent increase in the five years between the 1976 and 1981 censuses. For example:

#### 1.3 ABORIGINAL LANDS


Out of the total population of 122,626 in the Northern Territory at the 1981 census 29,082 identified themselves as Aborigines or Torres Strait Islanders. In fact, it was not until the mid-1950s that Aborigines became the minority sector of the population. Aborigines have remained predominantly rural-dwellers: in the 1981 census, two thirds of Aboriginal self-identifiers resided in the rural areas.

The first real step in the struggle by Aborigines for ownership of traditional lands was the action by the Gurindji people at Wave Hill. While this action failed, it provided a spark for the lands rights movement, and convinced the Labor party to give a full commitment to land rights.

Following the 1972 election, the Whitlam government established the Woodward Commission and, after the first report in 1974, it established the Northern and Central Land Councils to coordinate land claims. The passage of the Aboriginal Land Rights Act of 1976 followed four years of investigation and argument. It established inalienable freehold ownership of existing reserves and some other lands, and provided an important legitimacy to the land rights movement.

The mechanics of a land claim are relatively straight forward. Aborigines have to prove traditional ownership before the Aboriginal Land Commissioner who then recommends to the national government that the land be declared Aboriginal. Obtaining the evidence on which traditional ownership can be proved is often the more difficult and complex task.

In 1983, approximately 40 percent of the total area of the Northern Territory is Aboriginal land, or currently under claim.



# SECTION 2.0 ELECTORAL GEOGRAPHY

This section sets out details of the boundaries and enrolments for the inaugural election of 1974, the redistributions carried out in 1977 and 1983, and four elections.

# 2.1 POPULATION AND ENROLMENT


The 1971 census counted 86,390 persons in the Northern Territory. The 1976 census counted 97,090 and the 1981 census 122,626 persons. That is, the total population is approximately equal to the adult population of one national electorate.


Enrolment figures also showed a rapid increase. While the major proportion of this increase was migration into the Territory, part is due to increased efforts to encourage Aborigines in the rural areas to enrol. Under an amendment to the Electoral Act 1980 enrolment was made compulsory for Aborigines.

The subdivision of this small adult population and smaller enrolment into 19 districts in 1974 and 1977, and into 25 districts in 1983, produced the lowest enrolments per electorate of any electoral system in Australia.

The maps show the growth in enrolment at the four elections. The NT outline is proportional to total population and the enrolment in the two main centres is also shown in proportion.





#### 2.2 RURAL BOUNDARY CHANGES


The inaugural 1974 distribution created eight rural electorates. All eight electorates contained a significant proportion of Aborigines. Three electorates included a town: Barkly (Tennant Creek and the mining settlement of Warrego); Elsey (Katherine); Nhulunbuy (Nhulunbuy): The electorate of Stuart was urban-rural, including the northern suburbs of Alice Springs in what was otherwise a rural electorate.

There were only minor changes to the rural electoral geography at the 1977 redistribution. Elsey and Stuart were contracted slightly with the growth of population in Katherine and Alice Springs, but the overall rural population changed only little. The annual growth rates 1976-81 were:

Aboriginal population, according to the census counts, increased from 23,381 in 1974 to 23,750 in 1976 and to 29,088 in 1981.

The 1983 redistribution increased the number of rural electorates from eight to nine, and removed the Alice Springs urban component from Stuart. A new electorate, Koolpinyah, was created in the rural fringe area of Darwin.




#### 2:3 DARWIN BOUNDARY CHANGES

Changes to electoral boundaries in the Darwin urban area were a necessary response to both population growth and the development of new suburbs. Historically it was not until the period 1960-65 that the area north of the airport saw any significant residential development. By 1974 half of Darwin's population lived north of the airport and by 1981 this figure had increased to 70 per cent.

The 1974 distribution allocated four electorates to the northside as well as part of Millner (which at this stage contained the airport and the RAAF base population). Old Darwin was allocated four and the southern balance of Millner.

The period 1974-76 saw Darwin's population drop in response to post-cyclone evacuation, from 47,906 at 26 June 1974 to 11,281 at 2 January 1975 and rise again to 43,344 by the 1976 census. A high proportion of both the returning residents and the new incoming population sought accommodation in the north eastern suburbs. The 1977 redistribution allocated 5 complete, and part of a sixth (the suburb of Coconut Grove in Ludmilla), electorates to the north. Old Darwin retained Stuart Park, Port Darwin, Fannie Bay and the balance of Ludmilla (containing the airport and RAAF base population).

In 1983 with the increase in size of the Legislature to 25, Darwin urban area (pop. 63,404) has 12 of the electorates, eight and a half (Ludmilla) classified 'northern'. Stuart Park of old Darwin is absorbed into Port Darwin, Fannie Bay and Berrimah, a new electorate and new host to the airport and RAAF base. Berrimah stretches in geographic extent south to Palmerston - Darwin's 'satellite' town 20 km south east of the G.P.O.



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
# 2.4 ALICE SPRINGS BOUNDARY CHANGES

The town of Alice Springs underwent rapid growth in the last two decades. In 1966, there were 6,390 people resident within the local government area. At the 1976 Census, this population had more than doubled to 14,149 and at the 1981 Census there were 17,885 people living in the area. In 15 years, the population had increased by 280 per cent, an annual growth rate of almost 19 per cent.

The original 1974 electoral boundaries divided the urban areas of Alice Springs almost equally between three electroates. Two were entirely within the local government area, the third, Stuart, contained the new northern suburban development and a huge rural area as well. The rural electorate of Macdonnell also included part of the local government area.

By the 1977 redistribution, the growth of population had been matched by a rapid housing and flat development in the west and north of the town. Gillen was consequently reduced in area.

At the 1983 redistribution, the local government boundary became the boundary of four electorates centred on the town. Continuing housing development in the north-east area allowed the creation of a separate electorate, named after the suburb of Sadadeen, and the urban area was divided between the four electorates.



# 2.5 1974 DISTRIBUTION

A distribution committee of three members was established by the Minister for the Northern Territory in early 1974. This committee made it known that it was considering an electoral geography based on 19 single-member districts. Its terms of reference required it to take into account the distribution of population, community or diversity of interest, physical features, and means of communication, when drawing the boundaries. These criteria, similar to those of committees elsewhere, were vague, and this was compounded by the particular demography and social structure of the Territory. Even if the criterion "distribution of population" was to be interpreted as enrolments, there was the difficulty of the lack of an accurate census of Aboriginal communities, let alone an accurate census of those enrolled.


The Committee released its report on 7 August, considered seven proposals for mendment, and made its final report on 9 September 1974. The electoral geography establised nine districts in Darwin, two (and part of Stuart) in Alice Springs, and eight (with part of Stuart) in the rural areas. Stuart was not the only rural district which contained a substantial urban area: Nhulunbuy contained the mining town of the same name, Elsey included the town of Katherine, and Barkly included Tennant Creek and the mining settlements around Warrego. The Committee also noted the probability of under-enrolment of Aborigines, and allowed for growth in the respective districts.

# 2.6 1977 REDISTRIBUTION

On 15 March 1977, the Minister for the Northern Territory appointed a redistribution committee. The redistribution proposal after only three years, was justified not only by the changes in population in Darwin and Alice Springs, but also because of the reconstruction of Darwin after cyclone Tracy. The new electoral geography was appointed by the Minister on 28 June.

There were some minor changes in the rural areas - some districts were enlarged, others reduced in size. The boundary of urban Darwin was extended slightly, and a larger proportion of urban Alice Springs was transferred to the rural electorate of Stuart. This latter change provided the situation where approximately 60 per cent of the enrolment was in the urban section.

Major changes were carried out in the Darwin electoral geography, with the electorates of Millner, Ludmilla, Jingili and Sanderson being the most affected. Only three electorates - Alice Springs, Macdonnell and Victoria River - remained unchanged.



The impact of cyclone Tracy is shown by comparative enrolment figures. The rural areas increased by over 4,000 (mainly due to increased efforts to encourage Aborigines to enrol) while enrolments in the Darwin area actually decreased 1974-77.

# 2.7 - 1983 REDISTRIBUTION

A redistribution was justified in terms of population growth and demographic movements. In December 1982, the range of enrolments in the existing districts was from 1,711 in Port Darwin to 6,531 in Sanderson.


However, the decision of the NT government to enlarge the Legislative Assembly from 19 to 25 seats forced a totally new electoral geography rather than changes to boundaries within the regions.


As with the 1974 distribution and the 1977 redistributions, the Electoral Commission of three members received submissions, released a report, received objections, and forwarded its final recommendations to the Legislature. In 1983, however, it was a fully-NT process, under an NT Act.

The changes produced an entirely new electoral map. The Darwin urban area was increased from 9 to 12 electorates, the Alice Springs area from two (and part of Stuart) to four wholly urban electorates, and the rural electorates from eight (including part of Stuart) to nine.



Map 3.4 Turnout 1983






### SECTION 7.0 1981 CENSUS, 1983 REDISTRIBUTION


Tables 7.1 to 7.11 , and the associated maps, transpose 1981 Census data onto the electorates formed at the 1983 redistribution.

The data presented are selected only. Some data are rapidly dated (such as income per family and unemployment) and have been omitted for that reason.

Some data included has been suggested in studies elsewhere to have significant levels of correlation with patterns of party support: age, religion, occupation, place of birth, industry and government/private employment have been included on that ground.

Data concerning Aborigines have been included because of the significance of Aborigines in the Northern Territory society and polity.

The data have been mapped on the basis of electorates, but showing electoral boundaries only where the symbols used to indicate a range are different.






MAP 7.9 Owner/Purchaser as Percentage of Total Indentified Households










