This return appeared annualy in the Emigration Commissioners reports from 1853 and provided ethnic totals to all major destinations. The statistics dealing with Australia — "To the Australian Colonies" — included New Zealand. The NZ figures have been extracted from the above table by reference to another set of annual returns to the Commissioners — "A Return of the Emigrants who embarked from the Ports of the United Kingdom during the Year ended ... framed from Statements by the Emigration Officers and Officers of Customs at the several Ports". This return provided details of the numbers, but not the U.K. regional origins, of those embarking for specific overseas destinations. I have assumed that perhaps 10% of the NZ emigrants were Irish, although this may well be an over estimate. Thus 10% of the total NZ figure has been subtracted from the Commissioners' Australian Irish emigrant total for each year from 1853 on to provide an Irish emigrant figure for Australia only. The remaining 90% of the NZ emigrants were assumed to have come from the British mainland and the British mainland yearly emigrant total for Australia adjusted accordingly.



This table attempts to give as accurate a figure as possible for immigrant arrivals from the U.K. within the boundaries of the current State of N.S.W. by combining a number of statistical sources:-

Assisted: from 1848 this is an adjusted figure based on subtracting the the assisted immigrants landed at Moreton Bay from the year total in the Immigration Agent's Reports.

Irish assisted: figures for 1839 to 1845 are from the Immigration Agent's Reports and those for 1848 to 1870 from the Irish Immigrant Data Base, 1848-1870. All assisted immigrants were landed at Sydney except for those on three ships in 1855 which went to Newcastle and one in 1849 which went

to Twofold Bay.

The unassisted figures for 1838 to 1847 are for Sydney only. For the period 1848 to 1859 inclusive they include the Moreton Bay settlement which on 1 December 1859 became the Colony of Queensland. It is unlikely that many unassisted passengers arrived at Moreton Bay during those years.

For these three years the Immigration Agent included arrivals from other colonies in the yearly tables for unnassisted arrivals from the U.K. In his 1863 report Agent Wise corrected this by removing these figures from his annual table dealing with yearly arrivals from the U.K. back to 1838. However he published only the aggregate figure he subtracted from the 1838-1862 total to give the real figure for total unassisted arrivals between these years. Consequently only the total unassisted figure for 1856-1858 is available.

Percent. U.K. unassist. immig. to Syd. from Eng, Scot, Ireland, 1848-52 Figure 1.5







The Commissioners probably included in the U.K. selected figure the 808 Donegal emigrants who came out under the auspices of the Donegal Relief Committee of N.S.W. They were selected in Donegal by the Committee's U.K. agent but had been nominated in Sydney by the Committee under the remittance regulations. A more realistic figure for 1859 therefore would be:

General Emigrants = 10% Remittance Emigrants = 90%.

This would give an overall return for the period 1852-1861 as follows:

General Emigrants = 51% Remittance Emigrants = 49%.




Figure 2.8 Ports of Embarkation in U.K.Used by Assisted Emigrants from County Fermanagh, 1848-1870<sup>1</sup>



Figure 2.12 Groups in which emigrants from Clonoulty, Tip. travelled to Sydney, 1848-68




Figure 2.12 Groups in which emigrants from Quin, Co.Clare travelled to Sydney, 1848-1868



INSTRUCTIONS to the Matron of the Institution at Hyde Park Barracks.

#### REGULATIONS for INMATES.

1. No persons shall be received as inmates of the institution except those whose admission has been authorised in writing by the agent for immigration, or, in his absence, by the chief clerk of the department.

2. The matron will see that all the inmates of the institution, except such as may be ill, are up and dressed by six o'clock, a.m., in the summer mornings, and seven, a.m., in the winter mornings.

3. The matron will see also that the inmates sit to their meals in an orderly manner.

4. Breakfast shall be ready at eight o'clock, a.m., dinner at one, and tea or supper by six, p.m., each day.

5. The matron will see that the mess utensils are cleaned after each meal, and placed in

order on the shelves appropriated for that purpose.

6. All the inmates must retire to rest at nine o'clock, and all the lights in the institution must be out by ten o'clock, p.m., except those in the private apartments of the matron, and such lights as may be necessary in any apartment occupied by sick inmates; but in the latter case the lights must be placed in proper lanterns, from which they are on no account to be removed.

7. The rooms must be cleaned out each day, and the beds and bedding properly folded, so that the bed-room shall be always ready for inspection by 12 o'clock of noon of each day, after which hour the bed-rooms are to be locked, and no one admitted therein until bed-time.

8. The inmates of the institution will, except during hiring hours, occupy the dining-room during the day, where they are to be permitted to employ themselves at sewing, reading, &c.

9. Monday and Tuesday shall be the usual washing days; but this rule will not be held to apply to immigrants received into the institution from immigrant ships on or subsequent

to those days.

10. The matron will be at liberty to give each newly arrived immigrant inmate of the institution leave to absent herself therefrom for two hours each alternate day during her stay in the institution, provided no such permissions extend beyond four o'clock in the afternoon of any day, and further that they are altogether withheld in respect to any females who do not return to the institution within the two hours allowed to them by the matron.

### COMMUNICATION WITH INMATES.

11. No person is to be permitted to see or communicate with any of the inmates, without the written authority of the agent for immigration, or, in his absence, of the chief clerk of the department.

12. Should an order be given by the agent for immigration, or, in his absence, by the chief clerk, empowering any person to communicate with an inmate of the building, such person is to be directed to the hiring room, and the matron will inform the party who is authorised to be seen accordingly. The matron will take care that no other inmate of the authorised to be seen accordingly. The matron will take care that no other inmate institution is present on such occasions but those authorised to be communicated with

### HIRING OF INMATES.

13. The matron will not see any person relative to the hiring of servants, except between the hours of two and four o'clock each day.

14. The matron will see that all the inmates eligible for engagement are prepared to see applicants for servants at all times between the hours of two and four o'clock, p. m., during which hours they will be required to remain in the hiring room.

27.16. All applicants for servants must be provided with orders of admission to the hiring room from the office before the matron permits the servants to be seen by them; and no order shall be considered valid by the matron which does not bear the date of the day on which it is presented to her.

·16. The matron will be required to draw up and witness the agreements entered into on all days but those publicly notified as hiring days, and she will forward without delay the triplicate copy of each agreement so drawn up to the office for record there.

17. The matron will immediately report the names of any of the inmates who refuse eligible offers of employment, in order that steps may be taken for their removal from the

18. The matron will not on any account permit any inmate of the institution to remove her luggage from thence until she has obtained an order to that effect from the office.

### SERVANTS OUT OF PLACE.

19. The matron must not consider herself at liberty to afford the protection of the institution to any servants out of place, without the written order of the agent for immigration, or, in his absence, of the chief clerk of the department.

20. The matron will not recommend any servants out of place, whether under the protection of the Government or not, for employment, without first reporting the names of nch servants to the agent for immigration, and submitting their discharges from their places where they had been last in service.

21. The matron will take care that such servants are not recommended to the service of any persons whose names are not in the list of approved applicants for servants in the office of this department; and, further, she will see that agreements are drawn up in respect to them, in the same manner as for newly-arrived immigrants.

Before 10 o'clock on the morning of Tuesday, the Twelfth instant, or at any other times than those fixed, as above stated, for the hiring of the Immigrants, no stranger or person in quest of servants will be admitted, or allowed to remain on board. Strict orders have been given to the Policeman on duty in the Ship, to enforce the observance of this rule.

All applications for servants must be made to the Surgeon Superintendent on board, and the Immigrants will be cautioned against hiring themselves to any person without his sanction, and without a formal agreement, to be signed by the two contracting parties, and witnessed by an Officer of the Immigration Department, who will attend on board of the ship for the purpose.

Before sanctioning any engagement, the Surgeon Superintendent will be required to satisfy himself of the respectability of the hiring party; either by reference to the Officer of the Immigration Department who will be in attendance, or by such other

means of enquiry as may be available.

No stranger will be allowed to visit the 'tween decks of the vessel unless accompanied by the Surgeon Superintendent. Any person infringing this rule will be ordered to quit the ship forthwith.

The Ship will be anchored at the entrance of Sydney Cove, and will be provided with an external accommodation ladder.

The unmarried females (about twenty-five in number) will be landed from the vessel, and lodged in the Depôt at Hyde Park Barracks, where they can be hired between the hours of 2 and 4 p.m., on Tuesday, the Twelfth instant, by employers whose respectability is known at the Immigration Office, or who bring introductory letters from persons of known respectability, provided that such employers do not keep inns or other bouses of public entertainment.

I, the undersigned, in consideration of a passage being provided for me, and (as the case may be) my wife and family, by Her Majesty's Emigration Commissioners, at the expense of the Colony of New South Wales, bind myself either to repay to the Immigration Agent of that Golony, for the time being, the sum of in sterling British Money, within fourteen days after my arrival in the said Colony, or to take service with any employer in the said Colony, with whom I may agree during that period, and who shall be approved of by the said Immigration Agent, and shall forthwith pay to him one half of the said sum, and shall bindchimself to pay the residue thereof to the Immigration Agent for the time being in twelve calendar months or within any shorter period of the date of such employment. And in default of my making prescribed by law or the Regulations of the Government. I hereby agree and bind myself to take such other employment and to accept such wages as the said Immigration Agent may procure for me and my family respectively said. I hereby give him full power and authority with on without my future consent, to sign on my behalf a contract of service with any employer whom he may select on my behalf, for the term of two years, to be computed from the date of such contract, it being always understood that any such employer shall be at liberty to deduct from any wages that may accrue or become due to me, during the said term, at the rate of one-eighth of the said sum in each three calendar months of such service; and further, that at any time after the expiration of the first year thereof, I shall be at liberty, on giving my employer three calendar months' previous notice, to put and end to such contract and service by paying up the balance of the said sum then due by me for my passage.











Map 5.1: Location of parish of Clonoulty, County Tipperary.



- Two types of "parish" unit existed in 19th century Tipperary; the "civil parish" and the "Roman Catholic" parish. In general civil parishes were the ancient medieval parishes of Ireland whose boundaries were used in the 19th century for the civil census. Roman Catholic parishes were largely the creation of the re-emergent Catholic church in the decades immediately before and after Catholic Emancipation in 1829. There thus developed a bewildering patchwork of Catholic parishes whose boundaries often ran across those of civil parishes and even larger baronial units. The Roman Catholic Parish of Clonoulty consisted of the complete civil parish of Clogher, all of the civil parish of Clonoulty except for a small portion of the townland of Glenough Upper allocated to the Catholic Parish of Upperchurch. This, the largest portion of the parish, lay within the boundary of the Barony of Kilnamanagh Lower. However, it also consisted of three other townlands; Lisbook and Ballycamus in the civil parish of Holycross in the adjacent Barony of Eliogarty, and Clonbonane, a detached townland of the civil parish of Clonoulty in the Barony of Clanwilliam. In general on the N.S.W. assisted passage lists, when asked for their place of birth, Irish Roman Catholics gave their Catholic Parish; thus those from the civil parish of Clogher or the townlands of Lisbook and Ballycamus usually identified themselves as being from Clonoulty. This composite parish structure, combined with the way in which the official Census figures were presented in 1821 and 1831, makes it virtually impossible to arrive at an accurate population figure for the Catholic parish of Clonoulty during those years. Townland figures are available from 1841 on allowing for the subsequent inclusion of Lisbook and Ballycamus. However there is no way of establishing how many people were living in the Upperchurch portion of Glenough Upper and they are included in the figure for the Catholic Parish of Clonoulty. Moreover the 1821 Census is silent on the question of whether or not the detached townland of Clonbonane was included in the civil parish figure. Despite this at least ninety percent of the Catholic Parish lay within the civil parishes of Clonoulty and Clogher and the population figures presented here are probably within a couple of percentage points of the real figure.
- The 1821 and 1831 figures are for the combined civil parishes of Clonoulty and Clogher. Figures from 1841 on include the townlands of Ballycamus and Lisbook in Holycross parish and the detached Clonoulty townland of Clonbonane in Clanwilliam barony.




Figure 5.4: Population Densities per 100 Acres in County Tipperary, 1841. W.Nolan (ed), <u>Tipperary: History and Society</u> Dublin, 1985, p.312.







#### Appeal.

Countrymen and Fellow-Christians—In the wilds of Donegal, down in the bogs and glens of Gweedore and Cloughaneely, thousands upon thousands of human beings, made after the image and likeness of God, are perishing, or next to perishing, amid squalidness and misery, for want of food and clothing, far away from human aid and pity. On behalf of these famishing victims of oppression and persecution, we venture to appeal to your kind sympathies and religious feelings, and hope that, for the sake of Him who bore our infirmities, you will share with us their distress by lending some substantial assistance to enable us to relieve their wretchedness, and rescue them from death and starvation. The ground of this appeal is simple, and may be thus simply told:—

The districts of Gweedore and Cloughaneely are the bleakest and most mountainous in Donegal or in Ireland. The entire surface is broken up by huge, abrupt, and irregular hills of granite, covered with a texture of stunted heath, while the space between is but a shaking and spongy marsh. The inhabitants of these wilds are all Celts of the "pure old race, with the pure old faith," who cultivate small patches of arable land along the shores or claddagh, on which their wretched cabins are built, and subsist principally by rearing stock and grazing sheep on the steep sides of their mountains and in their hollow glens. The increase of the flocks they sold to meet the landlord's rent and the other exigencies of life; while of the wool of their sheep they manufactured frieze and tammy as clothing for the male and female members of their families respectively. Thus, from time immemorial, they lived in the enjoyment of these wild mountains, leading a most innocent and peaceable rural life, warm and faithful in their friendships, while their attachment to the old faith was stronger than death. Last year brought a sad change on these warm-hearted peasants. All the landlords of these districts, save one, simultaneously deprived them of their mountains, giving them to Scotch and English graziers for sheep-walks, and, at the same time, doubled, trebled, and in many instances quadrupled, the rents on the miserable patches left them. These mountains, so unjustly pressed from the unfortunate natives, were peopled with Scotch and English sheep. But, sadder still, the strange sheep imported to these mountains throve not. Last winter was very prejudicial to sheep, particularly under Scotch treatment; the Donegal mountains proved treacherous, and their tracts devious to strangers. The sheep recently placed on this strange pasturage were prone, from their natural instinct, to wander, and the Scotch shepherds were supinely negligent in the duties of their calling. The natural consequence was that large numbers of the sheep strayed; large numbers of them were lost in bog-holes; and large numbers perished through the inclemency of the winter and the want of proper care. During the penal laws, we are told that grand jury levies were made upon Irish catholics for losses sustained by protestant merchants at the hands of catholic powers with whom England might happen to be then at war. It must have been in the same spirit that, in order to recompense these losses of the Scotch and English graziers, an enormous and unjust grand jury warrant was obtained against these innocent Celts. And in order, moreover, to carry out this iniquitous enactment, and the more effectually to secure the adverse and unjust possession of these mountains, an extra force of constabulary was, at the instance of these landlords, ordered to these districts, for whose support a most ruinous tax has been imposed on the wretched inhabitants. In short, by those and similarly unjust and arbitrary proceedings, the sum of about 3,000 l. has been levied on the poorest and most miserable district on God's earth. Already the law officials, backed by 300 constabulary, have, at the bayonet's point, collected the last farthing of this enormously disproportioned levy. The poor shivering and famishing peasants, under the terror of an armed force, wielded by officials without feeling or humanity, were obliged to sell their little scanty bins of potatoes and small stacks of rye and corn, to meet this merciless demand. It is almost incredible the means these poor creatures resorted to, in order to make up the necessary sum. Many went 30 miles to borrow or beg the money from their friends; many sold their kitchen furniture and utensils; and even mothers were known to have sold their cradles. It was, truly, a sight to make angels weep, to see the poor helpless fathers, amidst the tears and wailings of their more helpless wives and hungry children, parting with the last stone of their potatoes and other necessaries of life to pay this iniquitous tax. The stalwart and robust peasantry could do nothing but weep, the womanly hearts of the mothers were wrung with agony, and the ragged children, poor innocent things, bewailed, in loud cries and convulsive sobs, their forlorn lot. And we, who witnessed these scenes of woe, are not ashamed to confess that we too shed tears, unavailing tears, of pity and sympathy for them. But there was no remedy. Like Herod's savage massacre of the Innocents, the warrant was unfeelingly executed. The foul and dastardly deed was perpetrated, consummated. And thus the food of some thousand families has been swept away, and their only means of supporting and clothing themselves cruelly pressed from them. Whether the object of the landlord's harsh and tyrannical treatment to these poor peasants is to crush them out, or wring from them a larger revenue, we will not stop to inquire; but we have no hesitation in saying that, unless they are assisted in

their present distress, they must sink under the weight of their misery, must be blotted out Appendix, No. 1. of existence, and that their once happy homes will become walks for Scotch and English hoggets. They are now, at all events, in consequence of such treatment, perishing of hunger and nakedness, in their damp and comfortless cabins. But we will venture a little into detail:-

There are at this moment 800 families subsisting on seaweed, crabs, cockles, or any other edible matter they can pick up along the seashore or scrape off the rocks. There are about 600 adults of both sexes who, through sheer poverty, are now going barefooted, amidst the inclemency of the season, on this bleak northern coast. There are about 700 families that have neither bed nor bed-clothes, but are forced to lie on the cold damp earth in the rags worn by them during the day. There are about 800 families without a second bed, fathers and mothers, sons and daughters, being huddled together as best they can. Thousands of the male population have only one cotton shirt, and wear none while it is being washed, while thousands have not even one. The females are still in a worse condition. There are about 400 families, in which there may be half-a-dozen of full-grown females, who have only one dress among them in which they can appear in public; mothers and daughters alternately using this common wardrobe when they go out of doors. There are about 600 families who have now neither cow, sheep, nor goat, and who, from the beginning of the year to its close, hardly ever know the taste of milk or butter. There are thousands of youths, of both sexes, verging on the age of puberty, who are so partially and scantily clothed that modesty forbids one to look at them; they are only objects for the eye of charity. We will not, though we could, go further into particulars, but on behalf of those, and these, and all appeal for funds to enable us to assist them in their respective wants. And we appeal in the name of Him who said, "Deal thy bread to the hungry," "Clothe the naked," "Give drink to the thirsty," "Sell what you possess, and give alms to the The Son of God asks your alms in the person of those perishing peasants. He is hungry; will you give him to eat? He is thirsty; will you give him to drink? naked; will you clothe him? Do it to them, and you do it to Him. For he says Himself, "For as long as you did it to one of these, my least brethren, you did it to me." We appeal, to fathers and mothers, with fond and promising children, and request that "as you would that others would act to your children if they were in want, act you to the desolate families in the wilds of Donegal." We appeal to the chaste and virtuous young ladies of Ireland, and say, "as you value that priceless ornament of your sex, maiden modesty, and as you know what it is to put female delicacy rudely to the blush, for want of sufficient clothing, grant us of your superfluous dresses wherewith to enable us to buy plain dresses for these half-dressed girls of Donegal. Both we and they will pray that God may screen you from all shame and confusion." And finally, before all, and beyond all, we appeal to the patriotic young men of Ireland. This fine old Celtic race is about being crushed aside to make room for Scotch and English sheep. We appeal to your noble and generous feelings, as men and patriots, to assist us in our efforts to prevent their total extinction. We declare it in the face of the world as our solemn conviction that in the sight of God and man, there is not a more precious offering than alms from the patriot's muscular hand, when given for the love of country and the relief of his kind.

## REPORT.

THE SELECT COMMITTEE appointed to inquire into the Destitution alleged to exist in the Gweedore and Cloughaneely District, in the County of Donegal, have considered the matter to them referred, and agreed to the following REPORT:

THAT the district of Gweedore and Cloughaneely is a wild and mountainous tract of country, inhabited, for the most part, by tenants holding small

portions of land.

That there are among them many who are very needy, who, on any failure of their crops, are subject to more or less distress and poverty in consequence at one portion of the year; but at the present time it appears to Your Committee that destitution, such as is complained of in the Appeal of 8 January 1858, contained in the Appendix, did not, and does not exist, and that the general condition of the people is certainly not worse now than it has been for many years, nor does it appear to your Committee that there was, during the winter of 1857 and 1858, any increase of sickness in the district, or any increase in the number of applications for admission to the workhouse.

That this poverty among the people is not attributable to the landlords. No attempt has been made to drive the tenants from their holdings, or to take from them any lands over which they had any real rights; and it has been proved before Your Committee that the statement in the Appeal—"Last year brought a sad change on these warm-hearted peasants. All the landlords of these districts, save one, simultaneously deprived them of the mountains, giving them to Scotch and English graziers for sheep-walks, and at the same time doubled, trebled, and, in many instances quadrupled, the rents on the miserable patches left to them," is totally devoid of foundation.

Your Committee have also had under their consideration the following statements made in the Appeal: "Countrymen and Fellow-Christians,-In the wilds of Donegal, down in the bogs and glens of Gweedore and Cloughaneely, thousands upon thousands of human beings, made after the image and likeness of God, are perishing, or next to perishing, amid squalidness and misery, for want of food and clothing, far away from human aid and pity;" and, "They are now, at all events, in consequence of such treatment, perishing of hunger and nakedness, in their damp and comfortless cabins. But we will venture a little into detail: There are at this moment 800 families subsisting on sea-weed, crabs, cockles, or any other edible matter they can pick up along the sea-shore, or scrape off the rocks." In the opinion of Your Committee, those statements are not borne out by the evidence taken before them; and Your Committee have come to the conclusion that those representations are calculated to convey to the public a false and erroneous impression of the state of the people of this district.

It appears to Your Committee that an erroneous opinion exists in the minds of the people as to their rights over the mountains near which they reside, and that their not being well-advised on this point has led to the outrages which have been committed, and to the destruction of a large number of sheep, which brought upon the inhabitants of the district the sheep and police tax; a burthen which no doubt pressed heavily upon them, but it was paid readily in money, and no stock or produce was sold under distress for the purpose of paying those

taxes.

Your Committee trust that this expression of their opinion will show to the people of the district that such conduct is not only contrary to the laws of God and man, but positively cruel to their helpless families, and fatal to their own best interests.

In line with the Commissioners' general regulations nominees were divided into two categories. In category A were the most desirable emigrants - farm labourers, domestic servants, etc. - requiring the lowest deposits and in category B were the skilled tradesmen, carpenters etc.

The Passenger Act of 1855 redefined an adult as anyone aged 12 and above. Consequently adult deposits under the remittance regulations from 1856 began at age 12.

IS Excellency the Governor, with the advice of the Executive Council, has been pleased to establish the following Regulations for Assisted Immigration, under the Act, 24 Vict., No. 26:—

Any person resident in the Colony, who may be desirous of introducing from the United Kingdom Immigrants of the laboring classes, will be permitted to do so on making the following deposits, and subject to the conditions hereinafter

2. Such deposits must be made, if in Sydney, at the Government Immigration Office, between the hours of 10 a.m. and half-past 2 p.m., and if in the Country Districts, with the Clerks of Petty Sessions during the usual office hours. Any sums which depositors desire to add for the purpose of providing for their nominees the outfit required by the Immigration Commissioners in London, will be received at the same time, and transmitted to the Commissioners. The estimated cost of such outfit for an adult is about £3.

3. The Immigrants must be brought out in ships chartered by Her Majesty's Emigration Commissioners in London, and the Depositor will be required to afford all such information respecting the Immigrants he proposes to introduce, as may be necessary to enable the Agent for Immigration or Clerk of Petty Sessions to comply with his application, and the requirements of these Regulations.

4. The persons eligible under these Regulations are mechanics of every description, domestic servants, and all persons of the laboring class. They must be of sound mental and bodily health, and of good moral character.

5. No advantage will be allowed in respect of any person brought out as a cabin or intermediate

Passenger.

6. Passages will not be granted under these Regulations to children under 15 years of age, unless forming part of a family, or unless their parents be resident in the Colony.

7. Depositors must undertake to provide for the Immigrants they introduce after the expiration of ten days from the time of their arrival, or pay to the Government for their subsistence at the rate of 1s. per day for each adult, or half that amount for each child under the age of 12 years, so long as they may be maintained at the public expense after

the expiration of that period.

8. In the event of any person nominated for a passage, declining to emigrate, or in case the amount deposited shall exceed that required for the number of Immigrants actually introduced, the amount deposited, or the excess, as the case may be, will be returned to the depositor upon receipt in the Colony of the Emigration Commissioners'

report recommending its refundment.

9. The Clerks of Petty Sessions on receipt of any deposit under these Regulations, will immediately remit the amount to the Agent for Immigration at Sydney, with a statement of the number and description of Immigrants whom the depositor wishes to introduce. The Agent for Immigration will thereupon prepare and forward to the Clerk of Petty Sessions, for delivery to the depositor, a Passage Certificate. Similiar Certificates will be issued to depositors in Sydney on payment of their deposits to the Agent for Immigration.

10. The Passage Certificate must be forwarded by the depositor to his friends or agents in the United the depositor to his friends or agents in the United Kingdom, and it must in every case be produced within twelve months from the date of it to Her Majesty's Emigration Commissioners in London, who will provide passages to the Colony for the Immigrants proposed to be introduced.

11. Forms of application, as well as all other information for the guidance of depositors, can be obtained from the several Clerks of Petty Sessions in the Country Districts on in Sydney at the Office.

4th.—If any of the parties do not come forward to take the Passages secured to them by this Certificate, the money which has been paid for them will be returned to the depositor in the Colony, provided that due notice be given to the Commissioners of their intention not to proceed.—If none of the parties intend to proceed, this Certificate should be at once forwarded to the Commissioners, with an intimation to that effect.





Parent and relations in colony data exist for only one ship from 1860 to 1862. All of the immigrants for whom no relationship to their nominator can be specified arrived during that period. It is unlikely that these relationships differed considerably from those in earlier or subsequent years.
