AUSTRALIAN PARLIAMENTS

The Legislature of the Commonwealth and of each State except Queensland is bicameral, consisting of an Upper and a Lower House. In Queensland the Upper House was abolished in 1922. In the Commonwealth Parliament the Upper House is known as the Senate and the Lower as the House of Representatives; in the bicameral States the Upper House is known as the Legislative Council and the Lower House, in New South Wales, Victoria, and Western Australia, as the Legislative Assembly (which is also the name of the Queensland Parliament) and, in South Australia and Tasmania, as the House of Assembly.

Adult suffrage for British subjects with the necessary residential qualifications prevails in respect of both Commonwealth Houses and the State Lower Houses. Voting is compulsory. A British subject member of the Defence Forces of the Commonwealth on service outside Australia is entitled to vote at Commonwealth elections whether enrolled or not, if he has lived in Australia for six months continuously. In 1966 the franchise was extended to entitle a person who is less than twenty-one years of age who has lived in Australia for six months continuously and who is or has been, on 'special service' outside Australia as a member of the Defence Force to vote at elections as if his name appeared on the roll. Some property or special qualification is required for electors for the Legislative Councils in South Australia and Tasmania. In New South Wales the Council is elected by members of both Houses at simultaneous sittings, and in Victoria and Western Australia adult suffrage operates.

Membership of both Commonwealth Houses is open to adult British subjects with three years' residence in Australia and qualified as electors. In the State Lower Houses the requirements for membership are similar, but with varying periods of residence. For membership of the State Upper Houses in some States a candidate must have, as well as more general qualifications, a minimum age of 25 or 30 years.

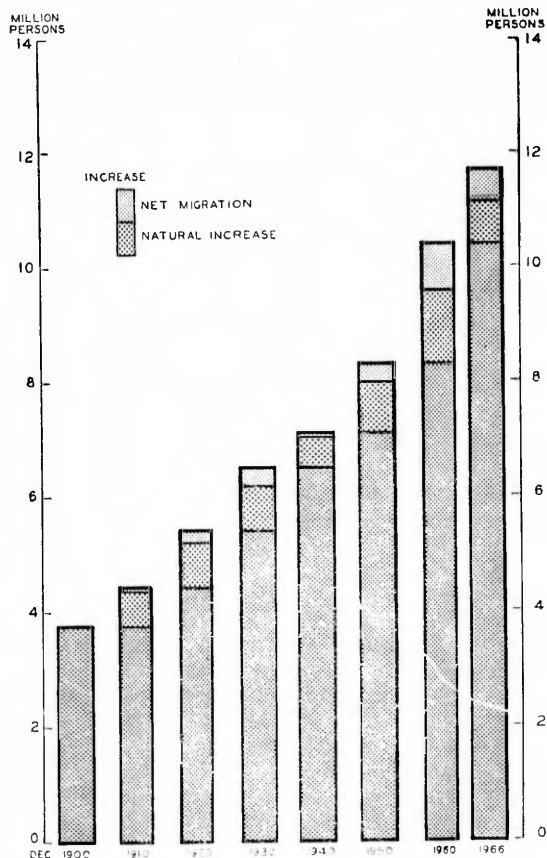

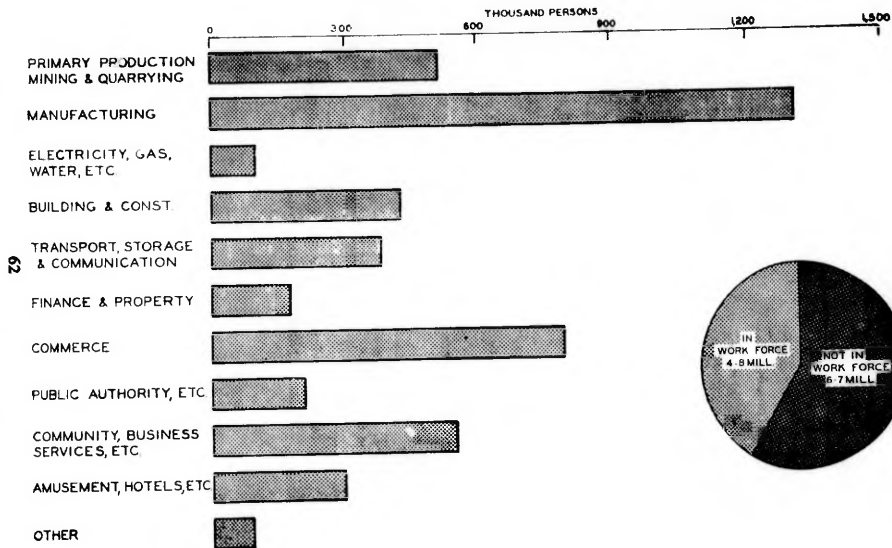

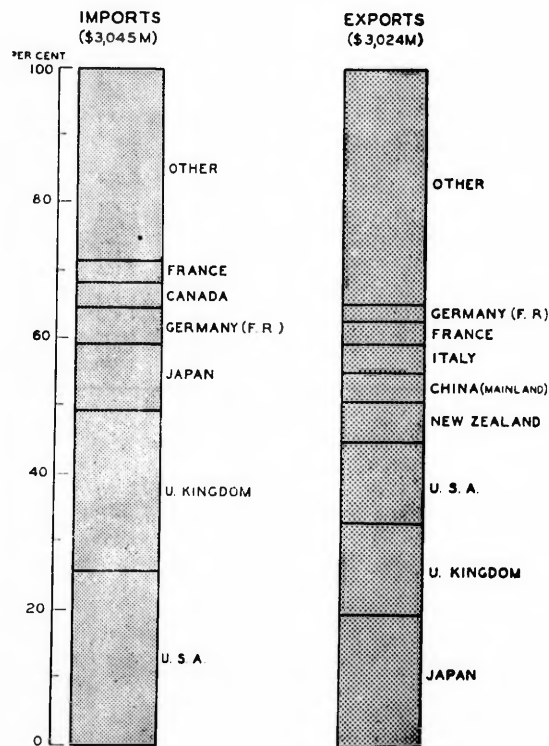

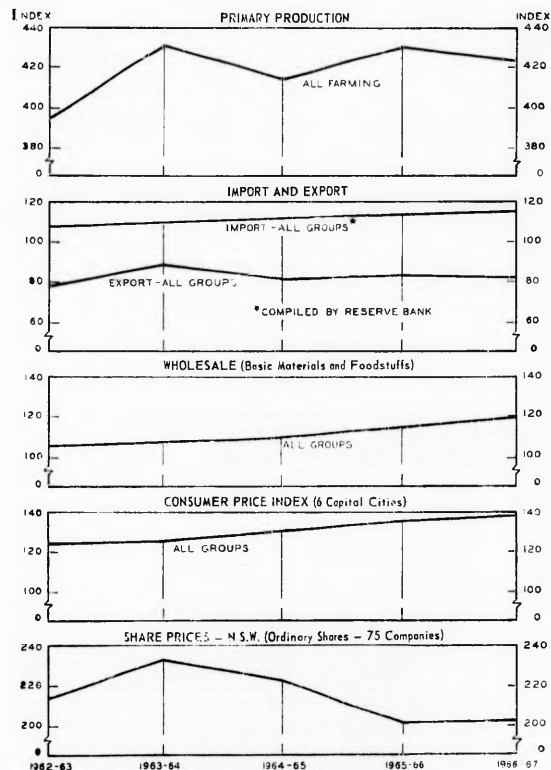

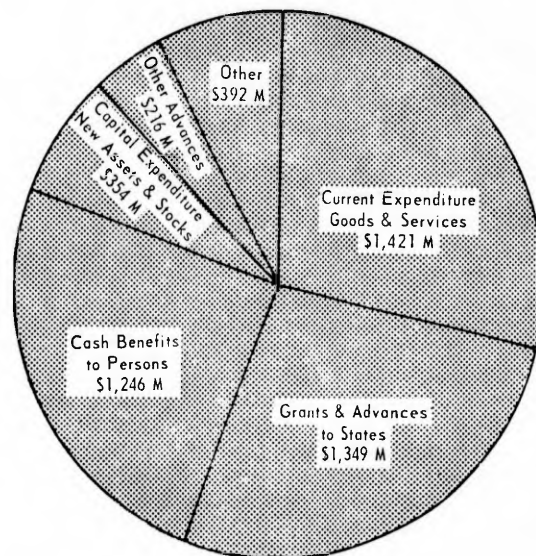

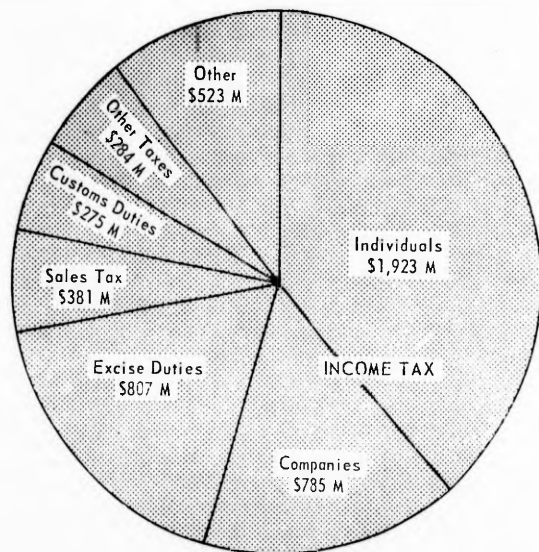

Payment of tax

(i) Employees pay the tax as a deduction from wages. Deductions in 1967-68 will be used to pay tax on 1967-68 income. Any difference between the deductions and the tax assessed will be adjusted by cash payment. The scale of weekly deductions is available at all Post Offices.

(ii) Non-employees in 1967-68 will pay a provisional tax on that year's income. The 1967-68 provisional tax will be adjusted in 1968-69 when the actual tax on 1967-68 income is known.

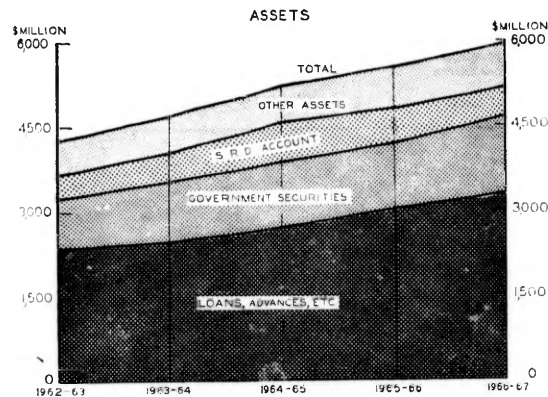
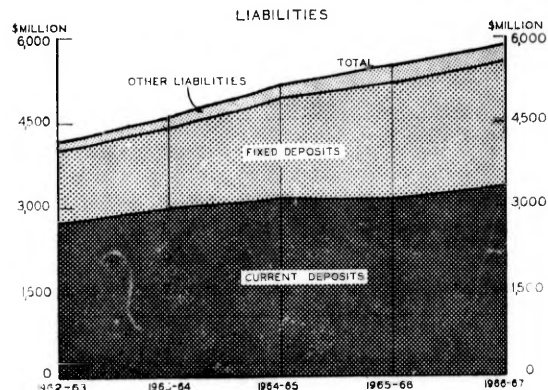

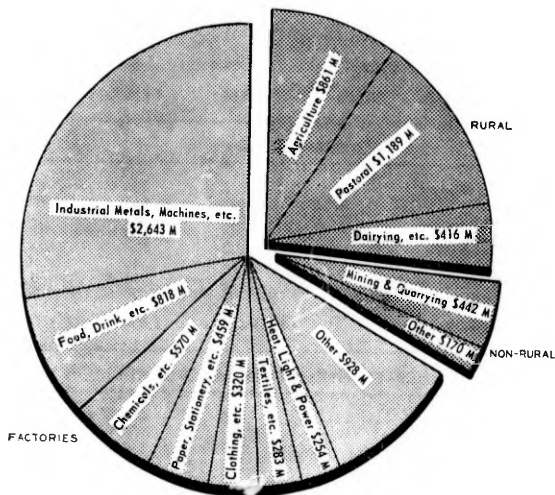

AIR MAIL RATES

Internal Service

All articles including parcels may be sent by air mail within Australia and to the Territories. Where an air service is available and its use would speed delivery, enveloped mail and unenclosed postcards will be carried by air within Australia and its Territories at no charge other than ordinary postage, provided: (i) thickness does not exceed $\frac{1}{4}$ in (ii) sizes fall between $3\frac{1}{2}$ in x $5\frac{1}{2}$ in and $4\frac{1}{2}$ in x $9\frac{1}{2}$ in (iii) the envelope or postcard is rectangular with a ratio of sides of 1 to not less than 1.414.

For all other articles an air mail fee of 3c per oz is required in addition to ordinary postage.

Overseas service

All categories of postal articles including parcels may be sent by air mail to most overseas countries.

Aerogrammes must be written on the special lightweight aerogramme forms obtainable at post offices, price 10c each including postage.

The inclusive postage and airmail fees for letters, other articles, and parcels are shown below. The fees for postcards and greetings cards are generally half the letter rate.

POSTAL ORDERS

The postal order service was introduced in June 1966. Postal orders have fixed values up to \$8 and the denominations are so arranged that any sum from 10c to \$9 in steps of 5c can be sent by not more than two orders. Fees charged on postal orders are: 10c to 45c—2c; 50c to 75c—3c; 80c to 95c—4c; \$1—5c; \$1.50—6c; \$2—7c; \$3 to \$8—10c.

MONEY ORDERS

Commission is charged for the issue of money orders at the following rates: Payable in Australia (including territories)—15c up to \$10 and 10c each additional \$10. Payable overseas—5c for each \$2, minimum charge 20c.

LICENSING OF BROADCAST AND TELEVISION RECEIVERS

A broadcast listener's licence must be obtained by a person owning one or more broadcast receivers kept at any one address.

The annual fees are as follows: Zone 1, \$5.50; Zone 2, \$2.80.

Zone 1 is the area within 250 miles of the higher powered national broadcasting stations, zone 2 is the remainder of the Commonwealth.

Licences at \$1 in zone 1 and 70c in zone 2 are issued to certain classes of pensioners.

A combined receiving licence must be obtained by a person owning one or more broadcast receivers and one or more television receivers kept at any address in zone 1. The annual fee for a combined receiving licence is \$17 or \$4 for certain classes of pensioners. A person in zone 1 owning a television receiver but no broadcast receiver must obtain a television viewer's licence. A television viewer's licence will be granted or renewed only when the applicant makes a statement in writing that neither he nor a member of his family possesses a broadcast receiver, or a member of his family has a broadcast listener's licence in respect of the address.

The annual licence fee is \$12 or \$4 in the case of certain classes of pensioners.

In the case of rented broadcast or television receivers, the person who lets the receiver out on hire is responsible for obtaining the licence. Similarly the proprietor of a guest house, hotel, etc., is responsible for the licensing of sets provided in the rooms of lodgers or tenants. Likewise the proprietor of a furnished flat or other such premises is responsible for ensuring that any receiver which is part of the furnishings is covered by an appropriate current licence.

Licences are issued free of charge to schools and blind persons over the age of 16 years.
