Situated between 10° and 29° south latitude and between 138° and 154° east longitude, Queensland occupies the north-eastern portion of the Australian continent. Of the six States of the Commonwealth, Queensland ranks second in area and third in population.

AREA	1,727,000 square kilometres, equivalent to more than seven times the area of the United Kingdom, three times the area of France or one-fifth of the area of USA.
COASTLINE	7,400 kilometres.
CAPITAL CITY	Brisbane, situated 16 kilometres from the sea.
TIME	Eastern Standard Time, 10 hours ahead of Greenwich Mean Time.
1824	First European settlement.
1859	Colony separated from New South Wales.
1901	State of the Commonwealth of Australia.

Queensland is a constituent State of the Commonwealth of Australia, observing the Federal Constitution, and, while returning elected members to both upper and lower houses of the Federal Parliament, is governed by its own State Parliament. A further level of government, local government, derives its powers from Acts passed by the State Parliament.

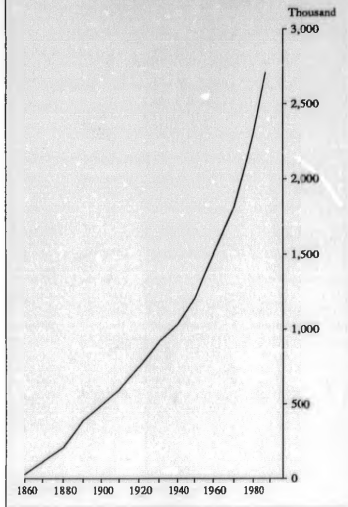

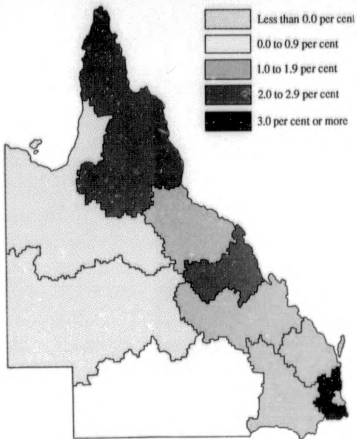

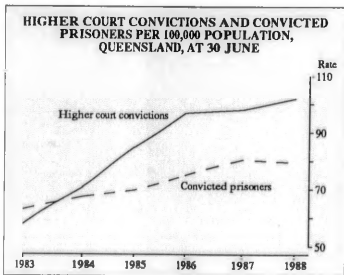

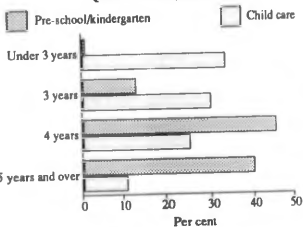

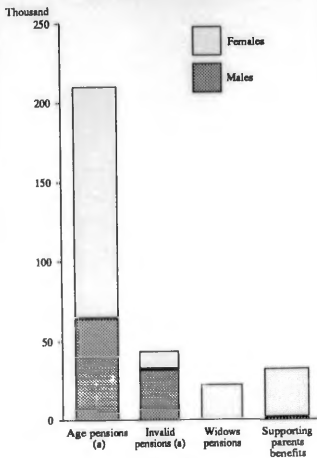

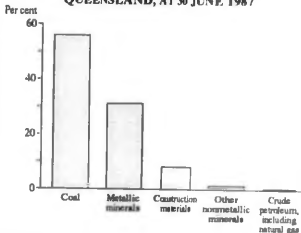

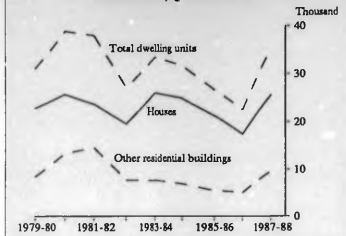

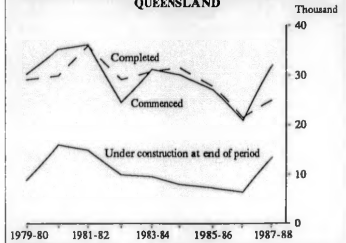

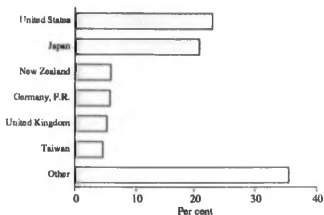

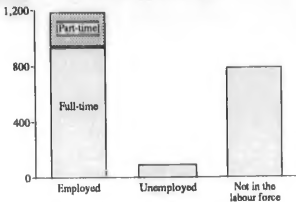

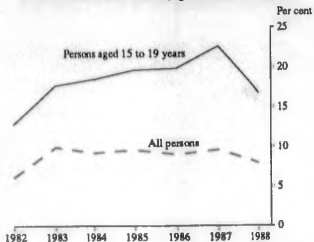
**LABOUR FORCE STATUS OF THE POPULATION (a),
