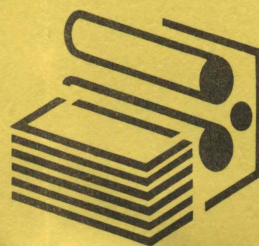
CONTROL of PUBLISHING in CHINA

Professor Chan Hok-lam, Visiting Fellow in Far Eastern History, Research School of Pacific Studies, is Professor of Chinese History at the School of International Studies and the Department of History, University of Washington, Seattle. A graduate of the universities of Hong Kong and Princeton, he previously taught at the University of Auckland and held research positions at Columbia University, Princeton University and the ANU.

Professor Chan is the author of a number of books, including *The Historiography of the Chin Dynasty* (1970), *Li Chih (1527-1602) in Contemporary Chinese Historiography* (1980), *Yuan Thought* (1982) and *Legitimation in Imperial China* (1983). He has made his reputation in various aspects of the history of the later Chinese dynasties and most notably in the fields of historiography and the history of imperial institutions.
