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INTRODUCTION

This publication contains statistics on the gross and local values of agricultural commodities produced in New South Wales for the 1987-88 season. In addition, statistics are also shown for the gross value of agricultural commodities produced in statistical areas of the State.

Explanatory notes are published at the back of this publication.

MAIN FEATURES

SUMMARY

In 1987-88, the gross value of agricultural commodities produced was \$5,902.0 million, an increase of 24.1% on the 1986-87 value. The major contributor was livestock products, the gross value of which increased by 55.7%, while crops and livestock slaughterings increased by 4.0% and 19.9% respectively. A graphic illustration of the movements in the components of the total gross value of agricultural commodities produced between 1986-87 and 1987-88 is shown below.

CROPS

The gross value of crops produced was \$2,119.7 million in 1987-88. The major contributor was wheat, the value of which was \$654.7 million, representing a decrease of 6.9% on the 1986-87 value. This decrease was offset by corresponding increases in the value of some other major crops such as other cereals for grain (26.6% to \$367.7 million), and fruit (19.0% to \$335.9 million). Cotton and vegetables, the other major crops, decreased by 1.9% and 1.6% respectively to \$302.2 million and \$147.5 million. See Tables 2 and 3 for details on the values of all crops produced.

LIVESTOCK SLAUGHTERINGS

In 1987-88, the gross value of livestock slaughterings was \$1,492.4 million, with all components sharing in the increase. The major component was cattle, which rose by 23.5% to \$819.8 million, followed by poultry, which rose by 8.5% to \$291.8 million, sheep and lambs by 24.4% to \$194.8 million and pigs by 18.4% to \$183.6 million. 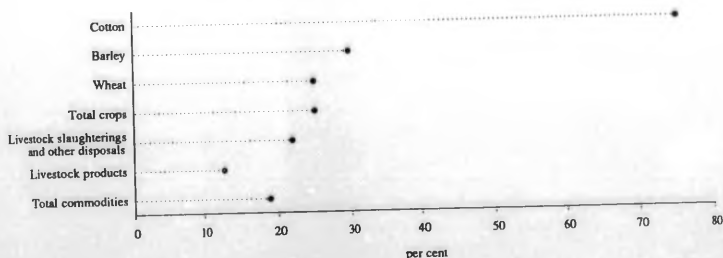
LIVESTOCK PRODUCTS

The increase in the 1987-88 gross value of livestock products, which totalled \$2,289.9 million, was shared by all the components. Wool, the major component, rose by 72.9% to \$1,899.4 million, followed by milk, which rose by 1.6% to \$254.3 million, eggs by 7.3% to \$119.6 million, and honey and beeswax by 13.3% to \$11.8 million. For details on the value of livestock products, see Tables 6 and 7.

REGIONAL

The Northern Statistical Division, of all statistical divisions in New South Wales, was the major contributor (19.5% or \$1,150.8 million) to the gross value of agricultural commodities produced in 1987-88. This statistical division was the major contributor to the gross value of both crops (24.5% or \$519.6 million), and livestock slaughterings (22.0% or \$328.5 million). A graph illustrating the contribution of this division is shown below. The North Western Statistical Division contributed most, 17.2% or \$393.1 million, to the gross value of livestock products. For details on regional values, see Tables 8 and 9 and 10. A graph showing the contribution of the Murrumbidgee Statistical Division is included at the end of table 10.

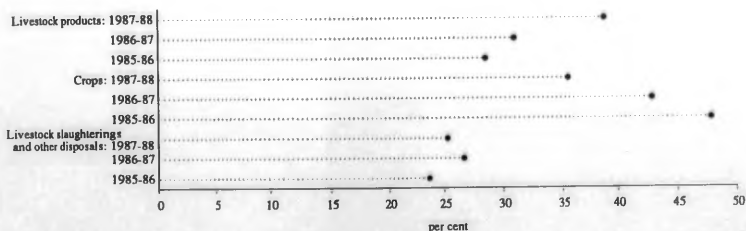

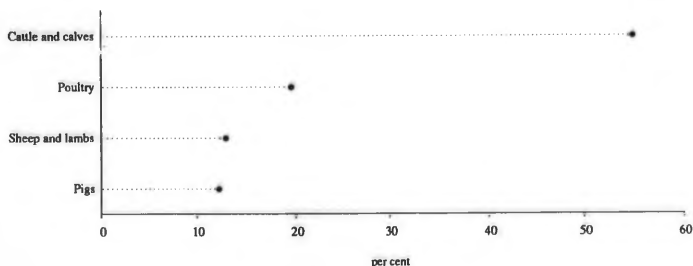

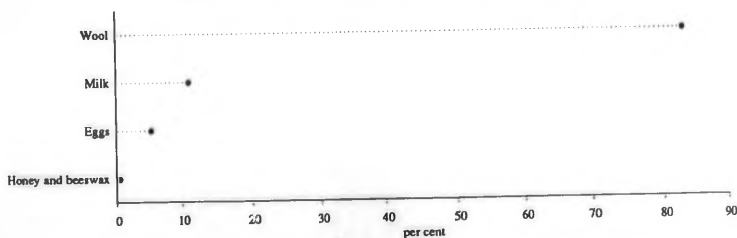

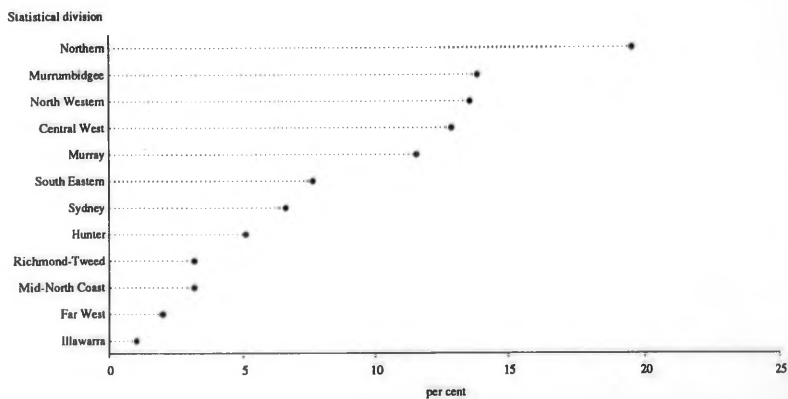

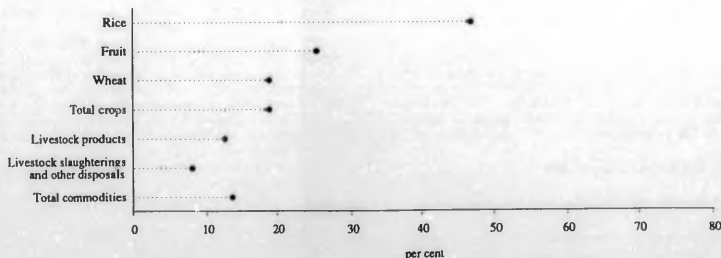

EXPLANATORY NOTES

1. Sources and coverage

(a) These statistics have been, in general, derived from the results of the Agricultural Census conducted at 31 March each year from occupiers of establishments with agricultural activity.

(b) An establishment with agricultural activity is a single physical location which is used for the production of crops (including fruit and vegetables) and/or for the raising of livestock and the production of livestock products.

(c) Establishments which make only a small contribution to overall agricultural production are excluded from the scope of the census. From 1986-87, establishments with an estimated value of operations (EVAO) less than \$5,000 are excluded (previously those establishments with an EVAO less than \$2,500 were excluded).

(d) Information covering such commodities as livestock slaughtering, dairy produce and beekeeping is obtained from separate ABS collections and from organisations such as the NSW Dairy Corporation.

(e) The method of collection of relevant prices for, and the costs of marketing of, agricultural commodities varies considerably between commodities. Where a statutory authority handles marketing of the whole or portion of a product (e.g. NSW Dairy Corporation, Australian Wheat Board) data are usually obtained from this source. Information is also obtained from marketing reports, wholesalers, brokers and auctioneers.

(f) For all commodities, values are in respect of production during the year (or season) irrespective of whether or when payments are made. For that portion of production not marketed (e.g. hay grown on farm for own use, milk used in farm household, etc.) estimates are made from the best available information and, in general, are valued on a local value basis.

2. Statistical areas of New South Wales

(a) This bulletin contains small area data presented according to the Australian Standard Geographical Classification (ASGC) Edition 3. For further information, refer to the Appendix of this publication. Statistical boundaries are shown on the maps inside the back cover.

(b) Due to frequent changes to local government areas, care should be taken if comparing statistics for these areas over time. Although no changes have occurred between 1 April 1987 and 31 March 1988, those that occurred in past seasons have been shown in previous editions of this publication.

3. Definitions of terms used

The following are brief definitions of the terms used:

(a) *Gross value of commodities produced* is the value placed on recorded production at the wholesale price(s)

realised in the market place. In general, the market place is the metropolitan market. In cases where the commodities are consumed locally, or where they become raw materials for a secondary industry, these points are presumed to be the market place.

(b) *Marketing costs* include freight, cost of containers, commission, insurance, storage, handling and other charges necessarily incurred by the producer in moving the agricultural product from the place of production to the market place.

(c) *Local value of commodities produced* is the value placed on recorded production at the place of production and is determined by deducting marketing costs from the gross value of commodities produced.

Gross and local values of agricultural commodities produced involve some duplication, as they include certain agricultural commodities which are consumed as raw materials to produce other agricultural commodities (e.g. hay consumed by livestock).

(d) *Values* include any relevant subsidy and bounty payments based on production.

(e) *Livestock slaughtering and other disposals.* Values for livestock slaughtering and other disposals are published as one figure but include two distinct components:

(i) Value of livestock slaughtered, and

(ii) Value of net exports, i.e. the total value of livestock intended for slaughter in adjacent State(s) and livestock exported overseas whether for slaughter or breeding, minus the value of imports of livestock.

Data on value of livestock slaughtering are available on request.

(f) *The value of agricultural commodities produced in statistical areas of the State* is calculated by using selected agricultural census items in conjunction with the gross value of agricultural commodities produced to derive unit values for a range of commodities. These derived unit values are applied to the regional agricultural census commodity item totals for the area to form the area values shown in Tables 8, 9 and 10. Where production is not obtained directly from the Agricultural Census, selected Agricultural Census items having a direct link with the production of the particular commodity are used. Except for certain crops grown in irrigation areas (grapes and oranges), this method of estimation does not take account of differences in unit prices between areas. Beekeeping activities are included but the values are apportioned to a particular statistical local area (and hence a statistical area) purely on the basis of the postal address of the operator; other agricultural activities may be undervalued because some specialist activities are not identified in the Agricultural Census (e.g. studs). For these reasons, the area values should be treated as providing only an *indication rather than a precise measure* of the value of commodities produced by region.

4. Other publications

A list of the complete range of publications available from the ABS can be obtained from any ABS office.

5. Other media of release

In addition to releasing agricultural statistics in printed publications, statistics for small geographical areas, minor commodities and data for previous years are available on request. The ABS also has an Agricultural Data Dissemination Service (ADDS) 7107.0 which provides agricultural statistics on magnetic tape, microfiche and CD-Rom. ADDS offers a wider range of data, aggregated at smaller geographical areas than those generally available in printed publications. ADDS is available for each year from 1976-77 to 1986-87. CD-Rom is available for 1985-86 and 1986-87. These additional services are subject to a charge.

APPENDIX

STATISTICAL AREAS OF NEW SOUTH WALES

This bulletin contains data presented according to the Australian Standard Geographical Classification (ASGC) Edition 3. Under this classification, statistical areas are defined as follows:

STATISTICAL LOCAL AREAS (SLAs). These geographic areas are in most cases either identical with, or have been aggregated to, the previously published whole or part legal Local Government Areas (LGAs) as defined under the (State) Local Government Act 1919 and comprising cities (C), municipalities (M) and shires (S). In other cases, they are identical to each previously published unincorporated area. In aggregate, SLAs cover the whole of the state without gaps or overlaps.

STATISTICAL SUBDIVISIONS (SDs). These consist of one or more SLAs and form the intermediate size spatial unit for the presentation of regional data.

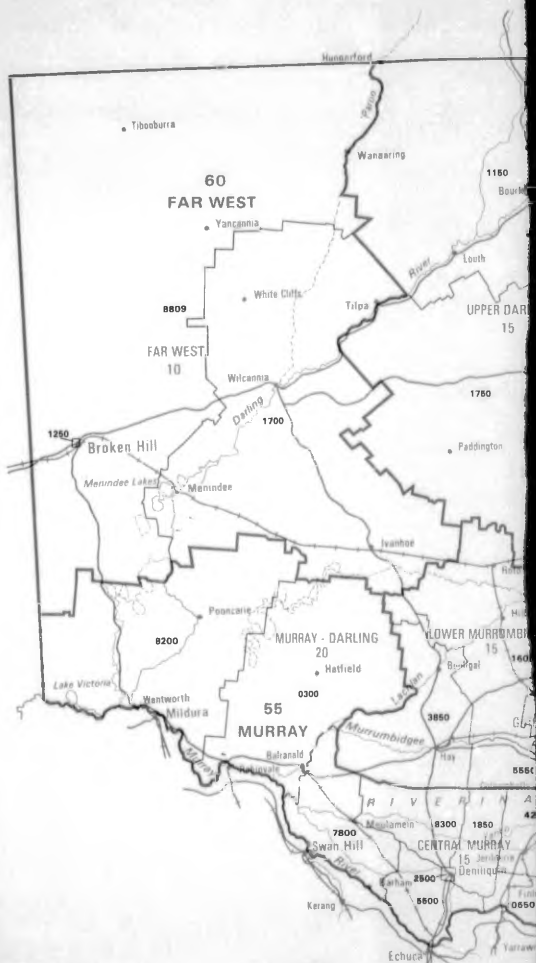
STATISTICAL DIVISIONS (SDs). These consist of one or more Statistical Subdivisions (SSDs). Where SSDs are not shown for statistical purposes, statistical local areas are shown ordered alphabetically within statistical divisions. The divisions are designed to be relatively homogeneous regions characterised by identifiable social and economic units within the region, under the unifying influence of one or more major towns or cities.

STATISTICAL DISTRICTS. To provide comparable statistics over a period of time, statistical districts have been defined around selected urban centres, with a population of 25,000 or more, experiencing urban growth beyond the legal local government area boundaries. These districts are intended to contain the anticipated urban spread over the next 20 years.

Further information concerning statistical areas is contained in the publication *Regional Statistics, New South Wales*, 1988 issue (1304.1) and in the publication *Australian Standard Geographical Classification* (1216.0)
