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PART I.—SECONDARY INDUSTRIES, 1943-44.

This is the thirty-eighth Bulletin of Production Statistics issued by this Bureau. Prior to 1936-37 the Production Bulletin covered both Primary and Secondary Industries but commencing with that year it has been issued in two parts. Part I refers to Secondary Industries (Manufacturing and Building), while Part II relates to Primary Industries and Total Recycled Production.

In this issue the publication of data previously withheld owing to wartime provisions of censorship has been recommenced. A new table relating to the factory consumption of coal as fuel and as a material is given on page 50. Where publication of certain information would reveal or indicate the business operations of the one or two firms concerned such information has been omitted.

The data contained in this Bulletin have been supplied by the State Statisticians from returns collected from individual manufacturers, and acknowledgment is made of the valuable work done in the State Statistical Bureaux.

I am especially indebted to Mr. J. C. Stephen, the officer in charge of Production Statistics in this Bureau, and to the staff of the Production Section, for the care and attention bestowed on the compilation of this Bulletin.

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MANUFACTURING STATISTICS.

(i) SCOPE OF THE STATISTICS.

Scope.—The statistics are compiled annually and show—

Number and size of factories: Number of persons employed, in various categories: Salaries and wages paid: Book value of land, buildings, plant and machinery (not capital invested): Value of material, containers, repairs and replacements, power, fuel and light (including water and lubricating oil) used in factories: Value of output: Value of production: Quantities and values of fuel used: Quantities and values of principal materials and articles of output: Value of additions and replacements to, and depreciation allowed on, land, buildings, plant and machinery: Rated horse-power of engines ordinarily in use and those in reserve or idle.

Definition of "Factory".—For the purposes of the accompanying statistics a "factory" is taken to be an industrial establishment in which four or more hands are employed, or in which power other than hand is used.

Classification of Factories.—The classification of factories adopted under Resolution No. 4 of the Conference of Statisticians, 1930, was introduced in 1930-31.

(ii) PERIOD COVERED.

The data for all States relate to the financial year ended 30th June. New South Wales changed from the calendar to the financial year in 1911-15, Victoria and South Australia in 1916-17, Tasmania in 1923-24, Queensland in 1924-25 and Western Australia in 1925-26.

(iii) DEFINITIONS OF TERMS USED.

Average Number of Persons Employed.—All persons employed in the manufacturing activities of a factory are counted as factory employees. The figures relating to employment, therefore, exclude all those engaged in selling and distribution, such as salesmen, travellers, collectors, carriers engaged solely on outward delivery of manufactured goods, and retailing storesmen. The figures do include, however, proprietors who work in their own businesses, as well as "out-workers."

The average number of persons employed, as outlined above, means in general the average number over the whole year and not the average over the period worked. The classification of factories according to Number of Hands (Tables Nos. 6, 7 and 8) is, however, made in accordance with the numbers employed during the period worked. In all other tables relating to employment, and in the computation of average salaries and wages paid, output per employee, &c., the average number throughout the year is used.

Value of Materials Used.—This item includes the value, in the usual sense, of the materials used, stores used, containers, tools replaced, and materials used in repairs to plant. In general, it does not include the value of customers' articles or materials repaired, assembled or treated by the factory.

Value of Fuel, &c., Used.—This item includes also the cost of power and light used, of lubricants and of water. Additional details of the costs included under this heading are given in Table No. 28.

Value of Output.—The amounts given under this heading represent the wholesale selling value at the factory of goods made or processed during the year, including by-products. In addition, it includes the value of other work done, such as repair work, assembling and making up for customers.

Value of Production.—The value of production of any industry was defined by the Conference of Statisticians, 1925, as "the value of consumable commodities produced during the year, deducting, so far as possible, the value of goods consumed in process of production."

In accordance with this definition it was agreed that, in the valuation of factory production, deduction should be made from the value of the output of the cost of raw material, containers, power, fuel, light, lubricants, water, tools replaced, repairs to plant, and for depreciation. All these except depreciation are included in the two items "Value of materials used" and "Value of fuel used" as defined above. On account of the difficulty experienced in securing accurate figures for depreciation, it was subsequently agreed that the particulars obtained should be published, but that no deduction should be made on this account for the present. The value of production as given in the following tables is obtained, therefore, by deducting "Value of materials used" and "Value of fuel used," as defined above, from the "Value of output." This method of valuing factory production has been adopted by the Statistical Offices throughout Australia.

The amount of depreciation allowed on land and buildings during 1943-44 was stated to be £3,532,231 or 1.59 per cent. of the total book value of land and buildings. The amount of depreciation allowed on plant and machinery during 1943-44 was stated to be £17,274,822 or 9.54 per cent. of the total book value of plant and machinery. Details of depreciation appear in Table No. 41. There are also many miscellaneous expenses, such as insurance and advertising which are not taken into account. Consequently it must not be inferred that, when wages and salaries are deducted from value of production, the whole of the surplus is available for interest and profits.

Rated Horse-power of Engines Used.—Statistics of power used in factories other than Central Electric Stations relate to the "rated horse-power" of engines ordinarily in use and of engines in reserve or idle, omitting obsolete engines. In the case of Central Electric Stations, the figures refer to the "rated capacity" of engines and generators installed. In 1935-36 and previous years, the statistics of power used in factories (including Central Electric Stations) represented the "average horse-power used". See Tables Nos. 46 and 47.
