EMPLOYED WAGE AND SALARY EARNERS: AUSTRALIA, FEBRUARY 1972

PRELIMINARY STATEMENT

Reference No. 6.12

This preliminary statement will be followed by the monthly bulletin "Employment and Unemployment" (Reference No. 6.4) which gives information in greater detail. The figures shown are subject to revision.

The estimates contained herein are based on benchmarks derived from the results of the population census of June 1966. They are obtained from three main sources, namely (a) current payroll tax returns, (b) current returns from government bodies, and (c) some other current returns of employment (e.g. for hospitals); the balance, i.e. unrecorded private employment, is estimated. Month-to-month changes shown by current returns are linked to the benchmark data to derive the monthly estimates. At June 1966 recorded employment obtained from the foregoing sources accounted for about 85 per cent of the total number of employees in the industries covered, as determined by the census.

Current data supplied by reporting enterprises or establishments generally refer to persons on the payroll for the last pay-period in each month. Persons who are on paid leave or who work during part of the pay-period and are unemployed or on strike during the rest of the period are generally counted as employed. Those not shown on employers' payrolls because they are on leave without pay, on strike or stood down for the entire period are excluded.

The figures in this statement relate only to wage and salary earners, not the total labour force. They therefore exclude employers, self-employed persons and unpaid helpers. Also excluded, because of the inadequacy of current data, are employees in agriculture and private domestic service, and some part-time employees.

NOTE: At the 1971 population census all trainee teachers were for the first time classified as not in the labour force. They have been excluded for the period from July 1971 from the estimates shown in this statement and in the Employment and Unemployment bulletin, the numbers of males and females excluded in July being approximately 7,000 and 17,000 respectively.

Any discrepancies between totals and sums of components in tables are due to rounding.
