

SURVEY OF NON-SCHOOL STUDY COURSES

AUGUST 1968



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SUMMARY OF RESULTS

As a result of a sample survey carried out in August 1968 by the Commonwealth Bureau of Census and Statistics, it is estimated that 516,400 persons in Australia, aged 15 and over, were at that time enrolled for courses of study or training, other than full-time secondary school courses. This excludes minor courses such as full-time courses lasting less than three months, part-time courses lasting less than six months and correspondence courses which did not involve the sending in of written work or sitting for examinations.

These enrolled persons represent 6.1% of the total population aged 15 and over, the proportions for the States being N.S.W. 5.9, Victoria 6.0, Queensland 5.4, South Australia 6.4, Western Australia 8.3, and Tasmania 5.4. Males enrolled were 351,100 or 8.3% of the male population, females 165,200 or 3.9% of the female population.

Persons enrolled for advanced level courses, i.e. for degree or diploma courses at universities, colleges of advanced education and courses at teachers colleges, numbered 164,300, of which 70% were male. Persons enrolled for technician level courses (typically certificate courses) in technical, commercial and other fields numbered 115,700 (62% male); those enrolled for trade courses numbered 107,000 (94% male).

There were 105,000 persons enrolled for full-time non-school courses, 348,500 for part-time courses and 62,900 for correspondence courses. Enrolments for full-time courses were predominantly (83%) at advanced level. Among enrolments for part-time courses, both trade courses and certificate courses outnumbered those at advanced level.

The survey revealed that, of all children in the age-group 15-17 years (inclusive), 56.0% of boys and 49.6% of girls were still at school. It also showed that 15.3% of boys and 10.7% of girls in this age group were enrolled in study courses outside school, mostly on a part-time basis. In the age-group 18-22 years (inclusive), 32.8% of males and 15.0% of females were enrolled in non-school courses. Above these ages there were large numbers of enrolments, over one-third of all males and just under one-third of all females enrolled for non-school courses being in the age group 23 and over.

Universities, colleges of advanced education and government education institutions of other kinds accounted for 394,900 or over 75% of students enrolled for non-school courses. A further 40,300 were in public institutions, such as hospitals, which are not primarily teaching institutions; and 82,200 were doing courses provided privately or by non-government colleges.

In all, 410,900 or 80% of persons enrolled for non-school courses were in the labour force. Persons enrolled for non-school courses accounted for 26.1% of all wage and salary earners in professional, technical and related occupations; for 8.1% of all wage and salary earners in administrative and clerical occupations; and for 7.9% of all wage-earning craftsmen, production workers and labourers.

There were 105,400 persons enrolled for non-school courses who were not in the labour force, chiefly in full-time courses (70,400).

EXPLANATORY NOTES

The survey was conducted in August 1968 as part of the quarterly population survey based on a one per cent sample of households throughout Australia. The object of the survey was to obtain information about persons enrolled for courses of study or training outside school. Details were sought of the names of the institutions conducting the courses, the qualifications received, whether the courses were taken by correspondence, full-time or part-time, the duration of courses being undertaken and whether or not the persons had first started the courses in 1968. The results of the survey supplement data about enrolments collected from schools and other teaching institutions. Because the information was obtained from the persons enrolled for courses, rather than from institutions providing courses, it was possible to collect information about all types of courses, including those given by employers, private teachers, business colleges and the like. Thus the survey results present a general indication of post-school education. Information about study courses was related to information about personal characteristics of students enrolled for courses, such as age, sex, marital status, occupation, and occupational status.

2. The survey was not designed to yield detailed, accurate information about total enrolments in particular courses, or in particular institutions. For figures based on actual enrolments at schools, universities, colleges of advanced education, teachers colleges, etc. reference should be made to the relevant publications of the Bureau of Census and Statistics and of departments of education. Differences between figures of enrolments at schools, universities, colleges of advanced education, etc. derived from this survey and those derived from statistical collections from institutions will arise because the figures in this bulletin are estimates based on a sample survey; there are also differences in timing, and it is not always possible to use the same definitions. Students enrolled for two or more courses at different institutions could be counted without duplication in the survey, but not necessarily so in enrolment statistics.

Population coverage

3. The survey covered all persons aged fifteen years and over except members of the permanent armed forces, national servicemen enlisted in the Regular Army Supplement and certain diplomatic personnel customarily excluded from the population censuses and estimates. Persons regarded as patients of institutions such as hospitals, sanatoria and nursing homes were also excluded from the survey.

4. A course of study was defined as the provision of training, instruction or supervision of study according to a given syllabus or programme, but excluding "minor" courses. Most sporting, recreational and cultural activities, on-the-job training, etc. were excluded from the survey. "Minor" courses were defined as correspondence courses which do not require sending in of written work or sitting for examinations, full-time courses lasting less than three months, and part-time courses lasting less than six months. Although excluded from the definitions of study courses and tables, "minor" courses, where reported, were nevertheless recorded. The information obtained in the survey leads to estimates of about 16,300 males and 24,200 females in part-time courses lasting less than six months, and some 5,100 enrolments for full-time courses lasting less than three months and correspondence courses not requiring sending in of written work or sitting for examinations. The reporting of enrolments in such "minor" courses may have been incomplete.

Study courses included

5. The survey questions referred to enrolments at the time of the survey, August 1968, and therefore excluded courses completed or discontinued in 1968 before the survey, or commenced between the survey and the end of the year. Since most non-school courses are organised on a calendar year basis, enrolments in August provide a good approximation for the more substantial courses taken during the calendar year.

6. It is estimated that there were about 16,500 persons enrolled for two non-school courses concurrently. No information was sought in respect of non-school courses in excess of two. About 8,600 persons were enrolled for two part-time courses, the others mainly for correspondence courses or "minor" part-time courses. No further reference is made in this publication to "minor" and "second" non-school courses and they are excluded from all tables.

7. Tables 1, 2 and 7 include estimates of boys and girls, aged 15 years and over, who went to school (i.e. secondary schools including junior technical schools). About 5,600 male and 7,900 female school pupils of 15 years and over were enrolled for courses of study which were not part of their ordinary schooling. While most of these concurrent enrolments were for "minor" courses (and therefore excluded), there were some school pupils enrolled for more substantial non-school courses and these are included in the figures of persons enrolled for non-school courses.

Type of course

8. In general, a non-school course was classified as full-time, part-time or correspondence in accordance with the way it was reported. In cases where a course combined classes and on-the-job training, a course was defined as full-time where more time was spent on class work than on the job, and as part-time where more time was spent on the job, as is the case with trainee nurses and apprentices. All teacher education was taken to be full-time.

Level of course

9. Non-school courses were classified, as far as possible, by level, i.e. advanced, technician, or trade. Advanced level courses are, broadly, those leading to professional qualifications and usually requiring as pre-requisites the completion of secondary education to matriculation level or its equivalent. In Table 3, advanced level courses are further classified as university degree and professional diploma, teacher education, or other advanced level courses. Technician level courses are intermediate between courses leading to professional qualifications and those leading to trade qualifications. Most certificate courses in technical colleges are at this level. Technician level courses have been classified according to field of study as technical (mainly engineering and technological), commercial (accounting, administration, secretarial, etc.) or other (including nursing). Trade level courses, mainly apprenticeship courses, usually supplement on-the-job training for skilled manual occupations. Miscellaneous courses are those which cannot be allocated to the above levels. They have been classified into those providing instruction (for persons not at school) in school subjects for school qualifications, commercial courses below the technician level (mainly typing and shorthand) and other courses, such as more substantial adult education courses, which do not belong to one of the three levels. "Post-trade", "post-certificate", "post-diploma" and "post-graduate" courses (i.e. courses, usually shorter, providing specialised further training within a level) are not classified as miscellaneous but are associated with each level.

Type of institution

10. A classification was made of persons enrolled for non-school study courses according to the type of institution providing the course. Education institutions (such as universities, colleges of advanced education, teachers colleges, technical colleges) were distinguished from other institutions not primarily set up for teaching purposes, such as employers providing courses for their employees and hospitals at which nurses are trained (teaching hospitals) government institutions were distinguished from non-government institutions. For the purposes of this classification, universities, colleges of advanced education, hospitals where nursing training is provided, and similar government-supported or semi-governmental institutions, were classified as government.

11. Teachers colleges include government and non-government teachers colleges and kindergarten teachers colleges. Colleges of advanced education are those which were recognised as such under the States Grants (Colleges of Advanced Education) Act at the time of the survey.

Duration of course and persons commencing courses

12. Courses were classified by duration; i.e. courses not exceeding twelve months, and longer courses. The shorter, "12 months or less", courses exclude "minor" courses as defined in paragraph 4 above. Estimates are also given of the number of persons enrolled for courses in August 1968 who commenced their courses in 1968 up to the time of the survey.

Occupational status and occupation

13. The labour force comprises all persons who, during survey week (the week immediately preceding that in which the interview took place), were either employed or unemployed according to the definitions customarily used in the population survey. For detailed definitions see the quarterly Labour Force bulletin (Reference No.6.20). The remainder of the population is classified as not in the labour force, and includes pupils at school and full-time students at other educational institutions, who were neither employed nor unemployed.

14. Wage and salary earners are defined as persons who, during survey week, either worked (or had a job but did not work because of illness, etc.) for wages, salary, commission, kind, etc., or who were unemployed during survey week but worked for wages, salary, etc. in their last job. Trainee teachers at teachers colleges are classified as wage and salary earners.

Reliability of the estimates

15. Since the estimates in this bulletin are based on a sample, they may differ from the figures that would have been obtained from a complete census using the same questionnaires and procedures. One measure of the likely difference is given by the standard error, which indicates the extent to which an estimate might have varied by chance because only a sample, and not the whole population, was enumerated. There are about two chances in three that a sample estimate will differ by less than one standard error from the figure that would have been obtained from a comparable complete enumeration, and about nineteen chances in twenty that the difference will be less than two standard errors. A table of standard errors which is intended to be of general application is given below:

16. In the tables in this bulletin only estimates of 4,000 or over have been shown, as smaller estimates would be subject to such high standard errors (relative to the size of the estimate) as to detract seriously from their value for most reasonable uses. Although, in some case, figures for these small components can be derived by subtraction, they should not be regarded as reliable.

17. The reliability of an estimated percentage, computed by using sample data for both numerator and denominator, depends upon both the size of the percentage and the size of the denominator. Percentages calculated from figures in this bulletin have generally somewhat lower standard errors (proportionally) than have the estimates which form the numerators of the percentages, particularly where the percentages are large.

18. The imprecision due to sampling variability, which is measured by the standard error, should not be confused with inaccuracies that may occur because of imperfections in reporting by interviewers and respondents. Inaccuracies of this kind are referred to as the non-sampling error, and they may occur in any enumeration, whether it be a full count or only a sample. Every effort is made to reduce the non-sampling error to a minimum by careful design of questionnaires, intensive training and supervision of interviewers and efficient operating procedures.

NOTE. Any discrepancies between totals and sums of components in tables are due to rounding.
