PREFACE.

This is the forty-fourth Bulletin dealing with Secondary Industries Statistics issued by this Bureau. Prior to 1936-37 particulars of both Primary and Secondary Industries were included in the one Bulletin, but commencing with that year a separate Bulletin was devoted to each. This Bulletin relates to Manufacturing and Building, and the Primary Industries Bulletin to Primary Industries and Total Recorded Production.

The previous Table No. 30 has been re-arranged to show, in alphabetical order, (i) the usage of raw materials in various industries and (ii) the total output of manufactured products. (Tables No. 60 and No. 61.)

Where publication of certain information would reveal or indicate the business operations of the one or two firms concerned such information has not been shown separately.

The data contained in this Bulletin have been supplied by the State Statisticians from returns collected from industrial establishments and those engaged in construction of buildings and acknowledgment is made of the valuable work done in the State Statistical Bureaux.

I am especially indebted to Mr. C. L. Walters, the Supervisor of the Secondary Production and Building Branch, and to Mr. V. T. Chapman, B. Com., and other officers of this Branch, for the care and attention bestowed on the compilation of this Bulletin, and the preparation of the material for the printer.

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MANUFACTURING STATISTICS.

(i) SCOPE OF THE STATISTICS.

Scope.—The statistics are compiled annually and show—

Number and size of factories: Number of persons employed, in various categories: Salaries and wages paid: Book value of land, buildings, plant and machinery (net capital invested): Value of materials, containers, repairs and replacement, power, fuel and light (including water and lubricating oil) used in factories: Value of output: Value of production: Quantities and values of fuel used: Quantities and values of principal materials and articles of output: Value of additions and replacements to, and depreciation allowed on, land, buildings, plant and machinery: Rated horse-power of engines ordinarily in use and those in reserve or idle.

Definition of "Factory".—For the purposes of the accompanying statistics a "factory" is taken to be a manufacturing establishment in which four or more persons are employed or in which power other than hand is used.

Classification of Factories.—The classification of factories adopted under Resolution No. 4 of the Conference of Statisticians, 1930, was introduced in 1930-31.

(ii) PERIOD COVERED.

The period covered by the statistics in this Bulletin, is, in the main, the twelve months ended 30th June. In cases where some other accounting period is used it is *prima facie* to be complete the census schedule for that accounting period. These cases, however, are comparatively few and their inclusion in no way impairs the comparability of the statistics in the year under review or from year to year.

(iii) DEFINITIONS OF TERMS USED.

Average Number of Persons Employed.—All persons employed in the manufacturing activities of a factory are counted as factory employees. The figures relating to employment, therefore, exclude all those engaged in selling and distribution, such as salesmen, travellers, collectors, etc., and solely on outward delivery of manufactured goods, and retailing, etc. The figures do include, however, proprietors who work in their own businesses, as well as "out-workers".

The average number of persons employed, as outlined above, means in general the average number over the whole year and not the average over the period worked. The classification of factories according to number of persons employed (Tables Nos. 6, 7, 8 and 9) is, however, made in accordance with the numbers employed during the period worked. In all other tables relating to employment, and in the computation of average salaries and wages paid, output per employee, etc., the average number throughout the year is used.

Value of Materials Used.—This item includes the value, in the usual sense, of the materials used, stores used, containers, tools replaced, and materials used in repairs to plant. In general, it does not include the value of customers' articles or materials repaired, assembled or treated by the factory.

Value of Fuel, &c., Used.—This item includes also the cost of power and light used, of lubricants and of water. Additional details of the costs included under this heading are given in Table No. 33.

Value of Output.—The amounts given under this heading represent the wholesale selling value of the factory of goods made or processed during the year, including by-products. In addition, it includes the value of other work done, such as repair work, assembling and making up for customers.

Value of Production.—The value of production of any industry was defined by the Conference of Statisticians, 1920, as "the value of consumable commodities produced during the year, deducting, so far as possible, the value of goods consumed in process of production".

In accordance with this definition it was agreed that, in the valuation of factory production, deducts should be made from the value of the output of the cost of new material, containers, power, fuel, light, lubricants, water, to be replaced, repairs to plant, and for depreciation. All these except depreciation are included in the two items "value of materials used" and "Value of fuel used" as defined above. On account of the difficulty experienced in securing accurate figures for depreciation, it was subsequently agreed that the particulars obtained should be published, but that no deduction should be made on this account for the present. The value of production as given in the following tables is obtained, therefore, by deducting "Value of materials used" and "Value of fuel used", as defined above, from the "Value of output". This method of valuing factory production has been adopted by the Statistical offices throughout Austria.

During 1929-30 the amounts of depreciation allowed were stated to be £1,912,038 on land and buildings, or 1.13 per cent. of the total book value of land and buildings, and £26,161,124 on plant and machinery, or 9.16 per cent. of the total book value of plant and machinery. Details of depreciation appear in Tables Nos. 49-51. There are also many miscellaneous expenses, such as maintenance of buildings, etc., depreciation, workers' compensation insurance, other insurance, pay-roll tax, income tax, advertising, interest on borrowed money, bad debts and many other sundry charges, which are not taken into account. Consequently it must not be inferred that, when wages and salaries are deducted from value of production, the whole of the surplus is available for interest and profits.

Rated Horse-power of Engines Used.—Statistics of power used in factories other than Central Electric Stations relate to the "rated horse-power" of engines ordinarily in use and of engines in reserve or idle, omitting obsolete engines. In the case of Central Electric Stations, the figures refer to the "rated capacity" of engines and generators installed. In 1930-36 and previous years, the statistics of power used in factories (including Central Electric Stations) represented the "average horse-power used". See Tables Nos. 52 and 53.

SECTION II.—MONTHLY PRODUCTION OF CERTAIN COMMODITIES.

Commodities for which information is furnished monthly are classified, mainly on the basis of value of production, as "major" or "minor". The table following shows the monthly production in Australia (excluding Northern Territory and Australian Capital Territory in all cases other than meat and grid production) of all "major" commodities for which information is at present available. For information on the monthly production of "minor" commodities and on recent additions to the monthly collection and also for more up-to-date figures generally, the reader should refer to the *Monthly Bulletin of Production Statistics* published by this Bureau.

The table shows available statistics for each month from July, 1947 to December, 1951, and also monthly averages of annual figures extending back to 1928-29.

Monthly figures for years up to and including 1949-50 (with some exceptions noted below) have been adjusted, where necessary, to agree with annual figures contained elsewhere in this bulletin. In some cases, however, complete agreement cannot be effected. This occurs where the annual accounting period of some firms ends on a date other than 30th June. Figures for July, 1950, and later months are preliminary in that some are based on collections which do not cover minor producers, some are undergoing detailed examination and revision particularly in relation to definition, and some are figures of deliveries and not production. Revised figures will be published in future issues of the bulletin and of the *Monthly Bulletin of Production Statistics*. Monthly figures which are collected on a four and five-weekly or fortnightly basis have been adjusted to a calendar month basis by assuming a constant rate of production during each period and allocating an appropriate proportion of each period's figures to the relevant calendar month.

The following notes for each commodity state the source of the figures and method of collection, the period covered, and other relevant information.

FUEL.

Black Coal.—Collected on a fortnightly basis from all producers and compiled by the Joint Coal Board. Converted by the Commonwealth Statistician to calendar month figures.

Brown Coal.—Collected from all producers by the Victorian Government Statist and the Victorian Mines Department. The figures collected by the Statist are from the major producer on a calendar month basis, and those collected by the Mines Department are from small producers on a weekly basis which is converted by the Commonwealth Statistician to a calendar month basis.

BUILDING MATERIALS.

Bricks.—Collected on a calendar month basis from major producers and compiled by the State Statisticians in Western Australia and Tasmania and by State Building Materials Control Authorities in other States. The totals for each State are then estimated by the Commonwealth Statistician, except in New South Wales, where the State Statistician makes the estimate.

Cement Building Blocks.—Collected on a calendar month basis from all producers and compiled by State Building Materials Control Authorities in all States except Tasmania, where collection is by the Commonwealth Statistician. The figures are in terms of standard square yards to 1944-45 inclusive, thereafter in terms of selling square yards. A standard square yard contains a given volume of block; a selling square yard represents the area covered by the finished sheet regardless of its thickness or corrugation.

Cement, Portland.—Collected on a calendar month basis from all producers and compiled by the Commonwealth Statistician in all States except New South Wales, where collection is by the State Building Materials Control Authority.

Fibres Plaster Sheets.—Collected on a calendar month basis from major producers by State Building Materials Control Authorities for all States except South Australia and Queensland, which are taken into account by the Commonwealth Statistician when estimating total production.

Roofing Tiles, Terra Cotta and Cement.—Collected on a calendar month basis from all producers and compiled by State Statisticians in Western Australia and Tasmania and by State Building Materials Control Authorities in other States.

Sawn Timber.—Estimated from details of royalties paid on logs taken from Crown and/or private lands. The authorities are the State Forestry Departments and the Forestry and Timber divisions of the Commonwealth Department of the Interior.

CHEMICALS AND ALLIED PRODUCTS.

Sulphuric Acid.—Collected on a calendar month basis from all producers and compiled by the Commonwealth Statistician.

Superphosphate.—Estimated by the Superphosphate Industry Committee of the Commonwealth Department of Commerce and Agriculture, which supplies a standard factor to the quantity of phosphate rock used each month as supplied by each producer.

Sulphate of Ammonia.—Collected on a calendar month basis from all producers and compiled by Nitrogen Fertilisers Pty. Ltd. and the Commonwealth Statistician.

Paints.—Collected on a calendar month basis from all producers and compiled by the Commonwealth Statistician.

IRON AND STEEL.

Pig-iron.—Collected on a four-weekly basis from all producers by the Commonwealth Statistician and converted to a calendar month basis. Discrepancies between monthly and annual figures are due to major producers furnishing annual returns for a year ending other than on 30th June.

Blanks and Billets.—See note above for Pig-iron. This item covers blooms, b.l.b.s, slabs, and axle blanks, not forged purposes. Details collected annually are on a slightly different basis from those collected monthly.

Export Steel.—See note above for Pig-iron. This collection covers major producers in New South Wales who account for almost the entire Australian total.

REFINED METALS.

Cold.—Collected on a calendar month basis and compiled in each State by the State Mines Department.

Silver.—Collected from Australian Mines and Metals Association (Inc.) and Bureau of Mineral Resources. Major production is on a calendar month basis. Balance converted by Commonwealth Statistician to calendar month basis. Compiled by Commonwealth Statistician.

Copper.—Collected on a calendar month basis from all producers and compiled by the Australian Mines and Metals Association (Inc.).

Lead.—See note above for Copper. These figures include quantities in a molten lead refined to the bullion stage and exported.

Zinc.—Collected on a four-weekly basis from the sole producer by the Commonwealth Statistician and converted to a calendar month basis.

DOMESTIC REFRIGERATORS.

Details of each of the different types shown under this heading are collected on a calendar month basis from all producers and compiled by the Commonwealth Statistician.

BUILDING FITTINGS.

Stoves (Cooking).—Details are collected on a calendar month basis from all known producers and compiled by the Commonwealth Statistician in all States except New South Wales, where collection is by the State Building Materials Control Authority. The figures for solid fuel and gas cooking stoves include household and commercial types to 1947-48 inclusive, thereafter household only. Figures for electric cooking stoves include commercial stoves and ranges, and household stoves, electric, and cookers to 1944-45 inclusive, thereafter household cooking stoves only.

MOTOR BODIES.

Collected on a calendar month basis from major producers and total estimated by Commonwealth Statistician.

PEDAL CYCLES.

Collected on a calendar month basis from all producers and compiled by the Commonwealth Statistician.

INTERNAL COMBUSTION ENGINES.

Collected on a calendar month basis from all producers and compiled by the Commonwealth Statistician.

ELECTRIC MOTORS.

Collected on a calendar month basis from all producers and compiled by the Commonwealth Statistician. Figures for 1944-45 to 1951-52 include all motors made and incorporated in other products of the manufacturer. Earlier figures do not.

CATTLE HIDES, YEARLINGS AND CALFSKINS.

Figures collected and compiled by Australian Hides and Leather Industries Board, and are on the basis of Hides and Skins received into store.

TEXTILE PRODUCTS (NOT DRESSES).

Cotton Textiles.
Wool Textiles.
Rayon Woven Fabrics. } See note above for Internal Combustion Engines.

CLOTHING.

Hosiery.—Collected on a calendar month basis from all Knitting Mills and compiled by the Commonwealth Statistician.

Knitted Underwear.—See note above for Hosiery.

Knitted Outerwear.—See note above for Hosiery.

Shirts and Pyjamas.—See note above for Internal Combustion Engines.

Fashions.—See note above for Internal Combustion Engines.

FOOD, DRINK AND TOBACCO.

Flour from Wheat.—Collected on a fortnightly basis from all producers through the Australian Wheat Board and compiled and converted to a calendar month basis by the Commonwealth Statistician.

Biscuits.—Collected on a calendar month basis from major producers and total estimated by the Commonwealth Statistician.

Baked Sago.—Estimated by the Commonwealth Department of Trade and Customs from data supplied by all producers on a four- or five-weekly basis and converted to a calendar month basis by the Commonwealth Statistician.

Confectionery.—See note above for Biscuits.

Jams.—Collected on a calendar month basis from all factory producers by the Commonwealth Statistician through the State Statisticians. In addition to jams, the quantities include preserves, fruit spreads, and jellies.

Milk.—Estimated by the Commonwealth Statistician from sample details of slaughterings and production supplied through the State Statisticians. The items listed give details of production of five varieties of meat (sheep, beef, pig, lamb, and chicken) in terms of fresh meat. The sample was estimated to cover the following percentages of total slaughterings during 1951-52: Cattle, 75 per cent.; calves, 40 per cent.; sheep, 57 per cent.; lambs, 51 per cent.; and pigs, 91 per cent.

Milk Milk Used for All Purposes.—Estimated on a calendar month basis by the Commonwealth Statistician from information available on utilization of milk for butter, cream, processed milk products, and milk used or consumed for all other purposes.

Factory Butter.—Collected on a calendar month basis from all factory producers and compiled by the Commonwealth Dairy Produce Expedition Committee Ltd.

Factory Cheese.—See note above for Butter.

Processed Milk Products.—Collected on a calendar month basis from all known factory producers and compiled by the Commonwealth Statistician. The quantities include the total weight of condensed, concentrated, and powdered milk (full cream, skim, and buttermilk) produced. Infant and invalid foods are excluded up to the year 1942-43 and included from 1943-44.

Ice Cream.—See note above for Biscuits.

Beer.—Supplied on a monthly basis by Excise Branch of the Commonwealth Department of Trade and Customs in respect of all breweries.

Tobacco and Cigarettes.—Monthly totals relate to the quantities on which excise duty is paid every calendar month, obtained from excise returns passed for home consumption by the Commonwealth Department of Trade and Customs, and compiled by the Commonwealth Statistician. Normally these figures approximate production. Monthly averages for the years 1936-37 to 1946-47 are obtained from the annual returns of production.

PAPER.

Newsprint.—Collected by the Commonwealth Statistician on a calendar month basis and made available for publication by the sole producer. These figures cover both first and second quality newsprint.

RUBBER GOODS.

Pneumatic Tyres—Motor Cycle, Car, Truck, etc.—Collected on a calendar month basis from all producers and compiled by the Commonwealth Department of Supply and Development. The "S.S." in the heading refers to tractor and aero. The monthly average of annual figures from 1926-29 to 1940-41 inclusive cover production of cycle tyres also.

Pneumatic Tyres, Cycle.—See note above for Internal Combustion Engines.

FLOOR COVERINGS.

Wool Felt, Carpet and Linoleum.—These figures aggregate in square yards the quantity of felt for floor covering, carpet, and linoleum produced. Details of such commodity are collected on a calendar month basis from all producers and compiled by the Commonwealth Statistician.

HEAT, LIGHT AND POWER.

Total Gas Made in Gas Works.—Collected on the basis of monthly net sales of major producers by the State Statisticians in each of the States. Total production is then estimated by the Commonwealth Statistician.

Total Electricity Generated.—Collected on a calendar month basis from major producers by the State Statisticians in each of the States. Total production is then estimated by the State Statisticians in respect of New South Wales and by the Commonwealth Statistician in respect of the other States. In the case of Victoria, South Australia, and Western Australia certain smaller producers supply figures on a four-weekly basis which is converted by the Commonwealth Statistician to a calendar month basis.

STATISTICS OF NEW BUILDINGS.

DEFINITIONS OF TERMS USED.

Owner-builder.—For the purpose of these statistics, an owner-builder is a person who is actually building his own house or is having his house built under his own direction without the services of a contractor.

Commenced.—A building is regarded as having been commenced when work on foundations has begun. Owing to the difficulty of defining the exact point that this represents in building operations, it is probable that interpretations placed upon it by informants are not entirely uniform.

Completed.—A building is regarded as having been completed when the builder has fulfilled the terms of the contract. As with commencements, the interpretations placed upon this definition may vary.

Under Construction.—A building remaining uncompleted at the end of a period is regarded as being under construction regardless of whether construction was actively proceeding on that particular date.

Employment.—The figures of employment relate to persons actually working on new buildings on a specified day. They include working principals, employees, men working as, or for, sub-contractors and men temporarily laid off on account of weather. In addition, they include some employees engaged on alterations, additions, renovations or repairs to buildings when these jobs are undertaken by a contractor who builds new buildings. The figures exclude persons working on owner-built houses.

Values.—All values shown exclude the value of land and represent the estimated value of buildings on completion.

EXPLANATORY NOTES.

All figures in this Section (with the exception of those relating to employment) relate to the operations of private contractors, Government authorities and owner-builders. Operations of the latter are not included in the employment section.

Figures relate only to the operations of persons who build *New Buildings*.

Alterations, additions, renovations and repairs to buildings are excluded, because of the difficulty in obtaining complete lists of persons who engage in these operations.

Figures for houses exclude converted military huts, flats and shop dwellings. Some houses built on farms are excluded but these do not affect the figures materially.

Figures shown for flats relate to individual units, each flat being counted as a separate unit. Only new flats are included, i.e., conversions of old buildings into flats are omitted.
