



OVERSEAS ARRIVALS AND DEPARTURES
AUSTRALIA
SEPTEMBER QUARTER 1983

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MAIN FEATURES

In September quarter 1983, permanent arrivals totalled 17,700, 33 per cent below the total for September quarter 1982. Permanent departures totalled 6,200, 17 per cent above the total for September quarter 1982. Settlers previously resident in Europe fell 48 per cent to 7,600, while those from Oceania (including New Zealand) fell 45 per cent to 1,700. The total from Asia rose marginally to 6,100. Long term visitor arrivals, at 5,300, were 29 per cent down on the total for September quarter 1982.

Short term visitor arrivals in September quarter totalled 227,700, a marginal increase on the total for September quarter 1982. This was the first quarter in 1983 in which visitor arrivals rose above 1982 levels. Visitors from Asia rose 9 per cent from September quarter 1982 to 43,100, due principally to an increase in travellers from Japan. Short term resident departures continued at lower levels than for 1982 for the third quarter in succession in 1983, at 333,400 (down 3 per cent). The principal cause was a decline in departures to the USA, down 30 per cent to 32,400.

EXPLANATORY NOTES

Introduction

This publication contains statistics of overseas arrivals in, and departures from, Australia during the quarter ended 30 September 1983, together with related statistics from earlier periods. Monthly statistics, in less detail, are released in the monthly publication, *Overseas Arrivals and Departures, Australia* (3401.0) in advance of quarterly statistics.

Source of the statistics

2. Persons arriving in or departing from Australia are required to complete prescribed questionnaires in the form of Incoming and Outgoing Passenger cards (see Appendix A). These cards provide information to the Department of Immigration and Ethnic Affairs for administrative purposes and serve as the source of statistics of overseas arrivals and departures. In accordance with the *Census and Statistics Act 1905*, information relating to individuals, individual flights or ships and individual carriers which is contained in these cards or other documents is treated as confidential by the ABS.

Scope

3. The statistics in this publication relate to the number of movements of travellers rather than the number of travellers; (i.e., the multiple movements of individual persons during a given reference period are each counted separately). However, the statistics exclude the movements of operational air crew and ships' crew, transit passengers who pass through Australia but are not cleared for entry, and passengers on pleasure cruises commencing and finishing in Australia aboard ships not then engaged on regular voyages.

Definitions

Category of movement

4. Category of movement is primarily determined by the passenger's selection of his or her own category on the passenger card. This selection is accepted provided it is consistent with other information on the card.

Permanent movement

5. Permanent movement consists of movement of persons who, on arrival, state that they intend to settle in Australia (settlers) and persons who are Australian residents (including former settlers) departing permanently, i.e. those who on departure state that they do not intend to return to Australia.

Long-term movement

6. Long-term movement is defined as the arrivals of visitors and the temporary departures by Australian residents with the intention to stay, in Australia or abroad respectively, for twelve months or more, together with the departure of visitors and the return of Australian residents who had stayed, in Australia or abroad, for twelve months or more (see also paragraph 8 below).

Short-term movement

7. Movements of travellers whose intended or actual period of stay is less than twelve months are classified as short-term (see also paragraph 8 below).

8. A significant number of travellers (i.e. visitors to Australia on arrival and Australian residents going abroad) state exactly 12 months or one year as their intended period of stay. Many of them stay for less than that period and on their departure from, or return to, Australia are therefore classified as short-term. Accordingly, in an attempt to maintain consistency between arrivals and departures, movements of travellers who report their actual or intended period of stay as being one year exactly are randomly allocated to long-term or short-term, in proportion to the number of movements of travellers who report their actual length of stay as up to one month more, or one month less, than one year.

Country of embarkation or disembarkation

9. Country of embarkation or disembarkation refers to the country in which the traveller boards the actual flight or ship which brings him to Australia, or alights from the actual flight or ship which takes him from Australia. Travellers may answer this incorrectly, perhaps naming the country in which their journey commenced or will end, notwithstanding any changes of flight or ship en route.

State of clearance

10. State of clearance refers to the State in which a passenger is cleared by Customs and Immigration Authorities. Embarkation or disembarkation and clearance are usually, but not necessarily, in the same State.

State or country of residence

11. State of residence or country of residence refers to the State or country in which the traveller regards himself as living or as last having lived. State of intended residence is derived from the intended address given by settlers and Australian residents returning after a journey abroad. Particularly in the case of the former, this information does not necessarily relate to the State in which a traveller will eventually establish a permanent residence.

Country of birth, residence or citizenship

12. Statistics on these items have certain limitations. For instance, it is not possible to make a distinction between Northern Ireland and the Republic of Ireland, (for most of the tables in this publication 'Ireland' refers to 'The Republic of Ireland' plus 'Ireland, undefined'. Previously, these tables showed the U.K. and Ireland combined) nor to separately identify England, Scotland and Wales. Similarly 'Korea' could refer to North or South Korea and 'Germany' to the Federal Republic or to the Democratic Republic.

State of stay and country of stay for short-term travellers

13. Overseas visitors are asked on arrival for their intended address and on departure for the name of the State in which they spent most time. Australian residents travelling overseas are asked on departure for the name of the country in which they intend to spend most time and on their return for the name of the country in which they spent most time.

Occupation

14. From July 1979, occupation data are only available for permanent and long-term movement. Permanent arrivals are allocated to an occupation group on the basis of recognised occupational qualifications at the time of application for entry to Australia, and permanent departures and all long-term movements are coded to occupation groups on the basis of the occupation stated on the passenger card.

Estimation method

15. Overseas arrival and departure statistics are derived from a combination of full enumeration and sampling. Fully enumerated strata cover all movements by sea regardless of duration of stay, all permanent movements and all movements with a duration of stay of more than one year. All movements by air with a duration of stay equal to or less than one year are sampled and statistics relating to these movements are therefore estimates which may differ from statistics which would have been obtained if details of all these movements had been processed. Details of the sampling method and comments on the sampling errors associated with the estimates are contained in the Technical note on page 3.

Corrections and imputations

16. The imprecision due to sampling errors should not be confused with errors arising from imperfections in reporting, which may occur in any data collection whether sampled or not. Every effort is made to minimise such errors, both through careful design of the passenger cards and through checks on the information once it is received. During the edit process some items are corrected where they conflict with other known information. Missing replies to certain items such as age and country of birth are also imputed by reference to other related items.

17. Errors of this kind differ from discrepancies arising from the fact that certain information reflects the passengers' intentions at the time the cards were completed. These intentions are of course subject to change. The items particularly affected by such discrepancies are the distinction between permanent and temporary movement and in the latter case, length of intended stay, country of intended stay, State of intended address and reason for journey.

Additional statistics available

18. In some cases, the ABS can also make available information which is not published. This information may be made available in one or more of the following forms: microfiche, photocopy, data tape, computer printout, clerically-extracted tabulations. Generally, a charge is made for providing unpublished information. A full list of Overseas Arrival and Departure tabulations regularly produced is available on request.

TECHNICAL NOTE : METHOD OF SAMPLING AND RELIABILITY OF ESTIMATES

Method of sampling

All movements by air with a duration of stay equal to or less than one year are sampled using the following stratification:

<i>Country of Citizenship</i>	<i>Sample</i>
U.S.A.	1 in 30
U.K., Australia or New Zealand	1 in 20
Canada or Japan	1 in 10
Other	1 in 4

Reliability of estimates

Estimates based on a sample are subject to sampling variability, i.e. they may differ from those that would be obtained from a full enumeration.

The sampling error associated with any estimate can be estimated from the sample results and one measure so derived is the standard error. Given an estimate and the standard error on that estimate, there

are about two chances in three that the sample estimate will differ by less than one standard error from the figure that would have been obtained from full enumeration, and about nineteen chances in twenty that the difference will be less than two standard errors. Another measure of the sampling error is the relative standard error which is obtained by expressing the standard error as a percentage of the estimate.

It would be impracticable to publish estimates of standard errors for all figures in individual tables. However, the following table of standard errors and relative standard errors gives an indication of the magnitude of the sampling error associated with any estimate of a particular size for short-term and total movement. Long-term movement is subject to some sampling in that some movements of one year's duration (which are sampled) are allocated to the long-term category. The numbers involved, however, are small and resultant sampling errors associated with figures of long-term movement are negligible.

An example of the use of this table is as follows: if the estimate of the number of Australian resident departures for short-term visits is 500, then the standard error on this estimate is 95, i.e. there are two chances in three that the actual number of Australian resident departures for a short-term visit will lie between 405 and 595 and nineteen chances in twenty that it will lie between 310 and 690.

As the table shows, the larger the size of an estimate the smaller the relative standard error. For any estimate of greater than 10,000 the relative standard error will be less than 4 per cent and so the sampling error can be assumed to be negligible for most practical purposes.

The estimate of the difference between an estimate in two different periods or between estimates from the

same period is also subject to sampling error. The standard error on the difference between any two estimates which are subject to sampling error can be approximated by using the larger standard error of the estimates inflated by a factor of 1.4. An example of the use of this procedure is as follows:

Assume the estimates of the number of arrivals to Australia of visitors who stated 'attending convention' as the purpose of journey in July 1981 and 1982 are 1,214 and 811 respectively. The difference between the 1981 and the 1982 figures is 403 and the standard errors on these estimates are approximately 90 and 84. The standard error on the difference is approximately $(1.4 \times 90) = 126$, and there are nineteen chances in twenty that the estimate of the difference between the two years will lie between 151 and 655.
