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SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

Schools, Students and Teachers

At 25 July 1990 there were 784,362 full-time students enrolled in 2,753 schools in Victoria. Of these, 428,882 were enrolled as primary students and 355,480 were enrolled as secondary students.

Government schools accounted for the majority of enrolments in 1990, with 526,576 students attending 2,038 schools, a decrease of 0.2 per cent compared to 1989. This gradual decline in government school enrolments was fairly consistent throughout the 1980s.

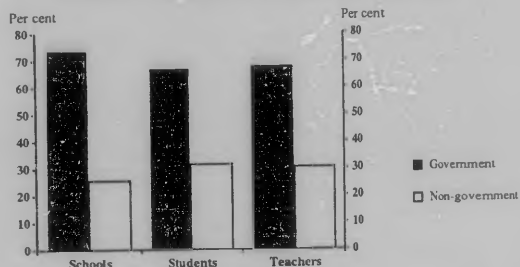
Of the remaining 257,786 students enrolled in 1990, 177,707 (68.9 per cent) attended Catholic schools, 27,649 (10.7 per cent) attended Anglican schools and 52,486 (20.4 per cent) attended other non-government schools. There was a gradual increase in the number of enrolments in non-government schools in the 1980s.

In 1990, students and teachers in special schools have been included in the overall numbers of students and teachers. This is due to the increasing trend of integrating, where possible, 'special' students into mainstream education.

The number of full-time and part-time teaching staff at all schools in Victoria totalled 59,475 persons, representing 56,459 full-time equivalent (FTE) staff units.

There was the equivalent of 39,950 full-time teaching staff in government schools in July 1990, a decrease of 1.9 per cent since 1989. However, the teaching staff in non-government schools totalled 16,508 full-time equivalent units, an increase of 0.6 per cent.

Age participation rate

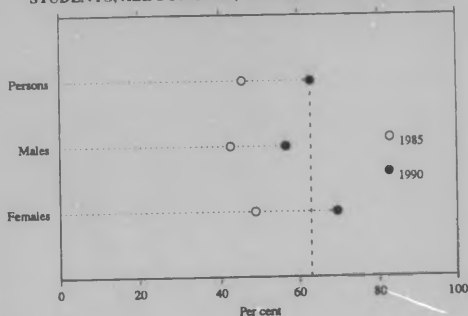
The age participation rate is the number of school students of a particular age and sex expressed as a proportion of the total population of the same age and sex in a specified year and indicates the percentage of students still at school. It does not include students participating in education outside the school system (e.g. universities, TAFEs, and Colleges of Advanced Education).

As education in Victoria is compulsory until a person attains fifteen years of age, the participation rate for 15 year olds in 1990 was very high, being 93.5 per cent for males and 96.9 per cent for females. This participation rate is lower than 100 per cent as the Census date for the collection (from which this publication is compiled) is in July and some students with birthdays prior to the census date leave school as soon as they attain fifteen years of age.

There was a general increase in the participation rate for 16 year olds in the late 1980s. The participation rate for females in 1985 was 78.2 per cent and for males 73.5 per cent. This increased to 87.8 per cent for females and 80.7 per cent for males in 1990.

The increase over the decade has been more significant, however, for 17 year olds. The male participation rate has increased from 42.7 per cent in 1985 to 56.8 per cent in 1990, and for females from 49.3 per cent to 69.8 per cent. These increases are due to factors such as changing economic and labour market circumstances, as well as government policy which encourages all students to continue to the senior levels of education.

Apparent retention rates

Apparent retention rates are measures of the tendencies of students to remain in secondary education from Year 7 to the senior years of secondary schooling. To calculate the apparent retention rates of students in Year 12 in 1990, the number of those students is expressed as a proportion of the students enrolled in Year 7 in 1985 (1985 being the year in which the 1990 Year 12 students would normally have enrolled in Year 7). The retention rate thus derived is called an **apparent retention rate** because this method of calculation does not take account net changes to the school population due to migration, transfers between government and non-government schools, and repeating or returning students.

The apparent retention rate to Year 12 has increased significantly over the last five years. For male students in all schools the retention rate increased from 40.3 per cent in 1985 to 57.4 per cent in 1990, and for female students an increase from 50.9 per cent in 1985 to 74.0 per cent in 1990 was recorded. Apparent retention rates are much higher in non-government schools, but it should be noted that these figures can be affected significantly by transfers from the government system to the non-government system.

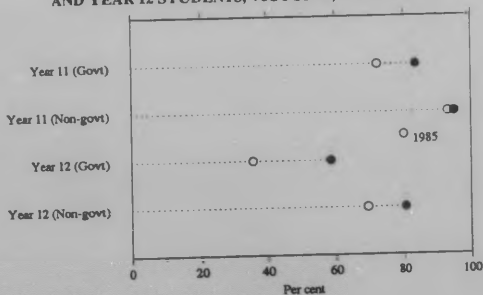

CHART 4. NUMBER OF SCHOOLS BY LEVEL, VICTORIA, 1985 AND 1990

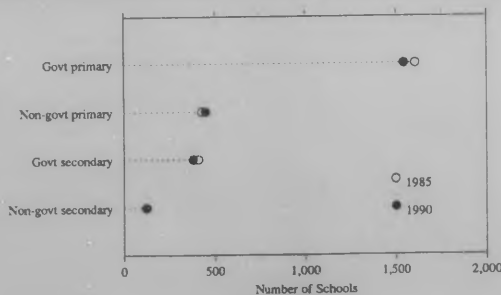

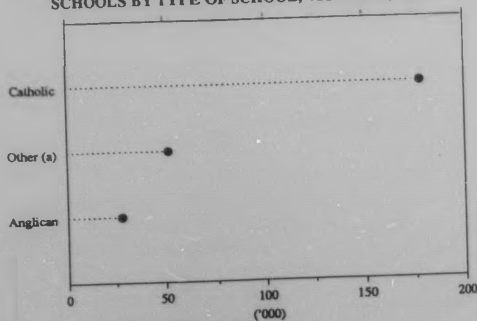

AND NON-GOVERNMENT SCHOOLS, VICTORIA, 1985 AND 1990

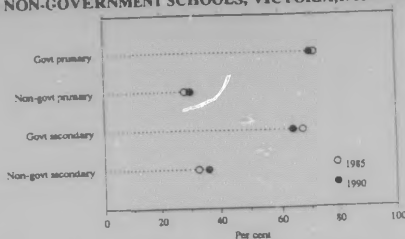

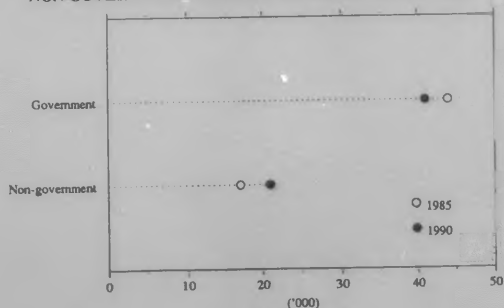

It should be noted that some students attend a school in a statistical local area other than the one in which they reside and it is emphasised that this table does not indicate the number of students residing in each statistical local area. (b) For the purposes of this table, all students at special schools are included under primary education, therefore, total number of students may vary from totals in previous tables. (c) Does not include staff working across statistical local areas.

GLOSSARY

1. A *non-special school* must satisfy the following criteria:

- (a) its major activity is
 - (i) the provision of full-time day primary or secondary education, or
 - (ii) the provision of primary or secondary education by correspondence;
- (b) it is headed by a principal (or equivalent) responsible for its internal operation; and
- (c) it is possible for students to enrol for a minimum of four continuous weeks, excluding breaks for school vacations.

A *multi-campus school* is one which operates on at least two separate sites with separate location addresses. The parent campus is that which governs the subsidiary campus(es).

A *special school* is one which provides special instruction for physically and/or mentally handicapped students, or those with social problems. Students must exhibit one or more of the following characteristics before enrolment is allowed:

- (a) Mental or physical handicap, slow learning ability;
- (b) Social or emotional problems; or
- (c) In custody, on remand.

Note : Special schools in this publication include hospital and prison schools if they are separate establishments and if they permit enrolments for four continuous weeks or more.

2. The term *school* in this publication includes schools in institutions and hospitals, mission schools, and similar establishments. The term excludes pre-schools, kindergarten centres, pre-primary schools or pre-primary classes in or attached to non-special schools, senior technical and agricultural colleges, evening schools, continuation classes, and institutions such as business or coaching colleges.

3. An *ancillary education establishment (AEE)* is an establishment where the major activity is the provision of aspects of primary, secondary, or special education to students supplementary to that provided by schools. AEEs include those education establishments in institutions and hospitals, certain holiday excursion centres, etc., where students cannot

enrol for a period exceeding four continuous weeks.

Note : For the purposes of this publication there were 18 AEEs in 1990 and these have been excluded from the number of schools.

4. *Category of school* refers to the classification of schools/AEEs to the government or non-government sector for the purposes of this collection.

Note : Non-government schools in this publication include special schools administered by the Health Department of Victoria which were not in scope prior to the NSSC series.

5. *Affiliation of non-government schools* is classified to three groups: Anglican, Catholic and Other. Included in the 'Other' category are schools with specific religious affiliations (e.g. Uniting, Presbyterian, Lutheran, Baptist, Pentecostal, Seventh Day Adventist, Greek Orthodox, Jewish, Moslem) and schools that are inter-denominational, non-denominational or which have no religious affiliation.

6. *Primary education* is that full-time education which typically commences at around age 5 and lasts for seven to eight years. It excludes pre-school education. In Victoria primary education may extend from pre-Year 1 to Year 6.

Secondary education is that education which typically commences at around age 12 after completion of primary education and lasts for five or six years. Secondary education may extend from Year 7 to Year 12.

7. *Special education* is that education provided at special schools. There is no upper age limit for students in special schools.

A number of schools (other than special schools) do not maintain a formal grade structure. Students at these schools have been allocated to equivalent grades where possible but otherwise appear against the category 'ungraded'.

8. A *student* is a person who is enrolled in a school and active in a course of study other than pre-school or TAFE courses. Persons absent at the reference date are included if they were expected to be absent for less than four continuous weeks (excluding

school vacations) and are excluded if they had left the school or had been absent without explanation for four continuous weeks (excluding school vacations) prior to the reference week.

A full-time student is one who undertakes a workload specified as full-time in the government or non-government sector.

This publication contains statistics on full-time students only.

9. The *apparent retention rate* is the percentage of students of a given cohort group who continued to a particular Level/Year of education. In this publication, apparent retention rates are calculated for students who continued to Years 10, 11 and 12 of secondary schooling. Care should be exercised in the interpretation of apparent retention rates since a range of factors affecting calculation have not been taken into account. At the Victorian level factors affecting the data, such as enrolment policies (which contribute to different age/grade structures between States), inter-sector transfer and interstate movements of students have not been taken into account.

Part-time students are excluded from apparent retention rates; the effect of this exclusion varies between States.

10. *Staff* are persons who are involved in the administration or provision of primary, secondary, or special education.

As a rule:

- (a) *Full-time equivalents (FTE)* for staff are apportioned across areas of activity on the basis of time spent in the various areas of activity; and
- (b) The functions (general teaching, etc.) of staff are determined on the basis of predominant activity.

School-based teaching staff are those normally paid under a teacher's salary award (or equivalent) and who are in contact with students, i.e. support students either by direct class contact or on an individual basis. They include classroom and general teachers, librarians, teacher librarians, advisors (such as counselling/careers), and relieving teachers but exclude staff who provide professional support to teachers.

Note:

- (a) Public service awards are not considered to be equivalent to teacher's salary awards; and
- (b) Teachers in promotional positions, such as principals and deputy principals are considered to be teaching staff.

School-based non-teaching staff are those who are not in contact with students, or who are not normally paid under a teacher's salary award (or equivalent).

Full-time staff are those who perform the full allocation of duties specified as full-time in the relevant award, contract, or administrative arrangement. However, persons who are employed full-time but part of whose duties are out-of-scope of the collection (e.g. pre-school, TAFE, etc.) have been regarded as part-time.

Part-time staff are staff who are not employed full-time, or who are employed full-time but part of whose duties are out-of-scope of this collection, e.g. pre-school, TAFE, etc.

Note:

- (a) The full-time equivalent of part-time staff performing some out-of-scope activities is calculated on the basis of the proportion of time spent on in-scope activities compared to that spent by a full-time staff member solely occupied by in-scope activities.
- (b) The full-time equivalent of part-time staff performing solely in-scope activities is calculated on the basis of time worked compared to that worked by full-time staff performing similar duties.

11. *Staff* are categorised as school staff or as non-school staff. They are placed in the former category if they usually spend more than half of their time actively engaged in duties at one or more schools or AEEs.

This publication contains school staff only.

12. The *area of activity of staff* is considered to be primary education or secondary education.

EXPLANATORY NOTES

Introduction

1. This publication contains statistics on government and non-government schools, full-time students, and staff, as at 25 July 1990. Since 1984 it has been based on the National Schools Statistics Collection (NSSC) series which incorporate data for both the government and non-government sectors. (Since the 1986 issue this publication has been titled *Schools Victoria*.)

2. The NSSC series was established through the work of the Australian Education Council School Statistics Committee, of which the ABS is a member. This committee was established in 1979 by the Australian Education Council to improve the quality of education statistics relating to government and non-government primary and secondary education, and has developed a set of concepts, definitions, and classifications for schools, students, and staff, for use in the NSSC.

3. Statistics on government and non-government schools were published in *Primary and Secondary Education, Victoria* (4202.2) until 1983. From 1981 government schools data were published according to the NSSC definitions for schools, students, and teaching staff.

4. The implementation of the NSSC combined both the government and non-government schools collections. With this implementation, concepts, definitions, classifications and coverage were revised. Care should therefore be taken when comparing data, especially for the non-government sector, prior to 1984.

Scope and coverage

5. The statistics in this publication relate to establishments which have as their predominant activity the administration and/or provision of full-time day primary, secondary or special education, or primary or secondary education by correspondence. Major activity is based on the activity of students or, where this is not appropriate, on the activity of staff in full-time equivalent units (FTE). See paragraph 10 in the glossary for details of the calculations of FTE. Those establishments at which some other activity is major are excluded. Therefore, the statistics presented do not include establishments, students, or staff engaged in such activities as courses

conducted by Technical and Further Education (TAFE) institutions.

Census date

6. The census date for the collection was 25 July 1990 (or as near as possible to that date).

Methodology

7. These statistics are compiled from collections conducted in co-operation with the Australian Education Council School Statistics Committee (AECSSC), by the Victorian Ministry of Education (government series) and the Commonwealth Department of Employment, Education and Training (non-government series).

(a) The methodology employed by the Victorian Ministry of Education in the government sector in compiling the state aggregates on which the statistics in this publication are based, ranges from manipulation of central administrative records to direct collection of data from establishments;

(b) The Commonwealth Department of Employment, Education and Training collects data directly from establishments in the non-government sector for all States and Territories. The statistics in this publication are a Victorian summary of that collection.

Interpretation of results

8. Because of the diversity of the Australian education system and its administration, the statistics reported in this publication and other State and Territory publications are not entirely comparable. Comparability between States and between government and non-government schools in any one State is affected by differences in the organisation of grades, policy on student advancement, flows from secondary to vocational education, and the recruitment and employment of teachers.

Statistical areas

9. The locations of schools or campuses are now classified according to the Australian Standard Geographical Classification (ASGC) Edition 3. The Statistical Local Areas (SLA) of the ASGC are either equal to, or have been aggregated to, legal Local Government Areas (legal LGAs) previously published, with three

exceptions. The Shires of Cranbourne, Healesville, and Pakenham are each composed of two SLAs which are shown separately, one within Melbourne Statistical Division (MSD) and the other in East Central Statistical Division.

10. The small area data presented in Tables 14 and 15 include Labour Force regions. Detailed maps of the Labour Force regions are presented at the end of this publication. Users should note that from September 1987 there have been some significant changes made to the number and composition of Labour Force regions for the Melbourne Statistical Division. These changes are presented in the maps mentioned above.
