AUSTRALIAN PARLIAMENTS

The six States with their included Territories were federated under the name Commonwealth of Australia on 1 January 1901.

The Legislature of Australia and of each State except Queensland is bicameral, consisting of an Upper and a Lower House. In Queensland the Upper House was abolished in 1922. In the Commonwealth Parliament the Upper House is known as the Senate and the Lower as the House of Representatives; in the bicameral States the Upper House is known as the Legislative Council and the Lower House, in New South Wales, Victoria, and Western Australia, as the Legislative Assembly (which is also the name of the Queensland Parliament) and in South Australia and Tasmania, as the House of Assembly. The Northern Territory attained self-government in 1978 and the Australian Capital Territory in 1989. The governing body of each Territory is known as the Legislative Assembly.

The members of the Parliaments of each State and Territory are elected by the people, the franchise extending to Australian citizens who are at least 18 years of age and possess certain residential qualifications. For the Commonwealth Parliament the qualifications for the franchise are identical for both Houses, extending to Australian citizens who are on the Commonwealth roll and who are not less than 18 years of age and British subjects enrolled prior to 25 January 1984.

The table opposite shows details on members of Australian Parliamentary Governments, including their salaries and allowances.

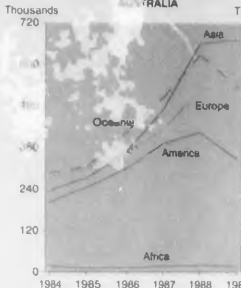

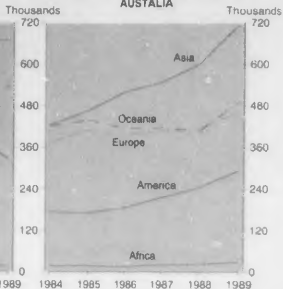

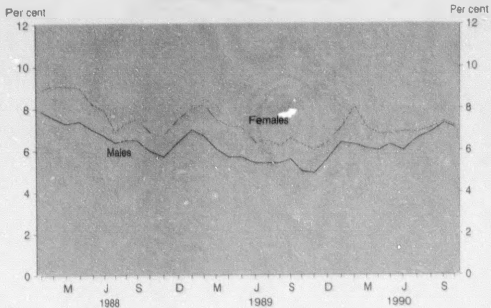

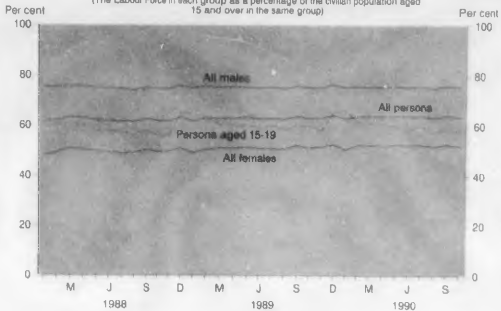

Child disability allowance is payable to the parent or guardian of a child under 16 years or a dependant full-time student aged 16 to 24 years who is physically, intellectually or psychiatrically disabled and requires constant care and attention in the family home.

At 30 June 1990 there were 37,746 recipients of the child disability allowance in respect of 40,222 children. The amount paid during the year 1989-90 was \$61.7 million.

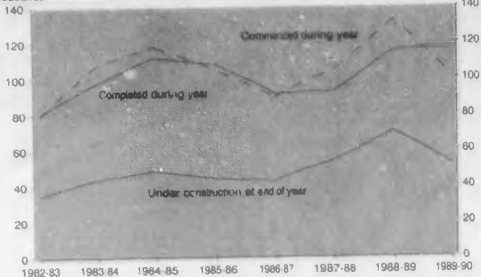

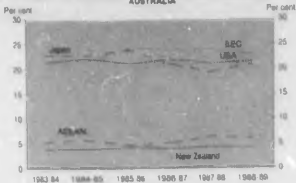

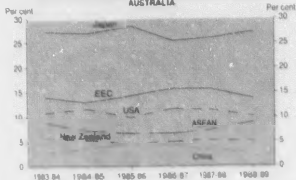

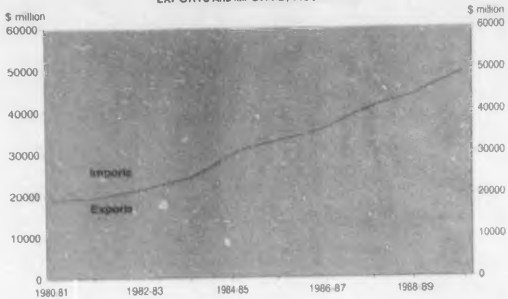
