Geography and government

Geography

New South Wales lies between the 28th and 35th parallels of south latitude and between the 141st and 154th meridians of east longitude. The total area of the State is 801,600 square kilometres—about one tenth of the area of Australia.

Natural features divide the State into four main zones extending from north to south: the coastal zone (varying in width from 80 kilometres in the north to 50 kilometres in the south); the tablelands; the western slopes of the tablelands; and the western plains (which occupy nearly two thirds of the area of the State).

The State is situated entirely within the temperate zone, its climate being generally mild and mostly free from extremes of heat and cold. The range of mean temperatures between the hottest and coldest months in Sydney is less than 11°C. Rainfall varies widely over the State, gradually diminishing from an annual average of about 2,000 millimetres in parts of the north coast to about 200 millimetres in the far north-west. The seasons generally are as follows: spring during September, October and November; summer during December, January and February; autumn during March, April and May; and winter during June, July and August.

The mean solar time of the 150th meridian of east longitude has been adopted as the standard time for New South Wales, which is therefore 10 hours ahead of Greenwich Mean Time. New South Wales has 'summer time' (daylight saving of one hour (half an hour on Lord Howe Island)) which operates from the last Sunday in October to the first Sunday in March of the following year.

Despite its large area, NSW has a highly urbanised society with approximately 74 per cent of the population living in population centres of 20 000 persons or more (including approximately 55 per cent in Sydney, 5 per cent in Newcastle, 4 per cent in Wollongong and 2 per cent on the Central Coast). The major part of the employed labour force is in wholesale and retail trade, community services and manufacturing, with only about 5 per cent in agriculture and mining.

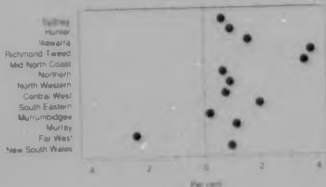

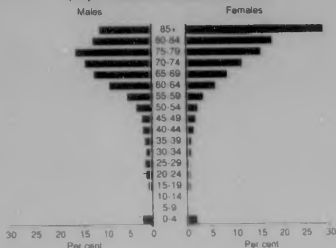

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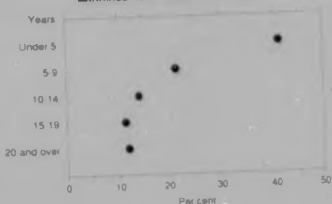

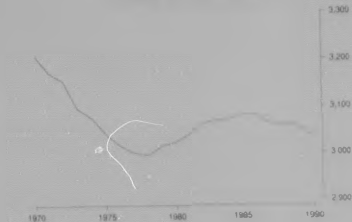

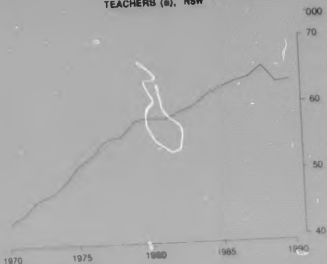

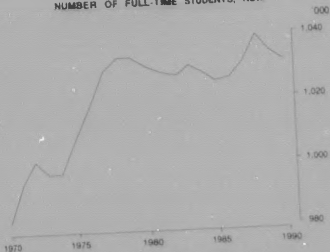

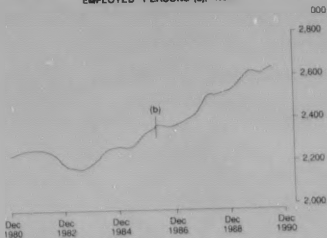

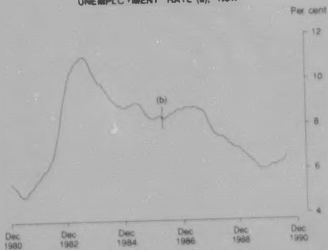
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EMPLOYED PERSONS (a), NSW

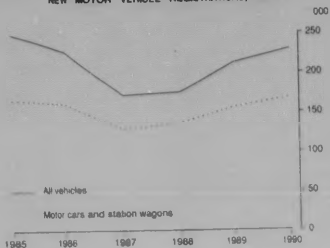

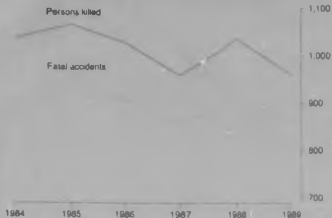

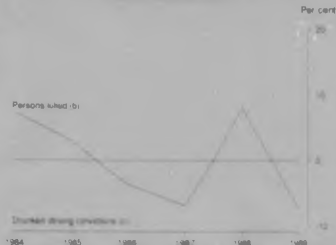

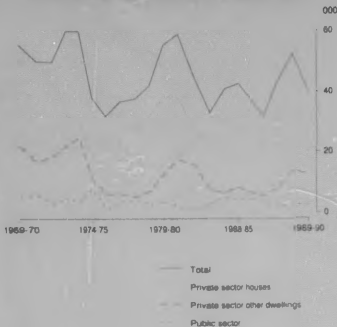

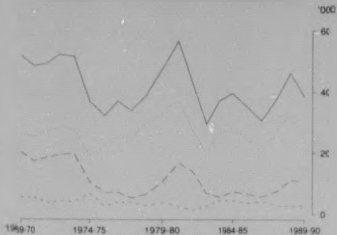

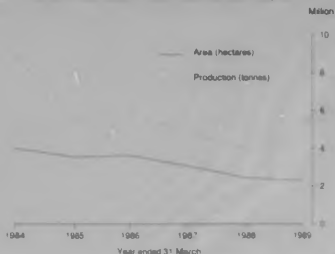

WHEAT FOR GRAIN: AREA AND PRODUCTION, NSW

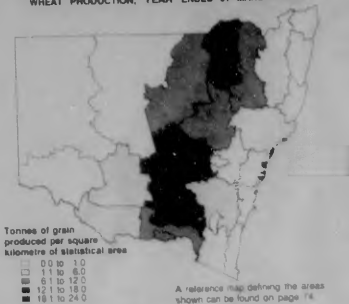

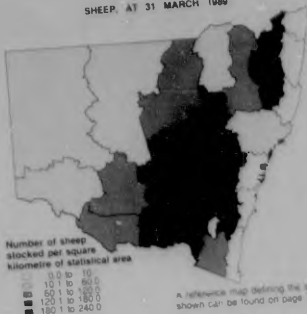

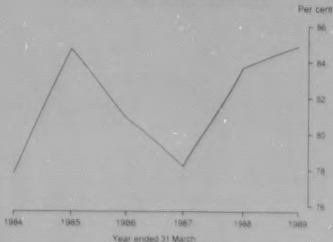

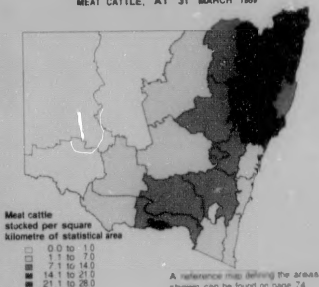

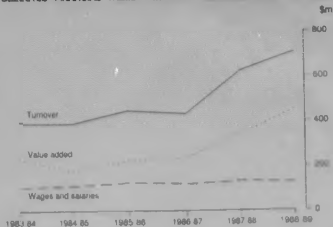

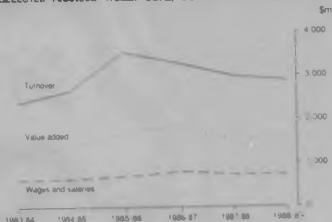

SELECTED FINANCIAL ITEMS: COAL, OIL AND GAS INDUSTRY, NSW

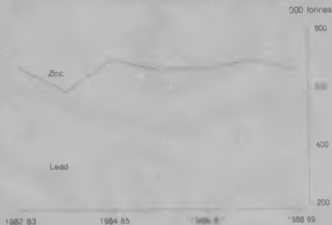

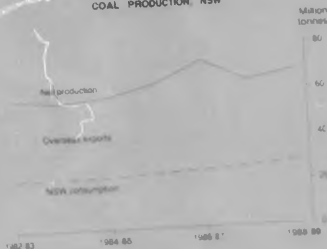

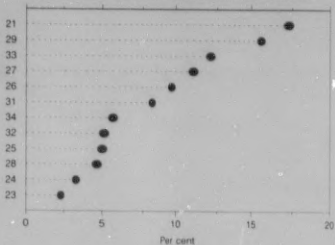

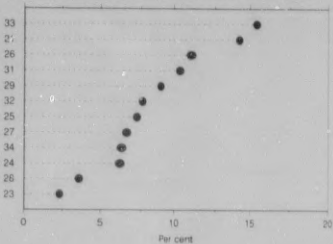

EMPLOYMENT BY INDUSTRY SUBDIVISION, NSW, 1988-89

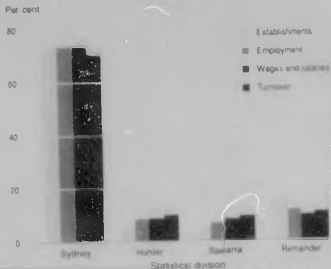

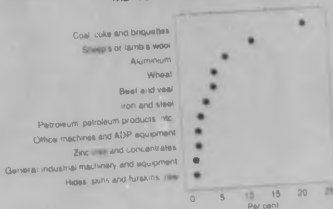

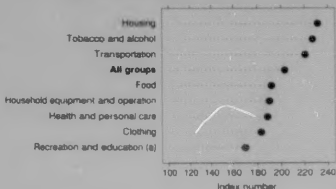

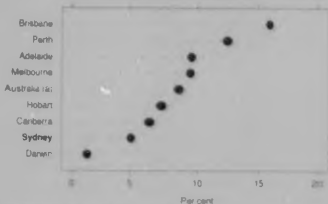

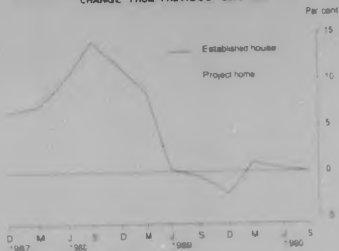
ESTABLISHED HOUSE PRICE INDEX

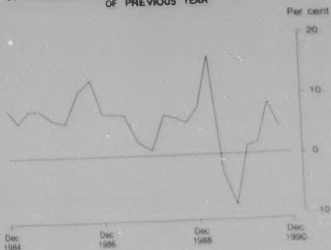

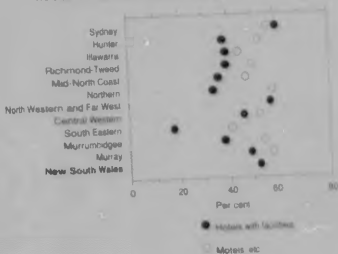
