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MAIN FEATURES

- The estimated resident population of New South Wales at 31 December 1983 was 5,378,300 representing an increase during the year of 44,700 (or 0.84 per cent). This increase reverses the trend towards higher levels of increase since 1976. With the exception of 1975 and 1976, the increase in 1983 is the smallest numerical increase since 1953 and the lowest percentage increase since 1943.
- The net increase in population due to overseas migration showed a 49 per cent drop from 38,151 in 1982 to 19,460 in 1983.
- In 1983, there were 27,340 overseas arrivals intending to settle in N.S.W. This was a significant decrease on the corresponding figures for 1982 (37,275) and 1981 (42,894). However, the number of Asian born arrivals in 1983 was 12,210 (or 44.7 per cent of all arrivals) compared with 11,373 (30.5 per cent) in 1982 and 12,421 (29.0 per cent) in 1981. In contrast, corresponding figures for European born arrivals were 9,120 (33.4 per cent), 17,951 (48.2 per cent) and 20,256 (47.2 per cent) in 1983, 1982 and 1981 respectively.
- Mid-North Coast and Richmond-Tweed continue to be the fastest growing Statistical Divisions of the State, in percentage terms. The annual rates of increase in estimated resident population of those Divisions during 1982-83 were 3.58 per cent (6,650 persons) and 3.28 per cent (4,600 persons), respectively.

EXPLANATORY NOTES

1. Census counts

(a) The periodic census enumerations of population and housing are the most detailed source of information about the population of New South Wales. At the census, people are enumerated at the 'dwelling' where they spent census night (or where they returned the following day, not having been counted elsewhere); i.e., they are counted at their 'place of actual location' within Australia on census night, which may not be their 'place of usual residence'.

(b) The census enumerates defence personnel, persons on vessels in or between Australian ports and on long-distance trains, buses or aircraft, and visitors to Australia regardless of how long ago they arrived and how long they plan to stay. However, it excludes Australian residents out of the country on census night and foreign diplomatic personnel and their families.

2. Census under-enumeration

(a) While every effort is made to minimise under-enumeration in all field collections,

including the census, some inevitably remains for various reasons (e.g. inadvertent omission of very young children, treatment by the collector of an occupied dwelling as unoccupied). Refusal by householders to complete the census schedule is not a significant cause of under-enumeration, as estimates by the collector are used in such cases. These and similar problems are common to all population censuses, and the degree of under-enumeration in Australia is very low by world standards.

(b) A post-enumeration survey, designed to measure the degree of under-enumeration in the census, is conducted after each census by specially trained interviewers. Net under-enumeration in the State is derived by comparing results from the census and the post-enumeration survey for the same individuals, and identifying omissions and duplications in the census. The census counts shown in Tables 1 to 7 have not been adjusted for under-enumeration. Adjustments for under-enumeration are applied only to census counts on a place of usual residence basis, when making estimates of resident population (see 6(b) below). The adjustment applied to the 1981

Census count of usual residents of New South Wales was 1.788 per cent.

3. Random adjustment of small cells

The ABS has an obligation to protect the confidentiality of information which it receives from individuals and businesses. The number of census characteristics tabulated and the detail requested in census releases inevitably produces tables in which there are many cells with very small numbers. These may inadvertently allow the release of identifiable information, even though identifiers (such as names and addresses) are not available. It has been necessary, therefore, for the ABS to randomly adjust small non-zero cells in the more detailed tabulations from the 1981 Census. These adjustments allow the maximum amount of detailed census data to be published. Adjustments made to figures contained in Tables 2, 3, 6, and 7 are insignificant in relative terms.

4. Sampling errors associated with 1976 Census counts

Final results of the 1976 Census for the characteristics of the population as shown in this publication were obtained by processing the household schedules for one half of all private dwellings and the schedules for all non-private dwellings. These results are therefore subject to sampling error - further details are shown in the publication Sampling Errors Associated with Census Estimates (Revised) (2129.0), a copy of which is available on request.

5. Official population estimates for New South Wales

(a) The census provides the basis of all subsequent population estimates. The starting points for estimates are the census counts of people at their place of actual location within Australia on census night. Estimates for intercensal periods are subject to revision when the results of the next census become available.

(b) From the 1981 Census, a new conceptual basis was adopted for official population estimates. A detailed explanation of the new basis is given in the ABS Information Paper entitled Population Estimates: An Outline of the Conceptual Basis of ABS Population Estimates (3216.0). On this

basis, population estimates are now compiled entirely according to the place of usual residence of the population and, as such, are referred to as Estimated Resident Population (see 6 below). To allow some comparison over time, a quarterly time series on a consistent usual residence basis has been compiled for New South Wales back to 1971.

(c) Prior to 1966, official population estimates for intercensal years were simply the counts (place of actual location) from the previous census plus natural increase (births minus deaths) and an estimate of net migration based on movement of population irrespective of the duration of that movement. Due to rapid growth in private travel by car between States, it was decided that, from 1966 onwards, intercensal estimates for the States and Territories in Australia would take movements within Australia into account only according to changes in place of usual residence, as indicated by electoral roll and child endowment transfers. In the early 1970's there were large increases in both numbers and quarter-to-quarter fluctuations of short-term (i.e. periods of less than twelve months) movements overseas, and it was judged that the needs of most users of statistics would be met more adequately if the official population estimates excluded short-term movements. Therefore, from 1976, migration from overseas has been measured by net long-term and permanent overseas movements, and not total net overseas movements as previously.

(d) The original intercensal estimates for the years 1976 to 1981 were made on a hybrid conceptual basis. Because classification by usual residence was not available from the census, nor were data on Australian residents temporarily overseas at the time of the census, the starting point was according to place of actual location on census night but intercensal changes were estimated on a usual residence basis.

6. Estimated Resident Population

(a) The Estimated Resident Population of an area (State, local government area, etc.) is the estimate of the number of persons who usually reside in that area (irrespective of where they may be at the date of the estimate).

(b) The estimated resident population of an area at a census date is based on the census count (place of actual location) for the area with adjustments made by:

i. excluding all visitors who normally reside elsewhere (i.e. overseas or in another area within Australia);

ii. Including residents of the area who were counted in another area within Australia;

iii. adjusting for census under-enumeration as measured by the post-enumeration survey (see 2(b) above); and

iv. Including residents of the area who were temporarily overseas (i.e. for less than twelve months) on census night.

(c) Estimates of residents temporarily overseas on census night, according to their local government area, and therefore State, of usual residence are made from passenger cards completed by all persons arriving in or departing from Australia (see 10 below).

(d) Intercensal estimates of resident population for the State are made on a quarterly basis by adding natural increase and estimated net migration. The net migration component, measured on a usual residence basis, is based on (i) statistics of permanent and long-term overseas migration (i.e. movements of one year or longer) by State of stay or residence, with an adjustment for category jumping to allow for short-term movements becoming 'permanent and long-term' and vice versa, and (ii) estimates of interstate migration derived from transfers of residence based on family allowances and from data obtained from the annual Internal Migration Survey.

(e) Intercensal estimates of the resident population of each local government area are made annually, as at 30 June, by taking into consideration the number of births to and deaths of residents of the local government area as well as other available indicators of population change.

7. Natural Increase

Figures of 'natural increase' for 1971

and earlier years, as shown in Table 22, represent the excess of live births registered over deaths registered in New South Wales. Figures for 1972 and later, as contained in Tables 10 and 22, represent the excess of live births to residents of New South Wales over deaths of residents of New South Wales. Births to, and deaths of, residents of other States which occur in New South Wales are excluded from these figures, but births to, and deaths of, residents of New South Wales which occur in other States are included.

8. Aborigines

(a) Following the repeal in 1967 of Section 127 of the Constitution, full-blood Aborigines have been included in census counts and population estimates relating to 30 June 1966 and all later periods.

(b) Because of deficiencies in identifying full-blood Aboriginal births and deaths (and hence natural increase) from 1933 to 1967, and full-blood Aborigines in censuses prior to 30 June 1966, differences between population estimates including Aborigines and those purporting to exclude them should not be taken as a reliable measure of the number of full-blood Aborigines.

9. Population Projections

(a) The population projections shown in Tables 13 and 14 are based on preliminary estimates of the resident population at 30 June 1981. These projections illustrate the population growth which would occur if certain selected assumptions of future demographic trends are realised. The assumptions, which are outlined in (b) below, are based on an examination of past demographic trends and survey data on birth expectations. There is, however, no certainty that these assumptions and expectations will be realised. More detailed descriptions of the assumptions are shown in the publications Projections of the Population of the States and Territories of Australia, 1981 to 2021 (3214.0) and Projections of the Population of Australia, 1981 to 2021 (3204.0). Alternative projections (Series A, B, C and D) have been provided in recognition of the uncertainty of future movements in demographic trends, and to give users a range of options.

(b) Summary of Assumptions

1. Series A

Fertility - Total fertility rates for New South Wales are assumed to increase from 1,943 in 1981 to 2,013 in 1984, and then decline to 1,900 by 1987 and remain at this level to the end of the projection period. (The Total Fertility Rate represents the number of children born to 1,000 women who live through the child-bearing period and, at each year of age, experience the assumed fertility patterns.)

Mortality - Mortality rates are assumed to decline for the period of the projections. The projected life expectancies at birth in 1986 and 2021 are 72.25 and 73.42 years for males, and 79.58 and 82.64 years for females. In 1981, the expectation of life at birth was 71.38 years for males and 78.42 years for females.

Net Migration - It is assumed that New South Wales will gain 18,700 persons annually from migration. This will comprise a gain of 28,700 persons from overseas and a loss of 10,000 persons to the other States and Territories.

11. Series B

Fertility - Total fertility rates for New South Wales are assumed to steadily increase from 1,943 in 1981 to 2,110 in 1987 and remain at this level to the end of the projection period.

Mortality - as for Series A.

Net Migration - as for Series A.

111. Series C

Fertility - as for Series A.

Mortality - as for Series A.

Net Migration - It is assumed that New South Wales will gain 37,700

persons annually from migration. This will comprise a gain of 47,700 persons from overseas and a loss of 10,000 persons to the other States and Territories.

iv. Series D

Fertility - as for Series B.

Mortality - as for Series A.

Net Migration - as for Series C.

10. Overseas arrivals and departures

(a) Statistics of overseas arrivals and departures are compiled from information contained on Incoming and Outgoing Passenger Cards which persons arriving in, or departing from, Australia are required to complete.

(b) Overseas arrivals and departures are classified according to the length of their stay, as stated by travellers upon arrival in, or departure from, Australia. In the classification:

i. Permanent movement covers persons arriving to settle permanently in Australia and Australian residents leaving to settle permanently abroad.

11. Long-term or short-term movement

'Long-term movement' comprises (a) in the case of arrivals, Australian residents returning from abroad after an absence of twelve months or more from Australia and visitors arriving with the intention to stay in Australia for at least twelve months, and (b) in the case of departures, Australian residents leaving with the intention to stay abroad for at least twelve months and visitors leaving after a stay of about twelve months or more. 'Short-term movement' covers all arrivals or departures of passengers whose intended or actual period of stay in Australia or overseas was less than twelve months.

Note. A significant number of passengers report their actual or intended period of stay as being exactly twelve months (or one year), and are randomly allocated to long-term or short-term in proportion to the number of passengers who report their actual length of stay as one month more or one month less than a year.

Defence Personnel. All movement of Australian defence personnel has been treated in the same manner as the civilian movement - see above.

(c) Excluded from the figures of overseas arrivals and departures are passengers passing through Australia on board the same ship or on the same flight, passengers on short pleasure sea cruises commencing and finishing in Australia on ships not then engaged in regular voyages (the definition of 'cruises' was extended from 13 June 1972), and all members of the crews of ships and aircraft. Also excluded are overseas passengers arriving at Sydney airport and intending to proceed overseas on another flight without leaving the airport transit area.

(d) Statistics of characteristics (i.e. age, sex, country of residence or stay, country of embarkation or disembarkation, and purpose of journey) of travellers are derived from a combination of full enumeration and sampling. The following stratification is used: (i) fully enumerated strata - all movement by sea (permanent, long-term and short-term), all permanent movement by air, all movement by air with a duration of stay of more than twelve months and all movement with a 'not stated' duration of stay; and (ii) sample strata - all passengers by air with a duration of stay equal to or less than twelve months, sub-stratified by country of citizenship of U.S.A., U.K., Ireland, New Zealand or Australia (1 in 20), Canada or Japan (1 in 10), or any other country (1 in 4); data for 1978 and earlier years were sub-stratified on a slightly different basis. Since statistics of short-term movement are estimates based on a sample and subject to sampling errors, the estimates are likely to differ from figures that would be obtained from full enumeration. Although statistics of long-term movement are based mainly on

completely enumerated records, they are nevertheless partly estimated for movement of passengers by air who report their actual or intended period of stay as being exactly twelve months (or one year), as mentioned earlier.

(e) Although prior to September 1983 figures have not been rounded, the sums of components may not add exactly to totals because of the estimation procedures used in deriving totals. From September 1983, figures have been rounded to the nearest hundred or ten consistent with their general level of reliability.

(f) In Tables 15 and 16, statistics of overseas arrivals and departures represent ship and aircraft passengers cleared by customs and immigration authorities at New South Wales ports. The figures in these tables may therefore include overseas passengers travelling via New South Wales to or from other States, and exclude those travelling via other States to or from New South Wales. They should not be taken, therefore, to represent the true overseas migration to or from New South Wales.

(g) In Tables 17 to 19, figures are given for the number of overseas passengers arriving at or departing from all ports in Australia who spend most time in New South Wales (short-term visitors departing) or whose State of last residence was New South Wales (all other departures), or whose State of intended stay (short-term visitors arriving) or intended residence (all other arrivals) was New South Wales.

11. Internal Migration Survey

(a) Information contained in Table 20 is derived from the Internal Migration Survey which, since 1977, has been conducted on a more or less annual basis to determine the number and characteristics of persons changing residence. The survey is based on a multi-stage area sample of private dwellings (houses, flats, etc.) and non-private dwellings (hotels, motels, etc.) and covers about two-thirds of one per cent of the population of Australia. It is designed to include persons aged 15 years and over except:

- i. members of the permanent defence forces;

- ii. certain diplomatic personnel of overseas governments, customarily excluded from census and estimated populations;

- iii. overseas visitors in Australia;

- iv. members of non-Australian defence forces (and their dependants) stationed in Australia; and

- v. boarding school pupils, some patients in hospitals and sanatoria, inmates of jails, reformatories, etc.

(b) For the purposes of the survey, persons were classified as having moved if the address of their usual place of residence at the survey date was different from that twelve months earlier. No information was obtained about the moves between these dates. Persons who were resident at the same address on both dates, but who may have moved away and returned during this period, were not counted as having moved.

(c) Since the estimates are based on information obtained from occupants of a sample of dwellings, they are subject to sampling error and may differ from figures that would have been produced if the information had been obtained from occupants of all dwellings. Details of sampling error are outlined in the Technical Note included in the publication Internal Migration, Australia (3408.0).

(d) Mobility rates are calculated by relating the number of persons who change their place of residence to the population according to place of residence at the survey date. Where persons have moved from Sydney Statistical Division to elsewhere in the State (i.e. Rest of N.S.W.), and vice versa, a rate has been calculated using the population figure for each of the areas independently. Rates of this kind are more commonly expressed in relation to the population at the beginning of the period or at the mid-point of the period, or the mean population. The populations at the survey date have been chosen as denominator because estimates for other dates are not available in the detail required.

12. Statistical summary - Tables 21 to 23 (pages 23 to 28)

(a) The figures of natural increase shown for 1932 and earlier years in Table 22 were compiled by the Government Statistician of New South Wales. As the figures include births and deaths of full-blood Aborigines, they differ from the figures published by the Australian Statistician. However, for the sake of uniformity, the population estimates prepared by the Australian Statistician have been adopted for all years throughout this publication.

(b) In Table 22, the difference between (i) the sum of natural increase and the net migration, and (ii) the total increase in population, represents:

- i. for the period 1907 to 1932, the difference between the natural increase as shown and the natural increase as compiled by the Australian Statistician and used in the population estimates; and
- ii. for the period from September 1939 to June 1947, the deaths of defence personnel.

13. Statistical areas of New South Wales

(a) For the purpose of presenting the principal series of official statistics for the State, New South Wales is divided into a smaller number of geographical areas. These areas consist, for the most part, of aggregations of local government areas.

(b) The primary division of the State is into 12 statistical divisions. These are intended to represent 'regions' of the State which are characterised by discernible social and/or economic links between the inhabitants and economic units within them, under the unifying influence of one or more major cities or towns. The boundaries of the divisions have accordingly been delineated on the basic criterion that the degree of economic and/or social contact and interaction within each division should be maximised. It should be emphasised that the boundaries of the divisions cannot be regarded as sharp lines of demarcation - they may, of necessity, be positioned within peripheral zones in which the influence of two or more

'focal' cities or towns overlap in varying degrees.

(c) In the case of Sydney and its periphery, the factors taken into account in drawing the divisional boundaries are necessarily different from those for the rest of the State. The Sydney Statistical Division is predominantly urban in character - and its boundary was re-delineated in 1976 to embrace the area expected to contain the urban development of Sydney (and associated smaller urban centres) for a period of at least twenty years. This area covers the same area as the 'Sydney Region', as delineated by the State Planning Authority (now the N.S.W. Department of Environment and Planning) in its publication Sydney Region, 1970-2000 A.D., Outline Plan.

(d) The statistical divisions are subdivided to provide a second tier of statistical areas comprising statistical districts and statistical subdivisions.

(e) Statistical districts are areas which encompass an urban centre with a population of 25,000 or more and which are predominantly urban in character. They have been delineated using concepts and criteria similar to those for the Sydney Statistical Division.

(f) Statistical subdivisions within the Sydney Statistical Division were delineated in 1976, in order to provide statistical areas of optimum assistance to users (particularly physical and social planners). The boundaries of the seven subdivisions created within Sydney Statistical Division have been drawn to coincide with the regions formed by the former Department of Urban and Regional Development.

(g) Statistical subdivisions outside Sydney Statistical Division are component areas within statistical divisions which have been delineated broadly on the basis of topographical and/or climatic features and reflect, inter alia, some degree of homogeneity of agricultural activity.

(h) The statistical areas, and their constituent local government areas, are listed in Table 12 on pages 10 to 13. Statistical division boundaries are shown on the map on page 29.

14. Urban centres

(a) The current criteria for delimiting, for statistical purposes, the boundaries of 'urban centres' in the State were adopted for the 1966 Population Census - and were also used (with minor modifications) for the 1971, 1976 and 1981 Population Censuses. The boundaries of urban centres will be adjusted, on the basis of those criteria, at each population census - as urbanisation proceeds, the boundaries will be moved outwards to embrace peripheral urban development. More specific details of these criteria were included in the 1981 issue of this publication.

(b) Until 30 June 1966, 'Urban Sydney' (then termed the Metropolis of Sydney or Sydney Metropolitan Area) comprised the City of Sydney, those contiguous local government areas which were mainly urban in character, and the urban parts of those contiguous peripheral local government areas which had a large rural component. The boundaries had been extended in 1911, 1929, 1933, and 1954 (as described in the 1965 issue of the Population and Vital Statistics part of the Statistical Register) to embrace significant peripheral urban development. From 30 June 1966, 'Urban Sydney' has been defined using criteria as outlined in the 1981 issue of this publication.

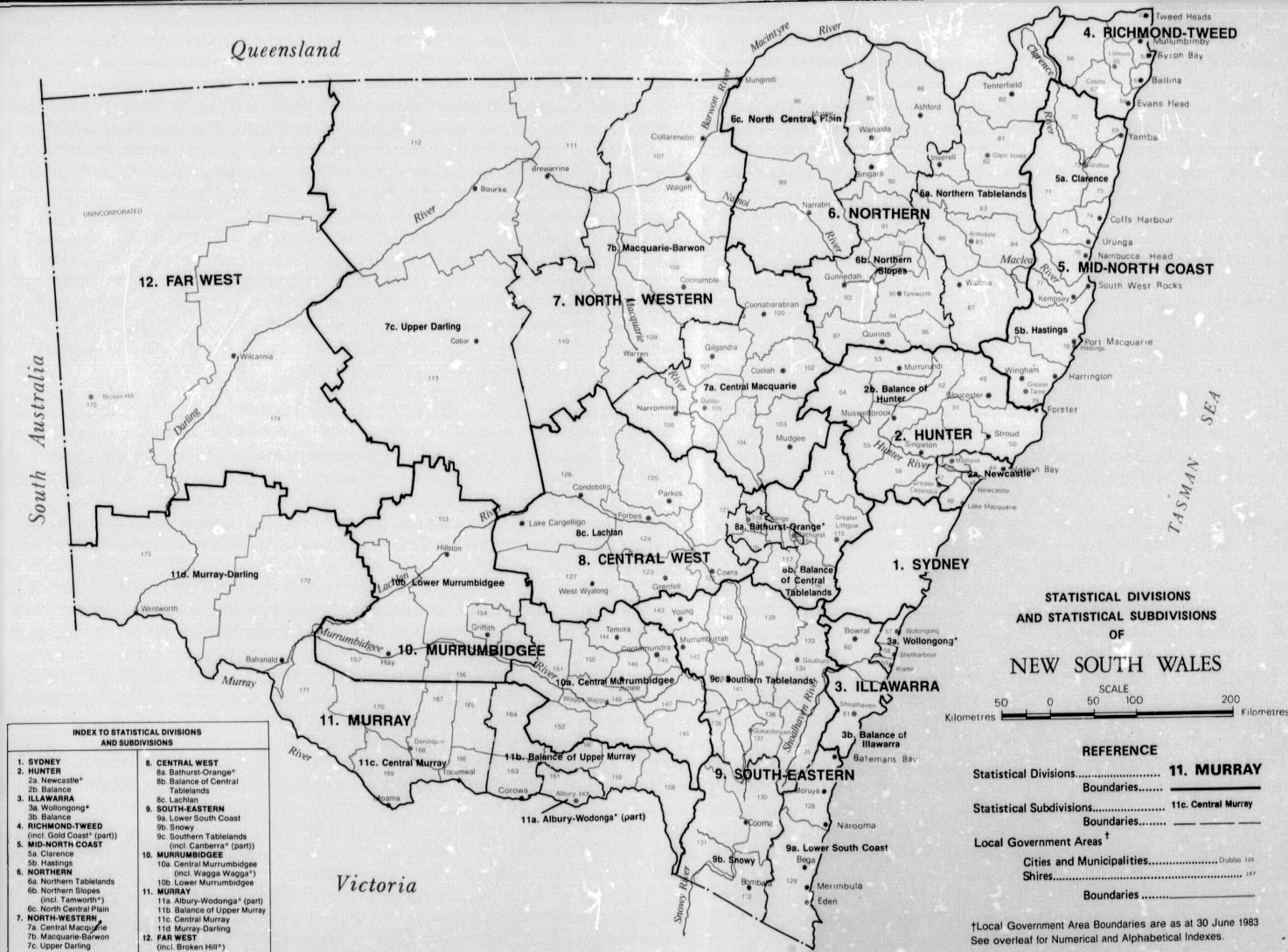

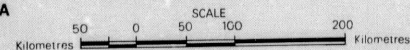

The New South Wales Year Book presents a comprehensive statistical survey of the social, demographic, and economic structure and growth of the State, and describes the legislative provisions and administrative arrangements which are of significance for a proper interpretation and analysis of the statistics of the State. The Pocket Year Book and New South Wales in Brief contain a wide range of statistical and other material in compact form and are useful for handy reference. More recent statistics are available in the Monthly Summary of Statistics. The Handbook of Local Statistics presents a selection of the more important statistics available for geographical areas of the State. More detailed statistics relating to matters treated generally in the above publications are available in the various Subject Bulletins, which range from preliminary monthly statements to detailed bulletins presenting the results of periodic censuses, etc. The date of release and current price of the more important bulletins issued by this Office appears below.
