MAIN FEATURES

Actual Expenditure

Expenditure in the financial year 1982-83 is estimated to have risen by about 2% over 1981-82, after allowance has been made for the change in conceptual basis outlined in paragraphs 12 to 14 of the Explanatory Notes.

Expected Expenditure

Based on businesses' expectations reported in July-August 1983, the estimate of expected expenditure for 1983-84 is \$13,114m. This is 7% higher than the estimate of expected expenditure for 1983-84 recorded in April-May 1983.

EXPLANATORY NOTES

Introduction

This publication contains estimates of actual and expected new fixed capital expenditure by private enterprises in selected industries in Australia. These estimates replace and expand on the preliminary estimates previously published in *New Fixed Capital Expenditure by Private Enterprises in Selected Industries, Australia* (5625.0) released on 18 August 1983.

2. The series contained in this publication have been compiled from data collected in a quarterly survey of private enterprises. The survey is based on a stratified random sample of private enterprises recorded in the Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) central register of economic units. The figures obtained from the selected informants (supplemented by allowances for new enterprises not yet included in the sample framework) are used to calculate estimates of new fixed capital expenditure by all enterprises in the private sector of the Australian economy falling within the industry scope of the survey.

3. Each year the frame work and the sample are revised to ensure that the sample remains representative of the population. In the course of this year's revision all of the smaller enterprises were rotated out of the sample and replaced by others in order to spread reporting workloads. Returns were collected in respect of the June quarter from both the old and new sample to ensure continuity of the series. This year the difference between the old and new sample estimates is not regarded as

statistically significant for estimates of total expenditure for all industries combined. Therefore, the June quarter 1983 estimates presented in this publication are derived from the new sample. However, differences are significant for some of the estimates by industry shown in this publication and care should be taken in using these estimates.

Scope of the survey

4. This survey aims to measure the value of new fixed capital expenditure by all private enterprises in Australia. But, because of the large numbers involved and other collection difficulties, it is not possible to include in the survey those enterprises primarily engaged in agriculture, forestry, fishing, hunting or community service activities. Estimates of the level of net capital expenditure (i.e. acquisitions less disposals) for the agricultural sector are available for selected years in *Agricultural Sector, Financial Statistics, Australia* (7507.0).

5. Private households and public sector enterprises (i.e. all departments, authorities and other organisations owned and/or controlled by Commonwealth, State or Local Government) are outside the present scope of the survey.

Coverage

6. The coverage of enterprises within the scope of this survey is dependent on the completeness of the ABS central register of economic units. Coverage of enterprises classified to Australian Standard Industrial Classification (ASIC) 1978 edition Divisions B (Mining) and C (Manufacturing) and ASIC Subdivision 48 (Retail Trade) is regarded as largely complete except for some types of very small businesses (e.g. part-time businesses, small businesses operated from private homes). For all other ASIC categories, coverage is good for businesses with at least 4-5 employees but is known to be incomplete for businesses employing less than 4-5 persons. This deficiency mainly affects estimates for industries where there are a large number of businesses of this type (e.g. road transport owner drivers, medical and legal practitioners). The estimates of new fixed capital expenditure for any industry will be deficient to the extent that units within the scope of the survey but not in the lists from which the sample is drawn, have significant capital expenditure in total.

7. Those enterprises classified to construction (ASIC Division E) are within the scope of the survey, but because of current problems of maintaining coverage and other collection difficulties the estimates for this industry are considered insufficiently reliable at present for publication. They are however used in conjunction with data from other sources in the compilation of estimates of private gross fixed capital expenditure for the quarterly and annual national accounts (see paragraph 26).

Classification by industry

8. In order to classify new fixed capital expenditure by industry in these series, each enterprise listed on the ABS central register of economic units (and therefore each selected enterprise) is classified to the Australian Standard Industrial Classification (ASIC) industry in which it mainly operates.

9. All of the new fixed capital expenditure of each selected enterprise is classified to the enterprise's industry irrespective of the industries to which individual establishments of the enterprise may be classified. A measure of the degree to which enterprise based estimates are indicators of corresponding establishment based estimates is given by the enterprise coverage and specialisation ratios published in *Integrated Economic Censuses: Enterprise Statistics, Details by Industry Class, Australia* (8103.0).

10. The new fixed capital expenditure reported is in respect of additions to the fixed assets owned by the businesses surveyed, whether or not the assets will be used physically by the owner or will be leased to others. Capital expenditure on new assets which are leased to other enterprises is therefore in the industry of the lessor. A large proportion of the fixed assets acquired by the financial, property and business services industry is for lease to enterprises in other industries.

Reporting cycle of successive expectations and realisations

11. A graphical representation of the data reporting cycle is shown at the foot of this page. Businesses' expectations may be affected by subsequent events which may cause revision of plans and affect the timing of construction projects or deliveries of equipment, or their cost, so that expected expenditure and actual expenditure for corresponding periods may differ. Some indication of the predictive value of estimates of expected new fixed capital expenditure is shown in the tables, which compare the successive revised expectations with the subsequently reported actual capital expenditure. See also Graph 3 at the end of this publication.

Speculative construction projects

12. To bring the definitions used in this survey into line with those used in other ABS statistical collections, the definition of new fixed capital expenditure used in the December quarter 1982 and subsequent surveys was changed in respect of the treatment of speculative construction projects. The value of unsold, speculatively built construction projects, previously regarded as fixed tangible assets of the builder/property developer, is now regarded as stocks (of the builder/property developer). Commencing with the estimates collected in January/February 1983, the value of additions to unsold, speculatively built construction projects (whether completed or not) is regarded as additions to stocks (rather than new fixed capital expenditure) and is therefore excluded from the estimates in this publication. Expenditure on the purchase of speculatively built construction projects is now regarded as new fixed capital expenditure of the purchaser, at the time of purchase. This change has resulted in a break in the series for new buildings and structures for the finance, property and business services industry (and consequent aggregates).

13. To assist users in interpreting estimates of actual new fixed capital expenditure, data collected in the June, September and December 1982 surveys were used to

compile estimates of expenditure on new buildings and structures by the finance, property and business services industry on both the old and the revised bases. For each of these quarters, the difference between the estimates was approximately \$200 million. However, because the accuracy of the estimation of this difference cannot be assessed with confidence, due care should be taken in using it as a basis for adjusting the actual new fixed capital expenditure estimates shown in this publication, especially for quarters other than June, September and December quarters 1982.

14. To assist users in interpreting the series of expected new fixed capital expenditure for 1983-84, Tables 8 and 9 contain approximate estimates of data in respect of 1982-83 on the new basis. These estimates are shown in brackets and are rounded to the nearest \$50m (or 0.5 per cent) because it is considered that greater precision is not warranted, in view of the nature of the estimation process. Therefore due care should be taken with the use of these estimates. Comparable statistics have not been derived for any period prior to 1982-83.

Description of terms

15. *Enterprise*. For statistical purposes, the concept of an enterprise is broadly that of a unit comprising all the operations in Australia of a single operating legal entity, e.g. company, partnership, sole proprietor.

16. *New fixed capital expenditure* refers to expenditure on new fixed tangible assets including major improvements, alterations and additions. In general, this is expenditure charged to fixed tangible assets accounts excluding expenditure on second-hand assets unless these are imported for the first time from overseas. This approach gives an approximate measure of gross fixed capital formation.

17. Certain estimates are dissected by type of asset:

(a) *New buildings and structures*. Includes industrial and commercial buildings, houses, flats and home units, etc., water and sewerage installations, lifts, heating, ventilating and similar equipment forming an integral part of buildings and structures, land development and construction site development, roads, bridges, wharves, harbours, railway lines, pipelines, power and telephone lines. Also includes mine development (e.g. construction of shafts in underground mines, preparation of mining and quarrying sites for open cut extraction, and other developmental operations undertaken primarily for commencing or extending production). Excludes purchases of land or existing buildings.

(b) *Other new capital equipment*. Includes plant, machinery, vehicles, electrical apparatus, office equipment, furniture, fixtures and fittings not forming an integral part of buildings, durable containers, special tooling, etc. Also includes goods imported for the first time whether previously used outside Australia or not. Excludes goods previously used in Australia.

Accruals basis

18. Respondents have been asked to report all expenses incurred (except capitalised interest) during the period under review in acquiring new fixed tangible assets (including design, technical and legal fees and assembly, installation and transport costs) irrespective of when the payments are made.

Seasonal adjustments

19. Most of the quarterly actual new fixed capital expenditure series in this publication are affected to some extent by seasonal influences and it is useful to recognise and take account of this element of variation.

20. Seasonal adjustment may be carried out by various methods and the results may vary slightly according to the procedure adopted. Accordingly, seasonally adjusted statistics are in fact only estimates and should not be regarded as in any way definitive. In interpreting particular seasonally adjusted statistics it is important, therefore, to bear in mind the methods by which they have been derived and the limitations to which the methods used are subject. Details of the seasonal adjustment methods used, together with selected measures of variability for these series, are given in *Seasonally Adjusted Indicators, Australia* (1308.0).

21. Following the June quarter each year, each seasonally adjusted series is reanalysed to take into account the latest available data and the series are revised accordingly. The revisions are generally more significant for the recent quarters and more detailed estimates. Particular care should be taken in interpreting quarter to quarter movements in the adjusted figures, especially for detailed industry estimates and type of asset dissections.

Estimates at average 1979-80 prices

22. Estimates at average 1979-80 prices are presented, by type of asset, in both original and seasonally adjusted terms in Table 3. The deflators used to revalue the current price estimates are the price deflators compiled for the new fixed assets components of the national accounts aggregates 'Private gross fixed capital expenditure on non-dwelling construction' and 'Private gross fixed capital expenditure on equipment'.

Reliability of the estimates

23. Since estimates are based on information obtained from a sample drawn from units in the surveyed population, the estimates and the movements derived from them are subject to sampling variability; that is, they may differ from the figures that would have been produced if all units had been included in the survey. One measure of the likely difference is given by the *standard error*, which indicates the extent to which an estimate might have varied by chance because only a sample of units was included. There are about two chances in three that a sample estimate will differ by less than one standard error from the figure that would have been obtained if all units had been included, and about nineteen chances in twenty that the difference will be less than two standard errors.

Another measure of sampling variability is the *relative standard error* which is obtained by expressing the standard error as a percentage of the estimate to which it refers. The relative standard error is a useful measure in that it provides an immediate indication of the percentage errors likely to have occurred due to sampling, and thus avoids the need to refer also to the size of the estimate. The sample estimates of quarter to quarter movement in the value of new fixed capital expenditure are also subject to sampling variability. The relative standard error of the estimate of movement is expressed as a percentage of the quarterly estimate of the level of capital expenditure.

24. Tables 10 and 11 each present a summary of relative standard errors for certain estimates of level and of movement for actual expenditure. Relative standard errors for estimates of expected capital expenditure are comparable to those for corresponding estimates of actual expenditure. Examples of the use of relative standard errors from Tables 10 and 11 are as follows:

- (a) *Estimates of level.* Actual new fixed capital expenditure for total new buildings and structures in June quarter 1982 was \$1,346.7m (from Table 4) and the applicable relative standard error is 3.7 per cent (from Table 10). There are 2 chances in 3 that a complete collection would give an estimate within one standard error of the sample estimate (i.e. in the range \$1,296.9m to \$1,396.5m) and 19 chances in 20 that the 'true' estimate would be within two standard errors of the sample estimate (i.e. in the range \$1,247.1m to \$1,446.3m).
- (b) *Estimates of movement.* The derived seasonally adjusted estimate of quarterly movement to September quarter 1982 for the food, beverages and tobacco industry was -\$4.6m from a June estimate of \$156.2m (from Table 5). The applicable relative standard error is 2.7 per cent (from Table 11). The relative standard error is expressed as a percentage of the earlier quarter's estimate of level and in this case means there are 2 chances in 3 that a complete collection would have given an estimate of movement in the range of -\$8.8m to -\$0.4m and 19 chances in 20 that the 'true' estimate of movement would have been in the range -\$13.0m to +\$3.8m.

25. The imprecision due to sampling, which is measured by the standard error, is not of course the only type of inaccuracy to which the estimates are subject. Other inaccuracies, referred to collectively as non-sampling error, may occur because of imperfections in reporting by respondents, deficiencies in the central register of economic units from which the sample is selected and deficiencies in the allowance made each quarter for the probable commencement of new enterprises since the sample was selected.

Comparison with other statistics published by the ABS

26. The statistics for new fixed capital expenditure shown in this publication differ from estimates of private gross fixed capital expenditure shown in Australian National Accounts publications for the following reasons:

- (a) The national accounts estimates incorporate data from other sources as well as information from the capital expenditure survey. For example, income tax tabulations provide the benchmark data for estimating the national accounts private gross fixed capital expenditure on 'equipment' and the ABS's quarterly building collection is the main data source for estimating the national accounts 'dwellings' item.
 - (b) The national accounts estimates include the capital expenditure by private enterprises classified to the agriculture, forestry, fishing and hunting, construction and community services industries and the capital expenditure on dwellings by households, statistics of which are excluded from this publication (see paragraphs 4 and 5).
 - (c) The national accounts estimates include the value of work done on speculative construction projects as the work is put into place. This treatment is the same as that used in the Survey of New Fixed Capital Expenditure up to the September quarter 1982. However, from the December quarter 1982 the value of work done on speculative construction projects in this survey is only regarded as new fixed capital expenditure when the project is sold (see paragraphs 12-14).
 - (d) For 'equipment' the national accounts estimates relate to acquisitions less disposals of all fixed tangible assets whereas the survey figures are acquisitions of new fixed tangible assets only.
27. The statistics shown in this publication will also differ from some of the statistics derived from the ABS's economic censuses for the following reasons:
- (a) The statistics shown in this publication are derived from a sample survey and consequently are subject to sampling variability.
 - (b) These statistics relate to enterprise units whereas statistics in some other ABS publications (e.g. *Manufacturing Establishments, Details of Operations by Industry Class, Australia*, (8203.0)) relate to establishments.
 - (c) The fixed capital expenditure statistics published in the economic census publications are acquisitions less disposals of all fixed tangible assets whereas the survey figures published herein are acquisitions of new fixed tangible assets only.

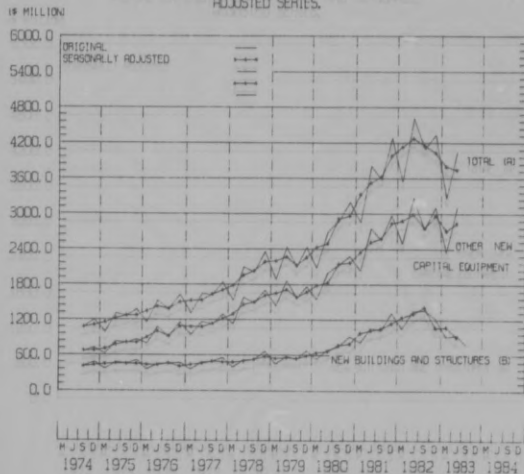

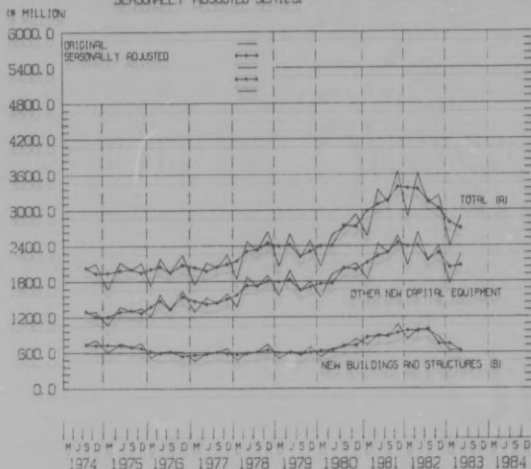

ADJUSTED SERIES.



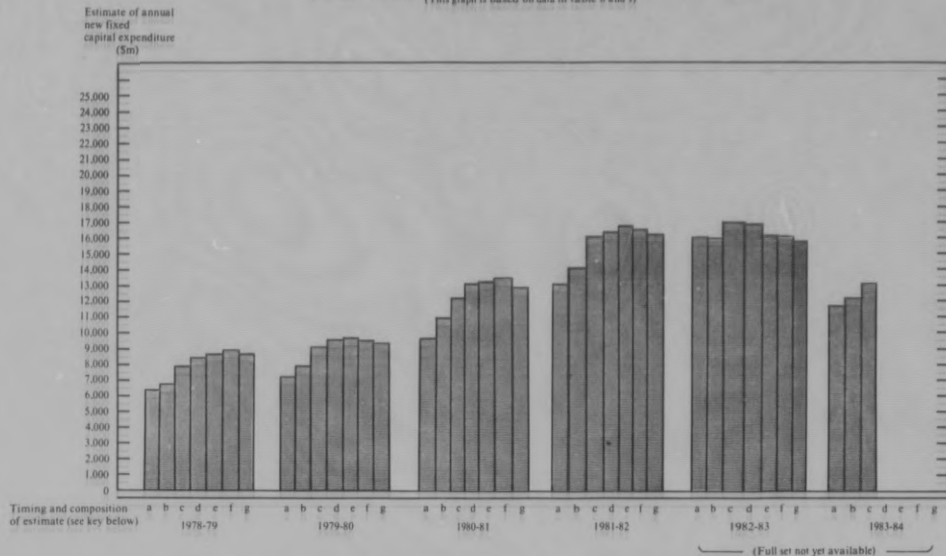
