

MINIMUM RATES OF WAGE AND PRESCRIBED HOURS OF WORK:
ADULT MALES AND ADULT FEMALES - SYDNEY AND MELBOURNE, AUSTRALIA, 30TH JUNE, 1965

The wage rates and hours of work in the tables below have been taken from awards, determinations and agreements of industrial tribunals and from unregistered agreements operative at 30th June, 1965. The occupations listed are selected from those appearing in the Appendix of the Annual Labour Report (see Labour Report No. 50, 1962 and 1963, pages 266 to 295). The wage rates and hours are generally those applicable to the Sydney and Melbourne metropolitan areas, but where this is not so, the area of the State to which they are applicable is indicated in a footnote.

Where two or more rates are quoted in an award, determination or agreement for a particular occupation, these rates are shown in the tables in the Appendix of the Labour Report. However in this publication, owing to limitations of space, only the lower (or lowest) rate for each occupation has been quoted.

In the majority of cases, the rates quoted are those payable for a full week's work (excluding overtime). Where it is not possible to quote such rates, hourly rates etc. have been shown. If hours other than weekly are prescribed for an occupation, an appropriate footnote has been inserted.
