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### STUDY DESCRIPTION

The 1982 study of Population Mobility and Party Allegiance in the Northern Territory was conducted by Dr. Peter Loveday of the North Australia Research Unit of the Australian National University and Dr. Dean Jaensch of Flinders University.

The study consisted of interviews with a sample of urban residents of the Northern Territory aged 18 years and older, carried out between May and July 1982.

#### Sample

The sample was extracted from the January 1982 electoral rolls of the Northern Territory, from electorates which included part or all of the urban areas under study. The towns sampled were Darwin, Alice Springs, Tennant Creek, Katherine, Nhulunbuy and Jabiru. Where the electorate roll covered both urban and rural areas, the sample was extracted only from the urban residents. That is, from:

Alice Springs residents in the Stuart electorate  
Jabiru residents in the Tiwi electorate  
Darwin residents in the Victoria River electorate  
Tennant Creek residents in the Barkly electorate  
Katherine residents in the Elsey electorate  
Nhulunbuy residents in the Nhulunbuy electorate.

The total sample extracted was in the ratio of 1:15 of the total urban population, a sample of 2,500 from which 1,945 interviews were obtained.

A letter was sent to every person in the sample explaining the Survey and asking them to co-operate. Over 10 percent of letters were returned by Australia Post as the persons were no longer at the address. Due to the high level of population mobility in the Territory, interviewers were instructed to obtain 'replacement' interviews - that is, interviews with new respondents in place of those who had been selected but who moved from the address at which they were enrolled. These 'replacements' were, if possible, a person of the same sex at the same address, or if not possible, a person of the opposite sex at the same address. In two places, Tennant Creek and Katherine, where the interviewing team had very limited time in the field, the 'replacement' policy was expanded to 'next door' (See VAR 4).

#### Questionnaire Design

The final questionnaire contained 75 questions which yielded 130 variables for analysis. The length of the questionnaire was restricted to ensure that the average interview would not last more than 30 minutes. The questionnaire was pre-tested at the end of 1981, but political events forced a last minute change. The leader of the NT Labor party resigned in late 1981, and it was decided that questions asking respondents to compare knowledge of and opinions about the two party leaders would be misleading as Labor's new leader would have had much less exposure to the electorate. Such questions were omitted from the survey.
