

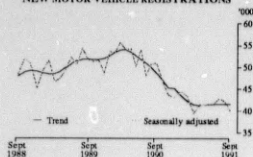

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NEW MOTOR VEHICLE REGISTRATIONS



Still no joy for car makers

The trend estimate for total new vehicle registrations remains flat following falls in both actual and seasonally adjusted registrations in September 1991.

The trend series showed an increase of only 0.1 per cent in September 1991. Car and station wagon registrations increased by 0.4 per cent while 'other vehicles' fell by 1.7 per cent.

In seasonally adjusted terms, total new motor vehicle registrations fell 5.3 per cent to 40,010 vehicles. Car and station wagon registrations decreased 6.5 per cent to 33,689 vehicles, while 'other vehicles' showed a slight rise of 1.8 per cent to 6,321 vehicles.

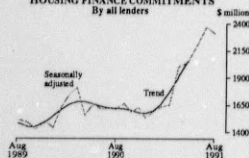
For the unadjusted series, all categories of vehicles showed a decrease in registrations for September 1991. Total new motor vehicle registrations fell 4.7 per cent to 40,408 vehicles, car and station wagon registrations fell by 5.3 per cent to 34,326 vehicles and 'other vehicle' registrations fell 1.5 per cent to 6,082 vehicles.

Finance for home construction remains buoyant

Seasonally adjusted housing finance commitments for August 1991 (excluding alterations and additions) totalled \$2,313.7 million, a decrease of \$56.9 million (2.4%) over July 1991 but an increase of \$702.1 million (43.6%) over August 1990.

Although the number of dwellings for which finance was provided declined by 0.8 per cent in August 1991 compared with July 1991, in the key category of 'construction of dwellings', which is a lead indicator of movements in building activity, there was an increase of 4.6 per cent. This was the sixth successive month that the numbers of dwellings in this category recorded an increase.

The 3.1 per cent increase in the seasonally adjusted value of commitments for home construction (to \$391.5 million in August) was the eighth rise in a row. The overall decrease in commitments was brought about by a decline of 4.0 per cent in lending for established dwellings.

Tourist accommodation: sixteen year low in occupancy rates

The room occupancy rate in hotels, motels and guest houses for the June quarter 1991, 47.6 per cent, was the lowest recorded occupancy rate since the Australian Bureau of Statistics series commenced in 1975.

The rate was down from 50.1 per cent a year earlier, because the number of rooms available Australia-wide, in hotels, motels and guest houses, increased by 5.3 per cent, while room nights occupied remained virtually unchanged between June quarter 1990 and June quarter 1991. The increase in number of rooms available occurred in all States and Territories except the ACT.

A notable feature was that rooms available in four star hotels and motels increased by 23.5 per cent while room nights occupied for the same establishments rose by 18.3 per cent.

Nationally, guest arrivals decreased by 3.3 per cent, with only Queensland recording an increase. Average length of stay increased marginally from 1.9 to 2.0 days.

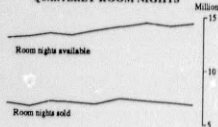
Takings from accommodation increased by only 1.5 per cent to \$538.5 million, while the average takings per room night sold rose from \$78 to \$79 (1.1%). During this same period, the all groups Consumer Price Index increased by 3.4 per cent.

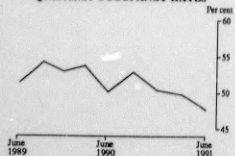
QUARTERLY ROOM NIGHTS



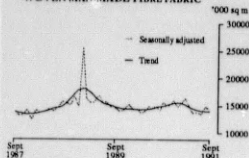
QUARTERLY TAKINGS FROM

Manufacturing in September ...

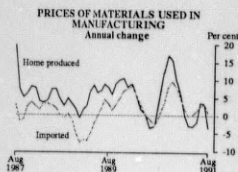
The publication *Manufacturing Production, Australia, Preliminary* (8301.0) contains up-to-date time series data on the production of twenty-seven major indicators of production (twenty-five seasonally adjusted). The indicator commodities have been selected to give a broad industry representation of the manufacturing sector and are part of a much larger range of commodity items published in the series of ten *Manufacturing Production Bulletins*.

In the table below, the 'previous year' column is a generally more reliable guide to trends, but should be read in conjunction with the more detailed data presented in the monthly publications, as the production of manufacturing commodities can vary quite significantly on a month-to-month basis, even after seasonal adjustment.

Small fall in manufacturing materials prices

The price index of materials used in manufacturing industries fell by 0.4 per cent between July and August 1991.

Prices of home produced materials decreased by 0.3 per cent while imported materials fell by 0.5 per cent.

The decrease in home produced materials was caused mainly by lower prices for cattle and calves and for metal ores and concentrates. These decreases were partly offset by increased prices for hardwood logs during August.

The decrease in imported materials was mainly caused by lower prices for chemicals and chemical based materials.

Over the year to August prices of manufacturing materials decreased by 2.0 per cent, with home produced materials decreasing by 3.4 per cent and imported materials increasing by 0.7 per cent over this period.
