



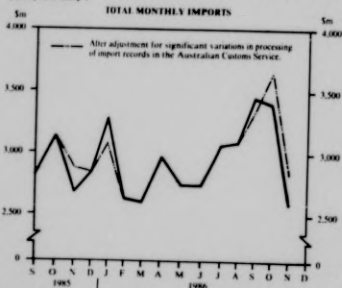

**NOTE:** Import statistics relate to the month in which import entries are finalised by Customs and passed to the ABS for processing. They do not necessarily represent entries lodged or commodities actually imported during the month. See paragraphs 8 and 9 of the Explanatory Notes.

### MAIN FEATURES

Imports for November 1986 fell by \$806m, to \$2,589m, a decrease of 24% compared with October 1986. This is the second consecutive month in which there has been a decrease and represents the lowest level of imports since April 1985 (\$2,404m).



The major contributors to this decrease were machinery, down \$236m (23%) to \$795m; miscellaneous manufactured articles, down \$101m (22%) to \$355m; miscellaneous trade, down \$94m (40%) to \$140m; transport equipment, down \$72m (18%) to \$324m; petroleum and petroleum products, down \$57m (37%) to \$98m; and food and live animals, down \$56m (36%) to \$99m.

The value of imports for the five months ended November 1986 was \$15,580m, an increase of \$674m (5%) compared with the same period last year. The major contributors to this increase were machinery, up \$222m (5%) to \$4,787m; miscellaneous manufactured articles, up \$196m (10%) to \$2,239m; miscellaneous trade, up \$166m (26%) to \$808m; and chemicals, up \$111m (9%) to \$1,376m. A decrease was recorded in petroleum and petroleum products, down \$285m (30%) to \$675m.

### EXPLANATORY NOTES

#### Introduction

This publication predominantly contains monthly and year-to-date statistics of imports by Sections (1 digit) and Divisions (2 digits) of the Australian Import Commodity Classification (AICC) (1204.0). Statistics for 1985-86 and 1986-87 may be amended as a result of continuing quality checks on foreign trade data. Although these amendments usually have little effect on broad aggregate statistics, they may have a significant effect on individual commodity statistics. For this reason, statistics for 1985-86 and 1986-87 should be regarded as preliminary and subject to revision.

2. More detailed figures will be published in the monthly publication Imports, Australia (5406.0).

3. This publication also contains details of import orders for selected steel commodities, see paragraphs 23 to 29 below for details.

### STATISTICS OF IMPORTS

#### Source of data

4. The statistics of imports in Tables 1, 2, and 3 are compiled by the Australian Bureau of Statistics from information contained in import entries submitted by importers or their agents to the Australian Customs Service as required by the Customs Act.

### Statistical concepts

5. The statistics of imports in Tables 1, 2 and 3 of this publication are recorded on a general trade basis, i.e. imports comprise goods entered directly for home consumption together with goods imported into Customs warehouses.

6. Although items of non-merchandise trade are recorded, they are excluded from imports and imports cleared for home consumption. The value of non-merchandise trade is shown in Table 1 of publication 5406.0: Imports, Australia - issued monthly (see paragraphs 13 and 14).

7. The following are excluded from recorded import statistics:

- (a) direct transit trade, i.e. goods being trans-shipped or moved through Australia for purposes of transport only;
- (b) bunkers and stores supplied to ships and aircraft prior to arrival in Australia;
- (c) migrants' and passengers' effects imported and parcels post imports of small value, for which Customs entries are not required;
- (d) certain materials under inter-governmental agreements for defence and similar projects for which Customs entries are not required;
- (e) ships and aircraft engaged in the transport of passengers or goods between Australia and other countries;
- (f) the purchase of any ship and/or aircraft intended for use on overseas routes;
- (g) fish and other sea products landed in Australia directly from the high seas by Australian ships;
- (h) entries lodged on informal clearances documents (ICD) for values not exceeding \$250. In addition, from 21 October 1985 onwards, ICDs for postal articles valued between \$250 and \$1000 are excluded.

### Statistical period

8. Imports are recorded statistically in the calendar month in which the import entries are both finalised by the Australian Customs Service and passed to the ABS for further processing. Import entries may be lodged early using the Customs check-to-arrive system or the documents may be delayed because of

various validation checks carried out by Customs prior to the entries being passed to the ABS.

9. Import statistics for a particular month do not necessarily represent entries lodged or commodities actually imported during that month. Analysis of past data has shown that in aggregate approximately 70 per cent of import trade by value for a particular month reflects actual imports during that month, 25 per cent by value was actually imported during the previous month with the remaining 5 per cent by value being imported in earlier months. For individual commodities the percentage by value representing actual imports in a month may vary considerably.

### Valuation

10. The recorded value of imports is the Customs value (formerly referred to as the value for duty). On 30 November 1981, Australia adopted the GATT Agreement on Customs Valuation. The Agreement reflects one of a number of trade related codes of conduct established during the round of Multi-lateral Trade Negotiations (MTN) concluded in 1979.

11. Under the Agreement the primary basis for establishing the customs value is the price actually paid or payable, provided a number of conditions are met. The most important condition is that the buyer and seller must be independent of each other. If the conditions are not met the practical rules are used to determine the customs value.

12. The recording of the value of imports remains on a free-on-board (f.o.b.) basis (i.e. charges and expenses involved in delivering the goods from the place of exportation to Australia are excluded). The recorded value also continues to include the value of the outside package, other than international containers used for containerised cargo.

### Imports and non-merchandise trade

13. From July 1985, non-merchandise trade is excluded from import (and export) statistics. This is in accord with UN recommendations and practices adopted by Australia's major trading partners. Statistics prior to July 1985 included in this publication have been adjusted to be comparable with data from July 1985 onwards and, consequently, will not be directly comparable with previous publications.

14. Non-merchandise imports consist primarily of re-imports of goods which were originally exported on a temporary basis or for repair, alteration or renov-

ation, and imports of goods on a temporary basis (including goods for repair, alteration or renovation in Australia) and subsequent re-exportation. A complete list of commodities comprising non-merchandise trade is shown under section 9(b) of the AICC. The value of non-merchandise trade is shown in Table 1 of publication 5406.0: Imports Australia-issued monthly.

#### Commodity classification

15. Imports are classified according to the items of the AICC which, from 1 July 1978, has been based on the Standard International Trade Classification, Revision 2 (United Nations, Statistical Papers, Series M, No. 34, Revision 2, 1975). A detailed description of the commodity items included in this publication is contained in the AICC. Copies of, or extracts from, this classification may be obtained from offices of the ABS in Canberra and in each capital city.

#### Treatment of confidential data

16. To ensure that information about the activities of particular businesses is not disclosed it is necessary to restrict the release of statistics of certain commodities. These restrictions do not affect total import figures but they affect statistics at all levels of the Australian Import Commodity Classification.

17. Reference to table footnotes should assist in the interpretation of these differences. Further information regarding the treatment of confidential data is contained in the ABS information paper, Confidentiality and the Release of Foreign Trade and Shipping Statistics (5486.0).

#### Revision to previous figures

18. Where revisions have been made to the previously published figures for earlier months of the current financial year, appropriate adjustments are made to the year-to-date figures shown in this publication. For this reason, monthly figures published in previous issues for the current financial year will not necessarily add to the year-to-date figure shown in the latest issue.

#### OTHER INFORMATION AVAILABLE

19. Special returns service: Subscribers to this service can receive foreign trade statistics at a particular commodity level on computer produced printout or via the electronic mail service, TELESTATS. These statistics are available in one or more of a limited number of formats, for a charge consistent with the level of detail required.

This service is recommended where up to fifty specific commodity items are required on a regular basis. More details concerning the special returns service are contained in the ABS information paper, Foreign Trade Statistics: Special Returns Service (5480.0).

20. Microfiche service: Foreign trade statistics are also available on microfiche in a variety of tabular formats. Each tabular format covers all commodities imported or exported, at various levels of aggregation. This service is recommended where the subscriber wishes to obtain foreign trade details for a large number of commodities. Details of this service are contained in the ABS information paper, Foreign Trade and Shipping Statistics: Microfiche Service (5483.0).

21. Magnetic tape service: Statistics for imports, exports and import clearances are available on 9-track magnetic tape approximately 4 weeks after the end of the reference period. This service is recommended where the subscriber wishes to obtain trade data at the most detailed level. Documentation regarding the content and structure of these tapes is contained in the ABS information paper, Foreign Trade and Shipping Statistics: Magnetic Tape Service (5484.0).

22. To meet subscribers' needs special returns, microfiche and magnetic tape are available on a monthly, quarterly or less frequent basis. Payment in advance is required for each of these services.

#### IMPORT ORDERS

23. This publication also provides monthly statistics of import orders for selected steel commodities. Tables 4, 5 and 6 respectively show import orders outstanding, clearances, and net orders placed.

24. The import orders statistics provided in this publication have been compiled from monthly returns completed by importers of the selected commodities. The statistics defined by the relevant Tariff Items/Statistical Codes of the Australian Customs Tariff are listed below Table 6.

25. Table 4 shows "Import orders outstanding, expected to be cleared by the Australian Customs Service within the subsequent four months". The statistics shown are aggregates of firm orders placed overseas as at the end of the month after allowance for (i) cancellations and (ii) clearances during the month. Imports landed but not cleared

(i.e. held in a Customs warehouse) are treated as import orders outstanding.

26. Clearance statistics shown in Table 5 are compiled from import entries submitted to the Australian Customs Service - see paragraph 4 for details.

27. Statistics of "net new import orders placed" are given in Table 6. These statistics are aggregates of new orders placed during the month, less any outstanding orders cancelled during the month.

28. Import orders statistics exclude all goods imported at concessional rates of duty under Customs by-law provisions, and imports by the Commonwealth.

29. When comparing import orders outstanding with actual import clearances over time, differences may occur due to:

- (a) new orders being placed and subsequently cleared within the particular time period;
- (b) imports being cleared by new or casual importers;
- (c) orders being cancelled or revised at any stage.
